ARRIVAL OF THE ENGLISH MAIL.

Progress of the War.

(From the European Times.)

(From the European Times.)

The remarkable correspondence published in the Moniteur at the close of last week shows Russia in the submissive attitude of saing for peace. The language used by the Russian minister amounts in substance to this,—that the troops of the Czar will retire from the Danubian provinces if Austria will use its influence with the Western Powers to prevent them from attacking the Russian dominions. This is a sad lowering in the tone of the Czar before the conclusion of the first campaign. But the French Foreign Secretary unmarks in the most masterly manner the filmsy reasoning in which the Russian Chancellor indulges to cover his master's retreat, and the whole tone and grasp of the document are worthy of the high talent which M. Drouyn de L'Hays has always exhibited in his State papers. The most gratifying feature in this correspondence is the new and improved position in which it exhibits Austria, for Lord John Russell stated in the House of Commons, a few minutes before the prorogation, that that power would not rest satisfied with the status quo,—that it would require other guarantees, and; in substance, that it agreed with the Western Powers; but he added, as if there was still a loop on which to hang a doubt, "It remained to be seen whether the government of his Imperial Majesty would think proper to communicate the interchange of notes which had taken place to the government of Russia, and whether the armaments which had been made by the Emperor of Austria of late would be put into action, in order to obtain by force, if they could not obtain by negotiation, those securities to Europe which the English and French Governments have deemed absolutely necessary, and which, he trusted, the German Powers would likewise concur in seeking and issisting upon from Russia." It is clear, however, that the demands of the Western Powers are acceptable to Austria, whether she will assist in procuring them or not,—a point which must go far to limit the duration of the contest, and which cannot fail t

material effect in depressing the spirit, if not the power of Russia.

All the accounts represent the Russians as hastening from the Principalities by forced marches, for the evident purpose of concentrating their strength on the point most likely to be attacked; but what that point is does not at present appear. The object of the allied commanders will be to keep their views as secret as possible, and it is not yet certain that Sebastopol will be attacked. Indeed, the probability is that the point of attack will not be known until it is made. Some are inclined to think that the isthmus of Perceop. will not be known until it is made.
