Town and County News

Her Majesty's plate of fifty guineas is to be competed for at Ottawa this year.

The weather has been unusually mild in Quebec.

The Milton curlers are in Guelph today playing the Guelph men.

Two cases of small pox have already proved fatal in Bradford. Those who have been attacked, so far, are coloured people.

Scarlet fever of a severe type is prevalent in the neighborhood of Mono Mills. Mr. Thos. Speers lost three fine children by the malady, two on the same day, and one a few days after.

The indecent assault case.—Thos. Hoban on Saturday was sentenced to three months at hard labor in the common jail for committing an assault with intent on Mary Wadding.

Sentenced.—At the Interim Sessions on Saturday Benjamin Mapletiff alias Plant, who pled guilty to breaking into the house of Isaac Dingman, on the 19th January, 1871, was sentenced to 3 years in the penitentiary.

A despatch from Toronto says that arrangements were made at the meeting of the creditors of the Telegraph on Saturday, whereby \$40,000 debt are wiped out, five years given to pay the balance, and Mr. Robertson's services to be retained under the superintendence of A. Dredge.

The Hamilton and Hog Bay Railway.—A large and influential meeting was held at Collingwood on Friday night in connection with the Hamilton & Hog Bay Railway scheme. It was unanimously resolved to ask the projectors of that railway to fix their northern terminus at Collingwood, instead of Hog Bay.

The late Wm. Verney.—Dr. McGregor, who was called to see Wm. Verney immediately after his death on Saturday morning, acquainted Dr. Keating with the circumstances connected therewith, but the Doctor after hearing them, did not consider it was necessary to hold an inquest, as the cause of death was beyond doubt. As will be seen by the notice, the deceased will be buried to-morrow afternoon.

A counterfeiter.—A few days ago an individual calling himself James Lake appeared in Windsor, and excited some of the business men by the declaration that he proposed to erect a twenty-thousand-dollar flouring mill next spring. He selected several sites, lived high at one of the hotels, tried to borrow considerable money, and succeeded in getting some, and Monday left the place, leaving no word for anyone, not even the landlord, who had offered him an acre of ground below its par value, and who was "out" for a week's board.

Visit to Hespeler.—A number of Toronto wholesale merchants arrived at Hespeler on Saturday forenoon by special car, for the purpose of examining the extent and resources of Randall, Farr & Co's woollen mills, as well as that of Farr, Long & Brisby. The party included the Hon. F. N. Blake, U. S. Consul of Hamilton. After making a complete survey of these mills, which were in operation, and having expressed themselves highly gratified, the party were invited to dine at the residence of Mr. Farr, one of the members of both firms, where a most pleasant time was spent. The number of hands employed in the first mill is about 200. All these are engaged in making worsted, knitted and alpaca goods. The other mill employs about twenty hands in turning out worsted coatings and alpaca brands.

Serious accident.—Mr. Alex. McLachlan, of Rockside, Caledon, met with a serious accident on Friday the 9th. He was engaged in sinking a well, and when thus employed was under the necessity of blasting the rock. The fuse being lighted he withdrew, but so long an interval having taken place without any explosion he supposed that the fuse had become extinguished and becoming impatient, approached to ascertain the cause, and while stooping with this object, the blast went off, when a piece of rock struck him on the upper part of the forehead, over the left eye. Medical assistance having been obtained it was found necessary to remove a part of the bone or skull, which he believes has been substituted by a suitable piece of silver plate. The membrane of the brain having sustained no injury, great hopes are entertained of his recovery.

Toronto Grey & Bruce Railway.

GREAT COMPLAINTS OF ITS MANAGEMENT.

From the Crangville Advertiser.

We very much regret to find that the "great expectations" entertained by our people with regard to the railway have been disappointed, and that our business men are suffering great loss in consequence of the gross mismanagement which has characterized it. When the road first opened, we were willing to overlook shortcomings on account of inexperience and other considerations which are inseparably connected with all new enterprises. The road has been in operation a sufficient length of time, however, to enable the managers to get matters into thorough working order, but we regret to find that the accommodation is getting worse, and the complaints of delay are becoming more loud and numerous every day. Our merchants here were all prepared to do their part in promoting the prosperity of our village, and they showed a commendable enterprise in making arrangements to purchase farm produce of all kinds at the very highest rates. So soon as the roads became good for sleighing, the produce began to come in rapidly, our streets were filled with teams, and a very large business was done. The next matter was to get the produce shipped; the storehouses became full, every place that could be obtained was secured for storehouses, but still there was no room, and no prospect of getting it off, and very reluctantly our merchants were compelled to stop buying. Farmers came long distances with their grain, but could not sell it when they came here, and our market was greatly injured. The result is, our merchants have large amounts of money invested in grain, which they are unable to send away, and they are not only deprived of the use of the money, but also run the risk of a falling market. Not only is this the case respecting the carrying of freight to Toronto, but it is almost as bad for us to get goods from there. Merchandise has taken eight to twelve days from Toronto to Orangeville. It is no wonder that people complain under these circumstances. "The good roads that we had, have had, we would have been far better off without the railway. Under the old system, arrangements were made for teaming goods to and from this place which prevented such a disappointment as we have experienced this year. Depending on the railway, however, the arrangements were not made, and the consequence is that our business is made to suffer. There is no doubt but that there has been very bad management somewhere, and it is the duty of the directors to enquire into the matter. With the means at the disposal of the Company, there is no reason why the road should not be made to answer all the requirements of the public. We trust that the Hamilton scheme may be pushed forward at once, so that we shall not be obliged to depend solely upon the "Narrow Gauge." If there is not a change in the present management, we are afraid that the "gauge" will be condemned for the faults of the incompetent men who have got control of it.

Broad Gauge and Blue Line Freight Cars.

In the early history of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railroad, the promoters very wisely adopted the gauge of the Great Western, thereby securing a connection with the Great Western and the United States lines; and at all the meetings, Mr. Brown, Col. McGivern, and their coadjutors, advocated that the people residing in Wellington, Grey and Bruce Counties, should not be confined to the local market of Toronto, but that they should avail themselves of the through rail system by taking advantage not only of the Canadian, but also of the American and European markets. The Directors of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Road have the proud satisfaction to-day in announcing to the produce trade that arrangements have been completed with W. K. Muir, Esq., the Superintendent of the Great Western Railroad, whereby the Blue Line cars will run over the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Road from Walkerton to New York, or any city in the States. We have much pleasure in stating that our Hamilton produce dealers are now shipping grain direct from Walkerton to Clifford, via Liverpool, via New York on through bills of lading, and that there has been shipped, this week, some 20,000 bushels of grain, which will be delivered in Liverpool within thirty days from the time of leaving Walkerton. We well remember Mr. Laidlaw and his associates from Toronto, denouncing the arrangements of our scheme for stating that grain would be carried to the sea-board without breaking the bulk, asserting that the value of the property would all be eaten up by the freight, and that it was only a piece of Hamilton deception to palm off such statements; also that those could be shipped to realize its full value. We have always contended that the ratepayers acted wisely in choosing the Great Western gauge, and we are glad that they are now realizing the result of the selection made by them in the adoption of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce line.—Hamilton Times.

Tranz Paisley weavers, whose wives were quartered at Gourick for the season, were anxious to get across Dunoon one Sabbath morning. Deeming it a profanation, however, to employ an oared-boat for that purpose, they employed a friend to negotiate with the captain of the Rothsay mail steamer "to cast out a bit of his tow, and tak' them 'wim, as he was gaun down that way at one rate." Gladstone Dining Shenck.

The Rowing Match Challenge Accepted.

The Thanksgiving Services.

London, Feb. 19, 5 a. m.—Gladstone entertained Shenck, the American Minister, at dinner on Saturday evening.

The London Rowing Club accepted the challenge of the Atlanta Club of New York to row a race with four-oared boats on the Thames in June.

Thanksgiving services will also be held in Cathedral St. Patrick, in Dublin, on the 27th inst.

Madrid, Feb. 18.—The Ministry has resigned, and Sagasta will probably be intrusted with the task of forming a new ministry. Considerable agitation prevails.

Cincinnati, Feb. 18.—Hon. George H. Pendleton fell at his residence on Saturday and sprained his ankle. He will be unable to leave his room for several months.

French Immigrants.—The report of the intended emigration to Canada of French families from the conquered provinces of Alsace and Lorraine, is confirmed by intelligence from the agent of the Dominion Government, who says that several hundred families will leave in the spring with the intention of settling in the Province of Quebec. War always effects many changes, and the expatriation of the native French from the provinces now under German domination is one of the important changes now going on as a result of the war. Many are leaving for France; others are leaving Europe altogether and taking up a fresh home either in the United States or Canada. The arrival of the exiles in Quebec will be looked forward to as a very interesting event, and our warm-hearted French speaking fellow-colonists of the lower provinces will be sure to make it the occasion of a hearty demonstration of welcome. We in Upper Canada and other parts of the Dominion may be well satisfied to see the sister province benefited by the arts and the enterprise which the French emigrants have in their power to bring into the country.—Kingston News.

Starved to Death.—Mr. Robert Vandenberg, one of the oldest citizens of Oakland, was taken ill nearly a year since. He persisted in refusing to take any remedies. His children urged him to have a physician, as also did friends and neighbors, but did not prevail on him to do so. Having lived eleven months without medical aid, two weeks since Mr. Vandenberg decided that he would live without eating, and from that he judiciously refused to take any kind of nourishment. His eccentricity in this particular astonished everybody, for his circle of friends and acquaintances was large; besides, his children stood by the bedside and saw him sinking into the grave day by day. When the time man can live without nourishment—"at eight days," said Mr. Vandenberg, "at the way of all the living. This occurred last Tuesday. On Thursday following he was buried. It is a funny idea that a man could be induced to abandon eating, but funny things do occur.—Branford News.

NEWS PARAGRAPHS.

It is reported that negotiations relative to the Commercial Treaty between France and England will be resumed.

The activity of the Bonapartists in France is creating considerable excitement in the public mind.

There was a terrible snow storm in the State of Nebraska last week, and a number of persons are reported to have perished.

An American writer calls the ceremony of young ladies kissing each other, "a dreadful waste of the raw material."

California is going into the tree business in earnest. It has hired a State tree planter at a cost of \$15,000 a year and expenses.

A recent letter-writer says that in Berlin out of a population of nearly a million, only about 12,000 persons attend church on Sunday.

At the Hudson's Bay Company's sale of beaver, there were offered 124,000 skins against 152,000 last January, and all found buyers, with good competition.

Out of 1,858 cargoes of timber and other woods imported into London, Eng., in 1871, as many as 138 were from British America; Sweden supplies much the largest quantity.

A new line of steamers to ply between Liverpool and Montreal, is announced in Montreal journals. The first vessel will leave Liverpool on the 13th April next.

The "Hamilton Tool Manufacturing Company" has been formed with a subscribed capital of \$50,000. The site chosen for its operation is near the Great Western Railway station.

The body of Earl Mayo was brought to Calcutta on Saturday, and was met at the dock by an immense number of people. No further particulars are given of the affair.

A correspondent of a New York paper declares that husbands of strong-minded women become nobodies. This is not strictly true, for such husbands are nobodies at the start.

The proprietor of the lions who last sat a man at London, has received so many applications for the vacant position of liontamer that he has been moved to notify the public that no more men will be eaten at his establishment.

American ideas are penetrating the Orient. The American College in Constantinople is now attended by 184 students. This institute is founded by a public-spirited merchant of New York, who has invested in it the accumulations of a lifetime.

A sad affair is reported from Prince Edward Island. Two boys finding on the road a bottle containing a poisonous liquid, drank of it, believing it to be brandy. The mother of one of the boys also drank of it, under the same mistake, and the result was the speedy death of all three.

Gilmore's Grand International Musical Festival, proposed for next June in Boston, is likely to prove successful. That enterprising musician has managed to get wealthy Bostonians sufficiently interested in the project to subscribe \$200,000, and contracts for the building will be given out immediately.

A patient complained to his physician that he was pursued by a ghost the night before, on his way home from the tavern. "What shape was it?" asked the doctor. "In the shape of a jackass," said the man. "Go home," said the physician, "and keep sober. You wore drunk last night, and frightened at your own shadow."

Illinois farmers find that the partridge is a great destroyer of the chinch bug, which is so injurious to wheat fields, and are beginning to protect them from the fowler. One farmer says he has hundreds of tame partridges about his place, and his wheat crops are unusually abundant, while in places not far away the chinch bug commits great ravages. He feeds the birds in winter.

The reported cruel persecution of the Jews in Roumania, almost surpasses belief in these days of religious freedom and toleration. The natives of that country appear to be actually bent upon the most intense hatred towards the unfortunate Hebrews, who are constantly subjected to insult and violence. Their houses are attacked by mobs; murder is frequent, and goes unpunished; and even helpless women and children have fallen victims.

TRAFFIC AT THE GUELPH G. W. R. STATION.

Mr. Brodie, station agent, has sent us the following correct returns of the quantity of produce, &c., shipped from Guelph station over the Great Western Railway for the month of January; also the amount of produce imported from other stations into Guelph for the same period. The exports are:—

Table with 2 columns: Item and Quantity. Includes Wheat (105,000 lbs), Barley (147,000), Flour (2000 barrels), Beef (50 barrels), Salt (1750 barrels), Dressed Hogs (80,150), Lumber (20,000), and Sundries (826,365).

Total... 2,065,365 lbs. Horses, 19; cattle, 39; sheep, 497. The increase in the exports of cattle, horses and sheep over the corresponding month of 1871 is very large; in other articles, the quantity exported as compared with January 1871 is about the same.

The imports into Guelph of all kinds for the month of January, 1872, are 2,697,518 lbs.—freight \$2,974.97; imports for January, 1871, 1,271,923 lbs.—freight \$1,555.39—thus showing the extraordinary increase of 1,418,595 lbs. in one month. This increase is mainly in grain, dressed hogs and general goods.

The number of passengers who left Guelph in January, 1872, are 2,222; for the month of January, 1871, 1,760, showing an increase of 462, and representing in money an increase of \$725.10.

A paragraph has lately been going the rounds of the papers to the effect that the trade of Guelph had greatly fallen off. The above figures will show that the report is totally unfounded. Guelph, in spite of the railroads north, continues to hold its own and a little more.

EDITORIAL ITEMS.

These papers along the line of the Toronto Grey & Bruce Railway complain of great irregularities in the mails, caused by delays on that road.

The Collingwood Enterprise has it on good authority that Mr Dalton Mc Carthy has consented to offer himself as a candidate for the House of Commons for that Riding.

It is believed in Paris that the United States will not waive the Alabama claims. It is believed in other quarters that they will abandon the consequential portion of these claims.

The Hamilton Standard says that a railway deputation was in that city on Friday afternoon from Meaford to secure, if possible, an extension of the Wellington, Grey, and Bruce Railway from Cliffton to Meaford.

Inspired by a noble ambition, Mr Thos. Ferguson made a dash at the leadership of the Tory Opposition on Friday. As a leader he was not a success. On his first attack on the Government he only succeeded in obtaining one vote in the House, and that was his own. His second attack did not even find a seconder, so that it fell to the ground.

OUR STATEMENTS CONFIRMED.—To those who think that we have, without good cause, been abusing the Toronto Grey and Bruce Railway for its many shortcomings, we commend the careful perusal of an article in to-day's paper from the Orangeville Advertiser. The narrow gauge must be in a very bad way indeed, when its own friends are forced, against their will, to denounce it.

The Port Elgin Free Press understands that the Wellington, Grey, and Bruce Railway Company have under consideration, the advisability of running their line on through the Peninsula, or a branch from Paisley across to Owen Sound, so as to have an outlet on the Georgian Bay. The Owen Sound Council have appointed a Committee to consult with the Company.

MR. BLAKE the other day made a handsome public acknowledgment of his confidence in and respect for Mr Mackenzie. Mr Cameron having charged Mr Blake with ambition to take the first place in a larger and more influential assembly than the Ontario Legislature, the Premier denied he had any desire to lead here or elsewhere, and declared that he accepted his present duty with reluctance, and at Ottawa had no wish to be other than a follower of his friend and colleague, Mr Mackenzie, the leader of the party in the House of Commons.

THE SCOTT MURDER AGAIN.—The Scott murder has again been the

subject of discussion in the Manitoba Legislature. Mr Hay enquired of the Ministry, if the Government had ever issued warrants for the apprehension of Reil, Lepine, and O'Donohue for the murder of Scott, and if so what action had been taken in the matter. The Attorney-General replied that no warrants had been issued for the apprehension of those parties, but that the Chief of Police had been authorized "to apprehend a certain party dead or alive." It was only that officer, he added, who knew whether the warrant had been put into execution. Mr Hay then moved that a reward be offered for the apprehension of the murderers and for the recovery of the body of the murdered man. This resolution was opposed by the Government on the ground that they having forwarded the address of the Legislature to the Imperial authorities, proposed to await a reply before taking further action; and it was lost by a vote of eighteen to five.

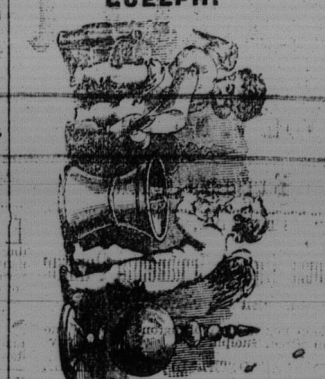
