Mrs. Wilson Terry of Still Water, N. Y., drowned her two-month-old child by plunging it head first into a slop tub; then she committed suicide by drowning.

Advisers from Manitoba say that the wheat crop will reach twenty millions of bushels and nearly all of good quality. The yield is turning out much better than ever the most sanguine anticipated.

A fourteen-year-old boy named George Elworth, died at Philadelphia on Wednesday last from the effects of smoking cigarettes. The boy, who was a regular smoker, died in an hour.

Wm. H. Stevens, who is spending the summer at Riverside, K. I., received a letter the past week from solicitors, in Montreal, notifying him that he had fallen heir to an immense inheritance in that vicinity through the recent death of his aunt.

Captain the Hon. Charles John Coventry, second son of the Earl of Coventry, who on July 28th was sentenced to three months imprisonment for connection with Jameson's raid into the Transvaal, has been released from Hill way jail.

Peter S. McNally, the expert Boston swimmer, arrived at the Narragansett, Rhode Island pier on a steamer from Newport at 11.12 A.M. Wednesday last. Mr. McNally left Newport at 6.35 A.M. and swam the entire distance without assistance.

John Dale, the Irish dynamiter, who has been serving a life sentence in Portland prison, was released on Thursday last. Dale arrived in London Thursday. Although he is nominally at liberty he is still attended by officers of Portland prison.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Editor of the Herald is absent this week. St. Dunstan's College will re-open on Wednesday September 2nd.

The laying of the corner stone of the New Cathedral will take place on the 15th of next month.

A man in Bradford Co., Ont. took to the woods last Friday night, and died a few hours afterwards.

The assembly held at Fitness Point on the 18th. inst. was a decided success, about \$1,000 being realized.

Ed. Turoton, brakeman fell from a train at St. Martin's Junction, Que., on Friday last, and was killed.

Montreal's great fair and Eastern farmer's carnival takes place in that city from the 11th. to the 19th. September.

The Labrador fishery is reported as being a failure this season. This means starvation for thousands of fishermen next winter.

The C. P. R. Station at Joliette, Que., was on Monday last robbed of six thousand dollars belonging to the Canadian Express Co.

Mr. John Poston has bought all the stock of the Government factory Island cheese up to August 1st, which amounts to about 1,900 boxes.

A cloverbush struck the city of Megallow, New Mexico, on the 23rd. inst., demolishing about thirty houses and rendering 100 families homeless.

Bras. G. Gray, C., a representative of one of Halifax's oldest and most respected families died at that place on Friday last after an illness of several days.

The P. W. College and Normal School will re-open on Tuesday, September 1st at 10 A.M. Tuition fees must be paid to the Provincial Secretary before registration.

A train occurred at the Buffalo Driving Park, on the 23rd. inst., destroying half the covered track and the exhibition building. The fire is supposed to be incendiary.

Sir David Macpherson died on board the steamer Labrador, on Sunday the 15th. inst., while on the passage from Liverpool to Quebec. The steamer arrived at Rimouski Friday morning last.

Tenders are now asked for the building of a new wharf at Indian River, up to noon, Monday 2nd September, which can be seen at the office of the Reg. Architect, Summerside, to which we call attention.

In the races at Amherst, on Friday last Daisy Cunningham captured first place in the 2.30 class, with Melite Bix second. The best time in this class was 2.28. In the 2.45 class Kickapoo was first money.

On Sunday last a fire broke out in a house on Vine St., Charlottetown, Mass., O'Brien, one of the inhabitants, jumped from a third story window to the sidewalk receiving injuries from which he died instantly. Her son and daughter were also seriously injured.

The four-year-old child of Matthew Smith, Esq., of Pleasant View Hotel, Hampton, had a miraculous escape from instant death on the 20th. inst. The child was in a room in the third story of the hotel and hearing the guests laughing it ran to the open window when it lost its balance and fell a distance of 23 feet.

A sad accident occurred at Lower Montague yesterday afternoon, by which Howard Atkin, third son of Benjamin Atkin of that place, lost his life. We glean the following particulars from the Guardian: Young Atkin was out sailing in company with Chas. B. Perkins of this city, when Albert Atkin a younger brother of the deceased went out in a row boat and wanted to be taken in tow.
