He was elected for North York by a handsome majority, and though he defeated the regular Reform candidate and was soverely assailed by the Reform press he maintained perfect independence and declined to go to Parliament as a pledged supporter of either party. He has not hesitated to avow that his sympathies are with the Liberals, and it is believed he will vote with the Opposition on a want of confidence motion.
