The contrast offered by the Opposition members was indeed striking. An easy, healthy, strong looking team, they impart confidence and the impression that they will not be silent orators was created.



So far, however, the customers are all Italians. The Macedonia cigarette has its merits, but the chief claim of the cigar seems to be that it has no substitute once the smoker has grown used to it. These varieties are hardly likely to anneal to the British nalate, which did not care particularly even for the special cigars and tobaccos the Austrians used to sell before the war, which certainly were of superior quality. But Austria has lost the povvinces from which she obtained her best leaf, and will no longer be a competitor, while Greece, on the other hand, possesses provinces which have always been famous for the quality of their tobacco. In the past both Italians and Austrians produced the long, thin, peculiarly foreign-looking cigar known as the "Virginia." Now that Austria is out of the running the Italians may establish a monopoly of this



We thought that was a case for the F. C. B. to investigate, and we should rather like to know why it didn't investigate?

B. going on this, we should then be glad to supply further information and voice the complaints of the great common people on such other points as the price of butter, biscuits, sugar, etc. But it is no use going into these things until we get the first one settled a bit.

THE FISH QUESTION .- Mr. Coaker in his diary, which he is publishing in the Advocate (and most interesting very much of it is, especially his visit to Beaumont Hamel of sacred memory,) defends the Fishery Regulations and declares that he is more proud of them than of anything he has hitherto accomplished.

he has hitherto accomplished.

We have read much opinion from both sides on these Regulations. The opposition condemned them as an unwarranted restriction of trade, while government papers upheld them as the only salvation of the country's fish business, and it is rather remarkable that after the several days debate in the Board of Trade an unanimous resolution was passed declaring that "some form of regulations" was absolutely necessary! To the unbiassed observer, then, it looked as though in the main the Fish Regulations did have some value.

Even the Minister of Marine & Fisheries shows, by his appeal for carefully made codfish this season, that he does not, however, expect the regulations in themselves to be sufficient, and we hope he will give an ear to our remarks of last week, which we believe the majority of the fishermen endorse, and endeavor to throw the onus of good fish on the buyers: for they hold the power to make or mar the output of this country's fishery.

POLITICS. - Up to this writing there is no announcement of the Legislature, and there are some who are looking for surprises. They may not be altogether disappointed.

. The man who holds the situation in the palm of his hand at the present moment is none other than the Hon. W. F. Coaker. Mr. Coaker often spoke in the early days of his career of a "balance of power party," but it is questianable if he ever dreamt of being able to conircl the balance so effectually as he can to-day. Mr. Squires has twelve men. Mr. Cashin has twelve men (now that Mr. Woodford has resigned.) Mr. Coaker has eleven men. Either side is helpless without his aid. He thus controls the situation as absolutely and effectively-perhaps even more effectively than if he were premier. Furthermore, while there used to

be a time when Mr. Coaker felt incapable of taking up the reins of Government, it should be remembered that he has travelled rather extensively during the few years, and there is little doubt to our mind that he now feels perfectly capable of managing the country's affairs.

He may, however, decide that he ould have a stronger position by ntinuing to maintain the balance power.

Governing the country during these difficult times will be a severe strain on the popularity of any Government, and the Honorable, the President of the F. P. U. is too clever a politician to venture on any risky undertaking.
