This attempt to provide a purely secular training for men who have no in-tention of entering the ministry is a piece equipped university for the use of the general public, and meanwhile allow their ors and preachers to eke out a bare

spite of the confident tone of the Rev. Dr. Sutherland and Mr. Justice Rose that the methodist clergy will in any great numbers urge them to do so. If they do they must be admitted to have in them a great deal more of the harmlessness of the dove than of the wisdom of the serpent. Why should the methodist clergy not undertake something of the same sort instead of allowing Dr. Sutherland and Mr. Justice Rose to mislead them into a fatuous university scheme which cannot fail to prove a paralyzing incubus on the church until it is

Our correspondent is right enough how church chooses to undertake other than purely ecclesiastical work it is not for outsiders to complain. Their doing so need be no bar to anion, from a public point of view, and may even be in some sense a public advantage. It is purely a question of methodist expediency, which methodists must be left to settle for themselves.


