### Grave Conditions in Belfast.

#### S. May Open Trade Relations With Russia—Still no Settlement in Engineer's Strike in England.

#### HOPE FOR EUROPE.

GENOA, April 21. The Economic Conference with the participation of the Russo-German Treaty and the controversy and Soviet acceptance of the Allied conditions concerning foreign debts and the property of foreigners, professes the hope that something for the reconstruction of Europe, including Russia, will be accomplished. The demands of the powers have been accepted include the recognition of Russia of her counter claims based on military intervention, recognition of war debts to governments with the understanding that debts will be scaled down, the recognition of debts and financial obligations with return of confiscated property or compensation. The attitude of the Soviet Government indicates a desire for arrangements permitting Russia to enter the family of nations.

#### PAST CATHOLICS APPEAL FOR PROTECTION.

BELFAST, April 21. The Catholic Protectorate Committee sent the following telegram to the Hon. Mr. Chamberlain, Colonial Secretary, London: "The Catholic population of the Province of Newfoundland is being gradually exterminated by murder, starvation, and disease. Their streets are being burned, and their lives are being destroyed. The military forces are inflicting the special police honours on the Catholic population. The Government is either ignorant or inefficient. Your government saved the Armenians and Bulgarians, the Belfast Catholics are getting worse treatment. The last two years have been appalling."

#### TO RECOGNIZE SOVIETS.

WASHINGTON, April 21. The belief is steadily growing here that the United States will open trade relations with Russia and not improve recognition of the Russian Soviet Government. Those interested in the recognition of Russia by the United States say the British Government desires closer relationship with Russia, but not actual recognition.

#### NEGOTIATIONS AGAIN BREAK DOWN.

LONDON, April 21. Negotiations between employers and amalgamated Engineers Union, resumed to-day, but soon broke down and it is feared a lock out involving 1,000,000 men will follow.

#### AGREEMENT IS REPEATED.

GENOA, April 21. The Italian and Russian, asserts the Italian to-day, have already agreed the Turkish Nationalist Government at Ankara on a common program of foreign policy. This, however, the paper argues, will constitute

#### ANOTHER MURDER.

BELFAST, April 21. Thomas Best, 17 years old, was found to-night in a doorway in Ballymean Street, with a bullet through his heart.

#### INSURGENTS SEIZE WIRELESS STATION.

DUBLIN, April 21. The wireless station at Bunbeg, near Gweedore, Western Donegal seaboard, has been seized by Republican forces. It was announced to-day.

#### NEWSPAPER OFFICE RAIDED.

SLIGO, IRELAND, April 21. Armed men raided the offices of the Sligo Champion to-day and smashed the frames of type for the week's issue, apparently to prevent publication of the newspaper's report of Sunday's meeting, when Arthur Griffith spoke in favor of the Free State Treaty.

#### INCIDENT NOT ENDED, SAY FRENCH.

PARIS, April 21. The exclusion of Germany from discussion of Russian affairs at the Genoa Conference is not considered by the French Government as closing the incident involved in the signing of the Treaty of Rapallo. It was argued that it remains with the Allies to deal with the infraction of the Versailles pact alleged to be involved.

#### TO CONTROL MISSISSIPPI.

WASHINGTON, April 21. The sum of one million dollars was made available immediately for control of the flood waters of the Mississippi River now at the highest stage in years, by a resolution rushed through the Senate and House to-day.

#### WHEAT BOARD WAS UNJUST IN CONTENTION.

OTTAWA, April 21. The Canada Wheat Board was unjust and arbitrary towards Ontario Millers asserted R. A. Thompson, President of the Dominion Millers' Association, giving evidence before the Parliamentary Committee on Agriculture. He opposed the reconstruction of the Board.

#### B.L.C. PETITION CHURCHILL.

LONDON, April 21. The British Government has a serious problem with several thousand disbanded Royal Irish Constabulary. A large number yesterday presented a petition to Winston Spencer Churchill saying that all had been ordered out of Ireland and asking for employment in houses or barracks in England as well as protection from places of disembarkment in Ireland until they are aboard steamers leaving that country. Petition said many had already been murdered, some turned out of houses without warning, houses had been burned and numbers dragged off steamers on which they were about to embark for England. Nearly all the Constabulary have families, and while Government has granted pensions, they must leave Ireland for England where there is little chance to find homes or employment, most of them have not sufficient money to emigrate although they would make splendid settlers.

Cheese Paring.

The Prime Minister of the autonomous colony of Newfoundland, who is also at times, acting Minister of Finance, promises to reduce expenditure by cutting out the sum of Two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, or thereabouts, from the estimates submitted to the House of Assembly. How does he propose to save Newfoundland such a sum? Is it not a bit farfetched that the paring of that amount should be suggested, when millions of dollars are involved in other directions? What is the use of trimming off the lesser twigs of the tree of expenditure if the roots are allowed to remain? The whole thing smacks of insincerity of purpose, and it is manifest that the Government do not intend to go about their financial gardening in a manner that will bear fruit. One quarter of a million dollars. One dollar per head for every man, woman and child comprising the population of this ridden to death Colony, the Premier promises - promises mind you - will be remitted them in the way of reduction in expenditure, or retrenchment, whichever readers choose. We have heard of similar promises on the part of this political redeemer, but none of them has ever been fulfilled. The present leader of the Government is too much of a politician, and too little of a statesman to have his newer promises accepted at face value. An American poet once told a story of a "heathen Chinese" whose peculiarity he described as possessing "ways that are dark and tricks that are vain." The same could be applied to the Government of Newfoundland. Politically the Premier is always there with the goods - of sorts. His particular metier is to pass the buck to those who do not agree with him, whether in commerce or in the ranks of labor. The history of the past few days well demonstrates his ability in this direction. The records of the Board of Trade will bear witness to it; and yet out of the magnanimity of his generosity he offers to reduce expenditure during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922 by a quarter of a million dollars. Could generosity go any further? Will not a grateful people bow before such an exalted personality, who promises to relieve their burdens by taking off about three per cent. of the revenue he anticipates extorting from them. Think of it good friends, and in the course of your deliberations ask yourselves if the genuineness of this Government, whose one object apparently is to make you pay to the uttermost farthing of your earnings for their extravagance, is worthy of serious consideration. Whether it is not well to ask the representative of His Majesty the King for their summary dismissal as incapables. Such a cheese paring policy of retrenchment as they

put before the taxpayers is not worth consideration for a moment. Let them, if they are in earnest, begin at the root, not at the dead twigs and leaves. The people are being insulted by the promise of such puerile performance.

An Open Letter on Railway Matters.

To R. C. Morgan, Esq., C.E., of Winnipeg, in the Dominion of Canada, and of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, City.

Dear Sir-I have said, that the result of the General Election in 1903, in point of fact, was the rejection of the Branch Line Railway policy. That is true, although the poll as declared gave an equal number of supporters to the advocates and to the opponents of the policy. The reason for this entirely unique condition of affairs has to be accounted for, however, by the fact that although arrangements had been made, in conformity with the Election Act, for the conveyance of electors to their respective polling booths, for some reason never discovered, the steamer engaged to convey electors to their respective polling booths from Bell Island, where they were temporarily employed at the Mines, failed to arrive at that port until within a short time of the hour for the closing of all booths; the result of this was, that hundreds of men belonging to adjoining districts were deprived of their votes, and it is well known that at least six Government candidates thereby lost their seats in the House of Assembly, for their opponents took good care to get their supporters on Bell Island to their respective booths in time for voting. The contest, as I have stated, resulted in a tie. This unprecedented occurrence in Parliamentary affairs moved Sir Robert Bond to ask His Excellency the Governor to issue a writ, at a convenient date, for a new General Election, so as to break the deadlock. This request the Governor refused; his refusal was approved by the then Secretary of State for the Colonies; Sir Robert Bond resigned office, and the leader of the Party which "W. D. Reid," President of the Reid Newfoundland Company, has declared he "financed to defeat Sir Robert Bond's Government," was called upon to form a Government. At this point I deem it important to point out that in the year 1914, five years after the above occurrence, the late Viscount Harcourt, then Secretary of State for the Colonies, emphatically reversed the decision of his predecessor in office, to which I have referred. It occurred in the case of Tasmania, where a crisis turned on the question of the Governor's right to grant or withhold a dissolution of Parliament. The Premier of Tasmania had been defeated on a single vote, and had asked the Governor to cause a writ to issue for a new election. The Governor refused, whereupon the Prime Minister appealed to the Secretary of State for the Colonies. The Secretary of State at once upheld the constitutional position, caused a despatch to issue commanding the Governor of Tasmania to "accept unquestionably the advice of his Prime Minister," adding that "the Governor of a British Dominion is bound to follow the advice of his Ministers in respect to any question of internal politics." (See Secy of State's despatch, July, 1914.) It will be noted, that in the case of Tasmania the Premier had been defeated by one vote; that in the case of Newfoundland the Premier had not even been defeated; yet, in the former case the Governor was ordered to do his duty, while in the case of Newfoundland he was commended for not doing his duty. I refer to this matter not for the purpose of paying tribute to the constitutional acumen of Sir Robert Bond, but to indicate the influences that were working together for a common purpose, in connection with which the building of the Branch Lines of Railway was but a mere incident. The Election occurred on the 4th November, 1908. Three months later the Premier pointed out to the Governor "the utter futility of any Ministry attempting to conduct parliamentary business under the circumstances in which the electors by poll had placed both parties," and advised that a writ be issued at the earliest convenient date for a new Election. As I have shown, this sound advice was constitutionally rejected by the Governor, and thereupon Sir Robert Bond's Ministry resigned. Between the date of Sir Robert's resignation and the acquisition of power by the Political Party which the President of the Reid Newfoundland Company has declared he financed, for the purpose of defeating the Bond Ministry, much of great moment, occurred. Let me quote briefly from public records what Sir Robert Bond, over his own signature, declared did occur, he says:- "When the power to conduct public business was put to the test in the House of Assembly on the 30th March, and the Government (Morrison's Government) were defeated, I had no reason to suppose that the Governor would retain them in office; on the contrary, I had reason, based upon constitutional precedents, as well as other reasons, for believing that His Excellency would recall his former Ministers."-(As a matter of fact the Governor had promised to do so, and that was why Sir Robert Bond resigned. It was to afford him an opportunity to test the possibility, under any men he might call to his Council, to conduct business in the House of Assembly.) "But the conduct of the General Election was confined to my political opponents." "During the month that elapsed between the date of the acquisition of the Government by my political opponents, and that on which their power was tested in the House of Assembly, an attempt was made to purchase, with large sums of money, several members returned to support my Government." (The sworn statements of those members are in my custody.) "My political opponents an injustice when I say that the enormous sums offered my followers could not have been provided by themselves, and must have been placed at their disposal by others who command wealth, and who are desirous through them of controlling the Government and Legislature of this country." (Please note that the President of the Reid Newfoundland Company in his letter to Lord Shaughnessy indicated where some, at least, of the money came from.) "I do not hesitate to say that those in temporary control of the Government are but the instruments of others, some of whom are outside this Colony, and whose ultimate aim is to bring Newfoundland into the Canadian Dominion by fair means or foul." "I only do my duty when I declare that within the past three months an attempt has been made by parties anxious for union between this Colony and Canada to take advantage of the political situation here to bring about a fusion of parties with a view to 'Confederation, and before my Government resigned we were urged to adopt this course by men high in position in Canada who furnished assurances of ability to direct and control the action of my political opponents. This conspiracy, which had the countenance of some who are high in authority was spurned by myself and colleagues. Following upon the rejection of that proposal a determined attempt was made to purchase the support of members of my party, and there is not the faintest shadow of a doubt in my mind that the money that was forthcoming for that purpose was to be furnished by those who boasted of their ability to control the action of my political opponents." (See Evening Telegram, April 17, 1909.) But, Sir Robert Bond only set forth in that statement a portion of the conspiracy. On public platforms in Brigus, Harbor Grace, Carbonear, and elsewhere he challenged the Governor to deny the truth of that statement, and affirmed that the Governor was fully aware of the facts. (See Report of extracts from Sir Robert's speech published in Evening Telegram during April issues 1909). Further details I shall now supply, having authority to quote from documents in my custody. (To be continued.)

**At the House.**

**SHORT SESSION FOR DISCUSSION OF ESTIMATES.**

Short session since the House commenced was held yesterday with a brief recess for tea, until 1.30. There were several questions on the Order Paper of more or less interest.

Michael Cashin was told by the Minister that the trucks, which were used on the notorious mine at South Branch had cost \$1,000. These are now stored at the Government wharves. They are unable to sell them. They are to be used for jorjoring on the highway. This road, by the way, has not yet come before the Government for consideration, nor is it to be seen.

**DO NOT SEE AUDITORS.**

Minister of Finance informed the Opposition that he had interviewed the firm of auditors who had sent representatives down to St. John's at the request of the Government. Had the Minister heard of any scandals that wanted clearing up, Sir Michael, Mr. Brown, and Mr. Higgins caused some mild amusement by reading some grocery receipts of public institutions to the House to prove that the inmates were not so well off as they were supposed to be. Surprised was expressed by the Minister that he had not sampled the receipts and wines provided to such institutions as had asked for them.

Prime Minister's lengthy extension of his route during a recent tour of Canada and the United States, Mr. Moore to express surprise that the trip could be done so cheaply. Honour the Speaker's famous speech on Norway was also the subject of discussion. This had been answered.

**OBJECTS TO SITE.**

The House went into Committee on Supply. Mr. Higgins very rightly objected to the erection of the proposed Normal School on the Parade. This, he contended, would be a violation of rights of citizenship of St. John's and he would object to the utmost limit of his power. The Municipal Charter passed stated definitely that the Parade was to be used for no other purpose. In any case, as Mr. Higgins pointed out, the location was not suitable for such a purpose as a Normal School. The Minister of Education, said Mr. Higgins, designated "the wise of the Government party." Surely last gone mad too.

**DEPARTMENT UNNECESSARY.**

Department itself is not needed, said the member for St. John's. He would not deny that if we afford it, a Department of Education might be valuable. Unfortunately, it should be done away with. If it were not for the fact that the Hon. Dr. Barnes had been a candidate at the polls in the general election, it was not of the man being given the job, but of the portfolio being given to the man. He said that had not been a school in the Island had benefited through the influence of an Education Department. Information had been given him by former teachers.

**WORDS OF LEARNED LENGTH.**

Minister of Education replied to Higgins in a manner reminiscent of Goldsmith's Village School, from whose lips issued "words of length and thundering." His defence of his policy was to mind a little verse which was in the Telegram last Fall, in the building that is known as the Education Minister allots services and to other men, unworthily to go to school again.

Delivered into ancient history with business which was proof of the fact that he realized that no other man knew sufficient concerning the facts of his dates. It must be admitted, however, that certain statements were sound, common sense and were this country much wealthier than it is ever likely to be. Ideas might work out in practice. His faith in the value of the school could not be shaken, he said, if the schools were to be closed, the country would be a better training beyond progress could be made. The Minister was quite correct in his statement to the effect that a large proportion of teachers throughout the Island were unqualified to perform their duties through lack of education. The children of this country, Mr. Barnes, are its greatest asset. They should have their minds developed in a manner that will cause them to be useful citizens. He declared that it was untrue that the Department of Education had been established in haste.

task of explaining any details in connection with this department, as he could not have done more than enquire into the surface of its workings. Sir Michael Cashin very naturally asked who was going to supply the House with information about the Marine Department when the Minister was absent. Mr. Walsh took occasion to pass a few remarks in connection with the state of affairs, which have existed in the Department for some time. After severely criticizing the conduct of the department, Mr. Walsh passed on to the matter of fishery supplies and laid emphasis on the necessity of an immediate enquiry into this scandal. The Port Union Council of the P. U. had passed resolutions condemning the Board of Trade and lauding the Government, despite the fact that their President was responsible for the present depression. Mr. Walsh concluded with a strong appeal for reduced taxation.

**A DISGRACEFUL SITUATION.**

MR. BENNETT also voiced his regret at the absence of Hon. Mr. Cooker, and the fact that there was no one in the House qualified to explain the vote for the Marine and Fisheries Department. It was a disgraceful situation and should be brought to the notice of the Government. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries should be the principal adviser of the Prime Minister at the coming Conference between the Government and the Board of Trade. He was pleased to see the vote for the Game and Inland Fisheries Board had been restored. Referring to Dr. Curtis' letter in last night's Telegram sent the Parade Ground, Mr. Bennett said he would oppose the erection of the Normal School there, and would favor its use as a recreation only.

Mr. Moore asked what attitude the Government were taking in the matter of fishing supplies and reduced taxation. The Prime Minister said he was not in a position to make a pronouncement on this matter until after the meeting between the Government and the Board of Trade which takes place to-day, and at which there will probably be more wool pulled over the eyes of the Committee. Several other speeches were made during the night session but pressure on space prevents a report on them to-day. The House adjourned at 2.45 a.m., until 3 p.m. Tuesday.

**Boy Scouts Association**

**DOMINION COUNCIL.**

The final meeting for the organization of a Dominion Council for the supervision of the work of the Boy Scouts in Newfoundland was held at Government House on Tuesday afternoon of this week. This meeting completed the work of two previous meetings held earlier in the winter for the same purpose. There were present:—Rev. Dr. Flynn, representing the Archbishop of St. John's; His Lordship, the Bishop of Newfoundland; Rev. L. Curtis; Rev. E. W. Forbes; Dr. W. W. Blackall; Dr. V. P. Burke; Commander F. M. Kerr; Mr. W. H. Peters, General Treasurer; Mr. James Murdoch, Assistant Commissioner; Mr. J. J. O'Grady, District Commissioner; Mr. C. P. Ayre; Hon. Tasker Cook, M. L. C., and Mr. R. S. Furlong, General Secretary.

H. E. the Governor, Chief Scout and President of the Council occupied the Chair. The following gentlemen were co-opted to membership in the Council:—The Archbishop of St. John's; The Lord Bishop of Newfoundland; President of the Methodist Conference; Rev. B. T. Holden, Pastor of the Congregational Church; Dr. W. W. Blackall; Dr. L. Curtis; Dr. V. P. Burke; Mr. W. H. Peters; Commander F. M. Kerr; Mr. C. P. Ayre; Hon. Tasker Cook; Mr. Harold Macpherson. The following officers were elected:—Vice-President Dr. W. W. Blackall; Treasurer, Mr. W. H. Peters; Secretary, Mr. R. S. Furlong; Executive Committee:—H. E. the Governor, President of the Council; Dr. W. W. Blackall; Mr. W. H. Peters; Mr. R. S. Furlong; Rev. E. W. Forbes, Chief Commissioner; Mr. James Murdoch, Assistant Commissioner, and Dr. V. P. Burke. Three other places on the Executive will be filled at a later date.

A formal vote of thanks was extended to the following gentlemen for their work on behalf of the movement in the country:—Drs. Blackall, Curtis, and Burke; Mr. James Murdoch; Rev. E. W. Forbes; the late Lieut. Commander Fenn, R. N., and Commander Kerr, R. N., O. B. E. The Treasurer in consultation with the officers was authorized to prepare a budget to be presented at the next meeting of the Executive Committee. A Committee was appointed to confer with the publishers of the "Fleur-de-Lis," regarding its adoption as the official organ of the Council.

With regard to the districts over which Local Associations shall have jurisdiction it was agreed that they be defined for the present only provisionally and finally determined with the concurrence of the District Commissioners affected. Local Associations are now organized in the following places:—Bay Roberts; District Commissioner, Mr. C. E. Russell, Harbour Grace, Grand Falls. At the close of the meeting the following motion was carried unanimously:—"That this Council record its high appreciation of the services rendered the Association in Newfoundland by the present Chief Scout, H. E. the Governor. "The Governor, in thanking the Council for such expression of its appreciation also wished to have placed on record his recognition of the valuable work in former years by Mr. James Murdoch, who was the pioneer of the movement.

The meeting was united in its convictions as to the value of scouting for the training of the boys of the community. The greatest harmony and enthusiasm prevailed throughout, and such a gathering augurs well for the future of the Boy Scout Movement in Newfoundland. Following is the status of the work throughout the country at present:—St. John's, 3 scout troops; Gower St., St. Bona and Con-troops; Gower St., St. Bona and Con-troops; Gower St. and Bishop Spencer Col-lege. There are also Troops at Har-bour Grace, Bay Roberts, Grand Falls, Smith's Sound (Trinity Bay), Spring-date and Joe Batt's Arm. The gen-eral direction of the work is in the hands of the Dominion Council who authorize the appointment of all Scoutmasters and other responsible officers. Forms for the purposes of all organizations are furnished to any person desiring to organize a troop, and complying with conditions on ap-plication to the organizing secretary, Mr. James Murdoch, St. John's. The supervision of local troops is in the hands of local associations appointed in the territory in which these troops are located.

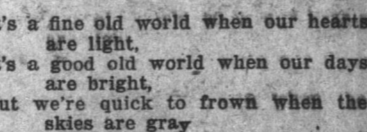

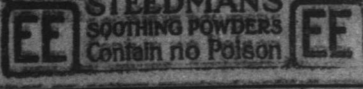

REGARDING WINDOW DRAPERIES.

Have you of this generation better taste than people had a generation ago? Or does it just seem better taste because it is our taste?

There are many directions in which it seems to me that we, the people, as a whole, commit fewer offences against the laws of beauty and taste, but there is one matter in which I am sure we do better, and that is in our choice of window draperies.

Do you remember the heavy lace curtains that were the ideal of a generation ago? We didn't all have them in our parlors, to be sure, but the rich had them. The poor had cheap imitations, and the class between hoped to have the real thing someday when their ship came in.

And weren't they the most hideous, futile, dusty, unlovely things for which the heart of woman ever longed, or the labor of man was ever spent?

I am a great student of window draperies. By their curtains you shall know them is one of my firm tenets. I think there is nothing else about a house as seen from the outside that so surely indexes those who dwell within as the window draperies. And it is a great joy to me to see how the public taste is improving on this point.

To Be Plied, not Blamed.

Recently I walked down one of the finest streets in one of our big cities, taking special note of the window draperies. I saw but three samples of the heavy lace curtain, and two of these were in houses whose general appearance was one which indicated that the occupants were probably using the same curtains they had 20 years ago and were therefore more to be plied than blamed.

For the rest, there were many types of curtains, mostly of the sheer soft materials that fall in beautiful lines, do not shut out the sun, and give themselves readily to washing. A few had lace motifs in them but these were exceptions. Most of the upstairs curtains were muslin, many of them with the simple little ruffle edging.

And all this on a street where the homes must cost from 20 to 50 thousand dollars!

Taste More Important Than Cost.

Of all these curtains the only ones that were costly were the yellow silk with the green overhangings. The blue gingham cost 20 cents a yard. One is the skirt that almost touches the ground and makes walking an effort and gathers to itself a rich harvest of dust and germs. The other is the heavy, ugly, light absorbing lace curtain.

**Nurse Gives Her Life in Devotion to Duty.**

MADELINE ST. JOHN, CARING FOR PNEUMONIA PATIENTS, IS FATALLY STRICKEN.

Funeral services were held to-day in the chapel of St. John's Hospital, Long Island City, for Miss Madeline St. John, a nurse of the Hospital. Requiem Mass was celebrated by Father Higgins, chaplain of the Hospital.

Miss St. John had been one of the most efficient nurses at the hospital and was in charge of patients suffering from pneumonia. She was very successful in caring for them, and the hospital physicians say the recovery of a number of desperate cases was due entirely to her devotion to them. A week ago she was stricken with pneumonia. From the first the surgeons and physicians were fearful of the outcome, owing to her condition, produced by her long and faithful vigilance with the patients under her care. The best and most expert attention at the disposition of the hospital, was given her, but she succumbed.

Before she died Miss St. John requested that she be buried from the hospital and that her body lie in state in the parlors of the hospital. The services to-day were attended by the Sisters of St. Joseph in charge of the hospital, nurses and members of the medical and surgical staff. Interment was at Calvary Cemetery.

Miss St. John was 24 years old. She was born in St. John's Newfoundland, and came to St. John's Hospital Training School a year and a half ago. Her mother, Mrs. Ellen St. John, accompanied her and lives at Forty-sixth street, Corona. She is survived by a sister in Manhattan and a brother in Chicago.—Brooklyn Standard.

**The Father of the English Novel.**

Henry Fielding, son of Lieutenant-General Edmund Fielding—called Sir Walter Scott, "The Father of the English Novel," was born at Shrapton Park, near Glastonbury, on April 22, 1707, and after an education at Eton—where Fox and Lytton were among his friends—he went to Leyden University, and remained there for two years, when his father's poverty compelled him to return to London. In his own words, he had to turn "either hackney writer or hackney coachman," so choosing the former alternative, he began to write comedies and farces; his first comedy,

ardson's "Pamela," appeared at this time, his wife, to whom he was passionately attached, died. He was limited, but he struggled to make a living by journalism. 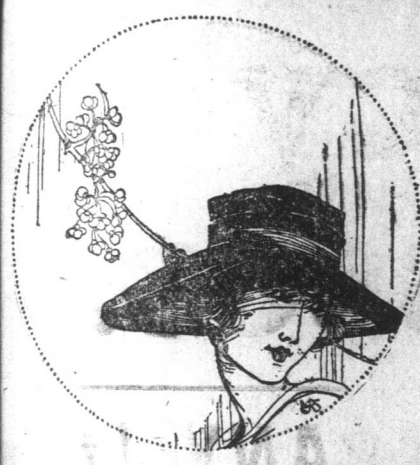

## "St. George He Was for England."

April 23rd, the Day of England's Patron Saint.

"St. George he was for England. And before he killed the dragon He drank a pint of English ale Out of an English flag."

I am afraid that England has been sadly neglected of her patron saint. You will scarcely find an Irishman in any part of the world who does not know that March 17th is the Feast of St. Patrick. But how many Englishmen are there who could tell you off-hand that April 23rd is St. George's Day—and, by a glorious coincidence, Shakespeare's birthday to boot? Not many, I fear.

### "THE ODDIOUS STRANGER."

Not is forgetfulness the worst injury that St. George has had to suffer at the hands of posterity. John Gairin, the prince of iconoclasts, denied his existence altogether, while the sceptical Gibbon identified him with a swindling Arrian army contractor—one George of Cappadocia. "The odious stranger," he wrote, "disguising every circumstance of time and place, assumed the mask of a martyr, a saint, and a Christian hero; and the infamous George of Cappadocia has been transformed into the renowned St. George of England, the patron of arms, of chivalry, and of the Garter."

The historian of the Roman Empire's decline and fall was, however, for once speaking without his book. As a matter of fact, George of Cappadocia laid down his inglorious life in the year 361, or about seventy years before the martyrdom of England's patron saint.

### THE DRAGON EPISODE.

There is good reason to believe in the historicity of St. George, though I am afraid that in a rationalistic age like this we must be content to relegate the dragon episode to the limbo of legend; and even the "pint of English ale," on which Mr. G. K. Chesterton strongly insists, is of doubtful authenticity. He—St. George I mean—is said to have been born towards the close of the third century at Lydda, in Palestine, where his father was Governor of the city. His family came from Cappadocia, a circumstance which is, no doubt, accountable for Gibbon's strange error.

While still young he entered the army, was raised by the Emperor Diocletian to the rank of tribune, and probably served under Galerius in the Persian War, after which he appears to have returned to Beirut. There is a tradition—unhappily it is nothing more—that he was sent by Diocletian to Britain.

It was at Beirut (or, as it was then called, Berytus) however, that the famed encounter with the dragon took place, and, according to a modern writer on the subject, "the well is shown into which he cast the monster, and the spot where he washed the blood from his hands." His conversion to Christianity ultimately cost him his life. He refused to make sacrifices to the gods, and, after a week of tortures, was beheaded on a Good Friday.

Such, as related by Eusebius, are the main facts in the life-history of George of Lydda, and though they are lacking of corroborative testimony, there seems no reason to doubt their substantial accuracy.

Certain it is that there was a cult of St. George from the very earliest times. A church in South Syria dedicated to his memory, is said to date from the year A. D. 346; while the Emperor Justinian built a magnificent church in his honour at Lydda. In the east, indeed, the memory of St. George has always been held in high honour.

He is venerated even by the Mohammedans, who believe that the soul of the prophet El-Khadr passed successively into Phineas, Elijah, and St. George.

So far as England is concerned, the cult of St. George appears to have taken its origin in the Crusades. Gurahantee monarch, Richard Cœur de Lion, while in the Isle of Cyprus, became acquainted with the story of St. George, and immediately adopted him as patron of himself and of his army. Henceforward—for three hundred years at least—"God and St. George" was to become the English war-cry. His festival was ordered to be kept throughout England by a Council held at Oxford in 1222, churches, bearing his dedication springing up throughout the country, and late in the fifteenth century, Henry VII. chose him as his principal patron.

### RECOVERING HIS POSITION.

When came the Reformation, and with it the overthrow of so many of the ancient loyalties. St. George was among the first to suffer.

In the eighteenth century St. George again fell into dispute.

Happily, there is every indication that in our own day England's patron saint is once more recovering his position in the national regard. On April 23rd the Red Cross of St. George will fix from countless steeples, as a reminder of the fact that beneath that banner some of England's mightiest victories have been fought—and won.—T. MICHAEL POPE, in John O'London's Weekly.

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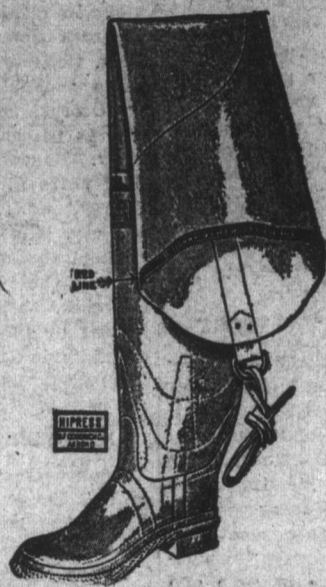

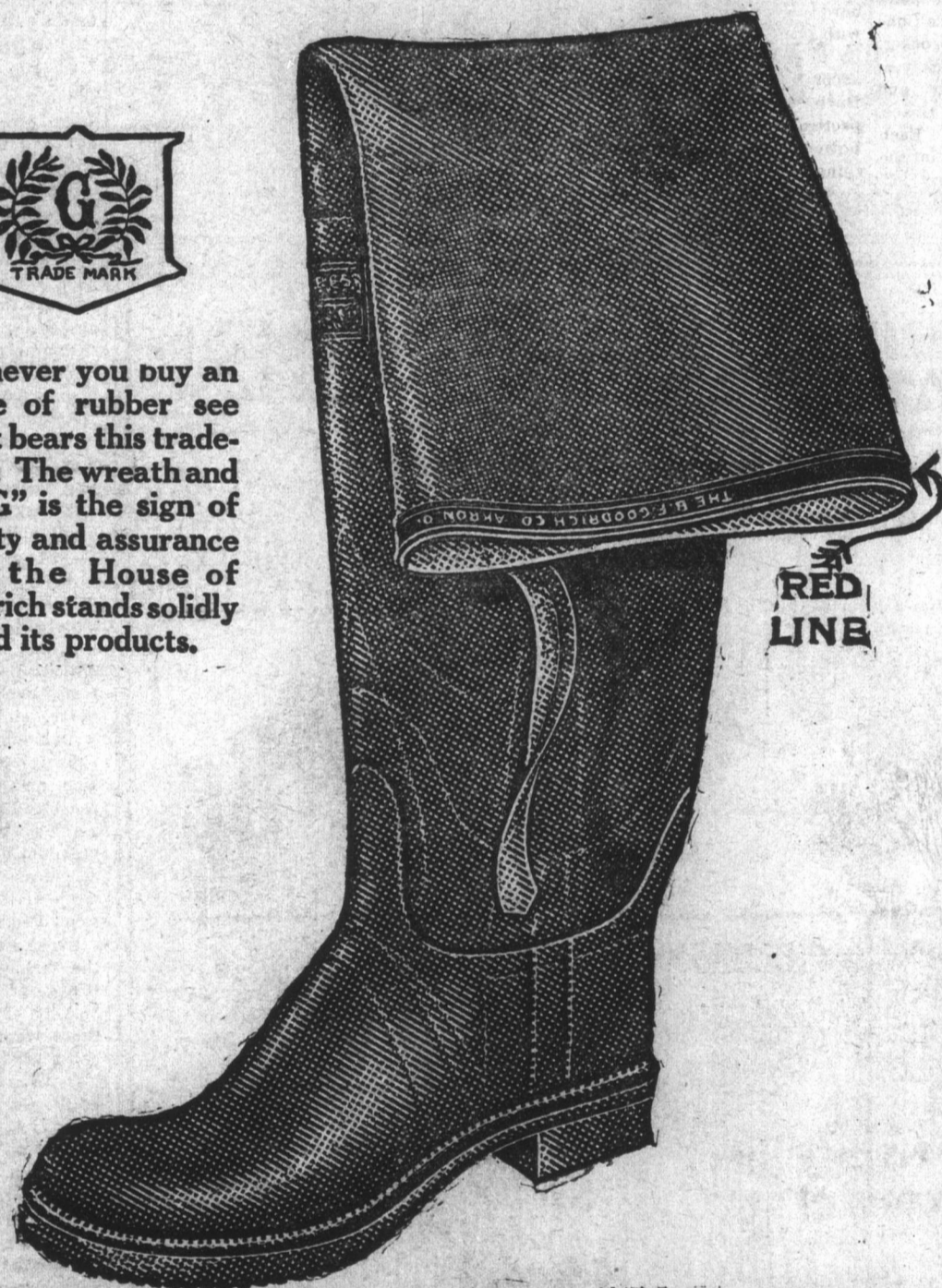

There was not a business man among the men in the Spring, less than fifty before Jim Holloway had winter quarters, Ryan's business at King's Cove had fully equipped, and ready

for the "French Shore." Michael the clerk was sent in the schooner as the financial representative of the firm, with special instructions to buy all the seals and fur between Cape John and Cape Norman; but in no case was he to pay any cash. Those were years of hard times along the "Treaty Coast," and the first trader was hailed with delight by the settlers, who were short of everything—especially to baco.

In due time Mr. Ryan's Trader reached Engles and in addition to the good business that Michael did there in seals and fur, he got inside information of the whereabouts and ownership of every seal's pelt; and the number and owner and colour of every fox skin along the Shore. From Engles they pushed on through the slack ice, and eventually reached St. Julien's; where, in exchange for goods, they secured every seal and every bit of fur in the place. At the entrance of St. Julien's is a cove known as Celot, where a family of Davises was living. John Davis and his four sons were good furriers, and usually had a good skin or two to tempt the Trader with. Michael learned at St. Julien's that this year they had several skins, and amongst them one beautiful Black Fox skin. Michael also knew from experience what a hard bargain the Davises could drive; with the Trader who betrayed his anxiety to possess their furs, and he acted accordingly. Michael knew that the Davises were watching him and expect- ing him to call on them. When, however, he had cleaned up every- thing at St. Julien's, Michael, who was a clever salesman, but with a limited knowledge of fur—said to the skipper of the schooner: "Holt away on the mainland." The seal was not half way up when, sure enough, four of the Davises were seen coming off in an old punt. Michael pretended that he was in no way interested in them, and he gave the order "Heave away on the windlass, skipper." As the windlass began to operate, old man Davis stood up in the old punt and shouted, and waved his arms like a windmill. "What do you fellows want?" "Oh," Davis said, "we got some fur." "Fur is not worth buying this year," said Michael, and without pretending to

notice Davis, Michael sang out: "Heave away on the windlass, boys."

Michael appeared to be in a great hurry to get away from St. Julien's, and Davis wanted to sell his fur. "Holt away the foresail, skipper," said Michael. "But," said Davis, "Mr. F—are you not going to buy my fur?" "What kind of fur have you got?" asked Michael. Davis replied "We have three yellow foxes and two black ones." "What do you want for them," asked Michael. "I will give you a barrel of flour for the lot." "Oh, no Mr. F,—I can't do that." "All right," said Michael, "Heave away on the windlass, skipper." "Oh, but Mr. F," said Davis, "look at this black fox, he is worth 500." "I don't want it," said Michael, "foxes are no good this year." "Well," said Davis, "give me a barrel of flour and a pound of haccy, and you can have them." "Avast heaving there boys," said Michael to the windlass man, "and give this man a barrel of flour; and here," he said to Davis, "here's your pound of haccy," and off went Davis. Michael was de- lighted, and so was Davis. Michael thought he had got the better of Davis, and Davis, (for reason that the reader will learn later) knew that he had got the better of Michael.

Michael was very proud of his "Black Fox Skin." He had made a good trading trip, and had got clear of a good deal of old stuff—to use Michael's own words "what they would not otherwise have done." So they bore up for home and got back to King's Cove the first week in June, and after taking on board some seals that had been bought by the agent there, they left for St. John's. Before leaving for St. John's Michael told the owners that he had done a black fox skin at a bargain price. Messrs. Shirran, Pippy, & Co. had always bought their furs, and were good judges of real value, so Michael took the stock to them for examination and to be valued. Mr. Shirran took the skins one by one, and made some careful mental notes. When he came to the black one, he looked at it, smiled and put it on one side. When Mr. Shirran had satisfied himself about the value of the furs, he made his best offer for the pile of reds and silver-grays. The offer was a good one and Michael was satisfied with it. His thoughts, however, were on the black fellow; and he said "All right, Mr. Shirran; and now for the black beauty. What will you give for it?" Some one to whom Patrick showed the skin (acting upon a first-of-April custom of sending the fool farther) told Patrick that the Bishop used to buy black fox skins. With this information Patrick fortified himself and called on the Bishop, produced the skin, and asked his Lordship if he would buy a fine black fox skin. The Bishop examined the skin, looked very cross, and asked Patrick who he was, where he had come from, and who had sent him. Patrick could not remember the name of the man on Water Street who had sent him to the Bishop. His Lordship gave Patrick a severe reprimand, and told him that if he was not had himself, he was the victim of a bad adviser—and Patrick well might swooned, when the Bishop told him that he could be prosecuted for trying to sell the skin of a black hound, and representing it (knowingly or unknowingly) as a fox-skin. Patrick was not long in getting back to the schooner, thoroughly ashamed of himself; and it was only when he told Michael what the Bishop had told him about the cat-skin, that Michael realized that old man Davis had intentionally fooled him.

Michael had the good sense to see that he had learned a valuable lesson in the school of experience, so he "took his medicine" like a man, and took the Cat-skin back with him to King's Cove. With the tacit understanding that it was "a fox-skin," he hung it up in the office, where at a distance it looked so fine, that those who saw it there took it for granted that it was a fox-skin all right. In the meantime Michael said nothing, but like "Mr. Micawber," he waited for something to turn up. Something did turn up, too, considerably to Michael's financial benefit—the details of which will be given in next week's items. (For shame, most worthy scribbler, breaking off like this.—Editor.)

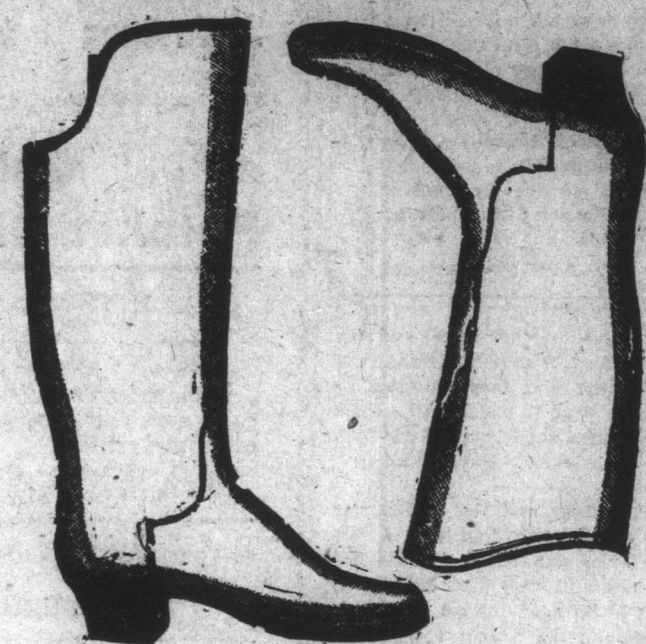
