WAS FATALLY HURT BY FALLING FROM TEAM

Teamster Crushed Under a Heavy Wagon for Hours Dies from Result.

VICTIM CARRIED MONEY

Alfred Moore Had Over \$900 of His Savings in a Belt Around Him When Found.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 28.—As a result of internal injuries caused by falling from a team on a tote road leading from Williamsburg to Nappadoggan Lake, Alfred Moore, teamster, in the employ of the Toronto Construction Company, died at the Victoria Hospital this afternoon.

The accident, which was of a most unusual nature, happened a week ago Saturday night when Moore was making his last trip of the season. He had left Williamsburg in the afternoon with a two-horse team loaded with supplies for the camp. When he had covered about half of the six mile trail, he started to cross a mud hole, when the wheels of the wagon went down into a deep rut, causing it to upset.

Moore endeavored to save himself by jumping, but was caught and pinned down by one of the heavy wheels in about eight inches of mud and had the horses not remained perfectly still his life would have been crushed out by the wheels of the wagon.

All alone in the deep woods, with darkness coming on, it is not hard to picture the terrible situation which confronted him.

But for the action of W. C. Smith Company's energetic foreman, at Nappadoggan, the poor fellow would have perished where he fell. When he failed to reach camp at the usual hour Smith became uneasy and sent two men out on the trail to look for Moore. They penetrated the woods for a distance of two miles and failing to meet Moore returned to camp and reported. Smith however, was not satisfied. He had ascertained by telephone that Moore had left Williamsburg with his team and he was now positive that an accident had befallen him. He immediately dispatched another searching party and told them that they must find Moore. They took lanterns along with them and came upon Moore and his team, four miles from the camp.

When his clothing was removed a belt containing over \$900, representing his savings, was found on his body. On Monday he was removed by train to McGivney's and thence to Victoria Hospital here.

EMPLOYEES WERE PUT OUT ON THE STREET

New England Company Ejecting its Striking Employees From the Homes Owned by the Company—Over Two Thousand Effected.

THE CITY IS CALLED UPON TO PROVIDE HABITATION

Ludlow, Mass., Nov. 27.—In fulfillment of their announced intention of compelling strikers and their families to leave the dwellings owned by the company, officials of the Ludlow Mfg. Association to-day began having writs of ejectment served. Fifteen company houses were emptied of their contents early this forenoon, and the occupants ordered to seek shelter elsewhere. The strikers who left the company's jute and hemp products mills late in September, as a protest against a new system of work which they claimed meant lower wages for them, announced to-day that they intended to appeal to the town officials to provide habitations for the families turned out of the company's buildings. The town authorities have not yet indicated how they will meet this appeal.

WOMEN KILLED BY GAS EXPLOSION

Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Smith Lost Their Lives in a Rochester Hotel.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 26.—Mrs. Harriett Smith, aged 35 years, and Mrs. Minnie Wright, aged fifty years, were killed by a gas explosion in a boarding house at 122 North Street to-day.

A jet in their room had leaked all night. The landlady detected gas and traced it to the room. She burst in the door just in time to see flames envelope the room. Mrs. Wright, in a dazed condition, through being half awake and half suffocated by the escaping gas, had applied a match to the leaky jet. She was found dead on the floor. The body of Mrs. Smith lay on the bed.

OVER SCORE OF JAPS MET THEIR DEATH IN WRECK

Accident Occurred on the Canadian Northern Near Vancouver.

THE TRAIN CREW ESCAPED

Locomotive and Flat Cars Crashed Down on Box Car, and Victims Had no Chance of Escape.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 28.—Between twenty and thirty Japanese were killed today between Vancouver and New Westminster, when a work train on the Great Northern went through a fill-in.

No white men were killed. The engineer and fireman jumped in time to save themselves. The Japs were all in a box car behind the locomotive and there was no escape for them. It had been raining heavily for several days, and the water loosened the earth at the base of the culvert. The locomotive had just crossed when a pull was felt from behind and looking back the engineer saw the whole fill-in going. He and the fireman jumped just in time.

The locomotive tumbled backward on the car containing the Japs, cutting it in two and mangling the bodies of the victims horribly. From the other side eight flat cars piled themselves in a heap on the car in which the men were riding, driving it into the embankment. The bodies and pieces of bodies of seventeen men have been taken from the wreckage and others can be seen protruding. The Owl express from Seattle to Vancouver would have passed over the fill-in but was held up at New Westminster to allow the track to be cleared.

SAYS DIGGS FIRST ASSAULTED HER

Mary Rumbley Arrested at St. John for Serious Stabbing.

St. John, Nov. 28.—Mary Rumbley was arrested early this morning charged with inflicting bodily harm on Jos. Diggs at Willow Grove. Diggs is lying at the point of death in the hospital as the result of his injuries, which were inflicted with a knife. He says that the assault was unprovoked and that the woman had a dislike for him, but she asserts that he called her insulting names and attacked her first whereupon she drew a knife upon him. She will be remanded to jail until more is learned of Diggs' condition.

SEEK MAN NOW AS MURDERER OF GLOVER

The Hattie LeBlanc Mystery is Still Unsolved But Bullets Found in Body Do Not Fit Revolver Which Glover Said She Used.

IT IS NOW CLAIMED BY MANY SHE WAS A DUPE

Waltham, Mass., Nov. 27.—The legal procedure in the investigation of the murder of Clarence Glover in his laundry in this city, reached the inquest stage to-day. For a week the state and local officials have been using every effort to clear up the mystery which has enveloped the case. They have arrested Hattie LeBlanc, a domestic in the Glover family, who was accused of the murder by Glover just before he died. The authorities, however, have found too many inconsistencies to support Glover's statement.

One of the most striking is that the bullets recovered don't fit the revolver which Glover claimed the young woman used in shooting him. For the past few days the police have been looking in the direction of some man, the identity of whom they have not

MANY FROM THE UNITED STATES

Immigration to Canada for First Seven Months of Year Big Increase.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—The total immigration into Canada for the first seven months of the fiscal year, April to October inclusive, was 138,234 as compared with 109,596 for the same month of last year, an increase of 23 per cent. Immigration for October was 17,391 as compared with 9,680 in October of last year. The arrivals at ocean ports totalled 8,032, an increase of 78 per cent. The arrivals from the United States totalled 9,299, an increase of 102 per cent, as compared with the same month of last year.

Ludlow, Mass., Nov. 29.—The elements during last night and the early part of to-day added to the misery of more than 25 families evicted on Saturday from tenements owned by the Ludlow Manufacturing Associates, because of a strike in the mills of the company. The household effects of the evicted persons were piled together in a great heap in the street in front of the houses from which they had been removed.

WIFE LIKE TO DIE, HIMSELF A SUICIDE; RESULT OF SPREE

Eastport Man, After Murderous Assault, Seeks Death in Bay—Fatal Shooting Caused by Trouble Over Girl at Dance.

Eastport, Me., Nov. 29—Evidence of what appeared to the police to have been a murderous assault and suicide, was brought to light to-day. It tended to show that James A. Craig, aged about 35, assaulted his wife at their home in the south end last night with some instrument which has since disappeared, making a gash in the head which required five stitches to close, and it is supposed left her for dead.
 Then he left the house and at a point about a mile away drowned himself in the bay. Before death came he was discovered by a dog that attracted his master's attention and led him to the shore where Craig was found in four feet of water. He was taken to a nearby house, where he died within an hour.
