In a free country like Britain where the right of free speech and open discussion are fully conceded it is not surprising that agitators spring up perionically, whose desire is to unsettle existing institutions, and to inaugurate a new state of affairs altogether. The same pheaffairs altogether. The same phenomenon has been observed since the time when constitutional government had an existence in the old country, but such enthusiastic reformers were not always treated with the leniency and license which are now extended to them. It is within the memory of many now living, when such agitators were often arrested, tried and convicted of sedition—a process of persecution which elevated them to the rank of martyrs to their principles, and tended to gather round them disciples to their doctrines, as enthusiastic as—them selves, and equally hopeful that they were helping to inaugurate a newers in the social or political world. The rulers now-a-days have more liberality and more sense. Perhaps, too, there was a latent desire in their minds for a little notoriety in connection with this Conference, and, if so, then they have been talked about a little, have had a column of heavy ridicule poured on their heads through the Times, and been taken notice of the Mr. John Bright. We don't suppose, howevers that Mr. Bright in response sent a very sensible and outspeken letter, in which he spoke unequivocally in condemnation of the movement, and gave them, to understand that he had no faith in the overthrow of monarchy, but believed that all needed reforms, and the amelioration of the people could be secured under the system by which Britain had risen to its present rank among the matons. Instead, therefore, of words of encouragement, the great Commoner censured their wild dreams and reckless attempt to upset the established system of Government.

Ontario Agricultural College and MONTHLY CATTLE FAIRS. THE

We heartly rejoice that the proposal to establish an Agreuttural College for the Province of Ontario at Mimico, has been finally abandoned. Had it been gone on with, public patience would have been exhausted and an conrunous sum expended, before any practical results could possibly have been obtained.

The precise locality to be selected as the site of the institution seemed to us a very unimportant matter. Of vastly greater moment is it that the land should be of good quality and capable of raising with good tilage, first-rate crops. And even of greater importance is it that the institution should be commenced on a sound, practical system, and have at its head a man thoroughly up to the day in the science and practice of agricultural, of large experience, of considerable force of character, of kindly manners, and with enthusiasm enough in his composition to infuse warmth and vigor into those around him. We hear that the Government intend advertising for a chief superintendent—and we can nestly hopethat the best man available will be appointed without regard to other considerations than thorough efficiency for the post.

We do not understand that any system for the conduct of the institution has yet been definitely settled. We venture to express the hope that when a system is a alopted, the idea of including a scholastic and literary curriculum for the young men within the institution, will be entirely dismissed from it—and that the main object kept in view will be to give useful instruction in the science and practice of agriculture to as large a number of our young men as possible, and sends them back to their homes as soon as possible with, hearty love for the profession of farming; and sound, practical, common sense plans for prosecuting it with vigor. We have already in full and successful operation common schools, grammar schools, and colleges, amply sufficient to supply literary education for all our young farmers were to be seduced from attending our great national institution, and subjected to the disa

dian farmer, and publish them to the world,—Canada Farmer.

Electros Coercion.—A case came before the Court of Queen's Bench at Picton on Friday which ought to be a warning to violent political partizans as to how they attempt coercion in times of excitement. At the last election in Frince Edward, Sully Worden, Esq., a wealthy citizen, carried to the polls to vote for Mr. McCuaig an employee on his farm. The man, however, seems to have been "otherwise minded," and when he got ready to do so, be voted for the man of his choice—Mr. Ross. Mr. Worden does not appear to have resented the course of the voter at the time; but afterwards, when they arrived home, it was shown that he fell upon the victim of his wrath and gave him a serious beating—the final result of which, although so many months have elapsed, is not yet fully demonstrated. The man is crippled, and may be so for life, if more serious consequences do not ensue. Mr. Worden was sued for damages laid at two thous and dollars and prosecuted by R. P. Jellett, Esq., of this town, who recovered the full amount of the claim and costs. It was thought by many who heard the trial that four thousand dallars would have been recovered as easily as two thousand, and that righteously.—Ontaris. Chronicle.
