



Conditions of the Ocean Race.

Halifax, N.S.—(By Canadian Press) —Since the Esperanto from Glouces-ter, whose torn timbers now strew the sand bars of Sable Island, defeated the Delawana of Lunenburg off Halifax harbor last fall and took to the United States the cup, emblematic of the championship of the fishing fleet of the North Atlantic, definite regulathe cup have been drawn up and em-bodied in the deed of gift.

The preamble to the regulations states that the trophy has been donated to encourage the development of the best type of craft for employment in the fishing industry, and throughout the rules take particular throughout the rules take particular care to provide that only bona fide fishing craft may engage in the Inter-national Competitions. To this and the following elegibiltiy clauses are

"The only vessels which may con pete for the trophy shall be bona fide fishing vessels which have engaged in least one season previous to the race A fishing season for the purpose of these rules is considered as extending from the month of April to September and any vessel competing must have remained on the fishing grounds in all weather, as is customary, until the month of September except for necessary returns to port for landing cargo or refitting. Fishing Banks shall mean all off-shore banks such as George's, Western, Grand, etc., and all vessels engaged in shore fishing and making port in bad weather shall not be eligible.

"Competing vessels must be of the usual type, both in form and construc-tion, sail plan and rigging, as cus-tomary in the fishing industry, and any radical departure may be regarded as a freak and eliminated.

"The captain and crew of each com peting vessel shall be bona fide fisher-men actively engaged in deep-sea fish-





In few countries has the change from prosperity to adversity, following as the aftermath of the war, been so marked as in Newfoundland. Whereas there was a surplus of 3% million dollars in 1918-19 on a total revenue of \$16 millions and a surplus of 10½ millions, netwithstanding much increased grants for various public services, there is an estimated deficit of three milions for 1920-21, according to the annual Budget speech made in the Legislature recently. 

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
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
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
