MONTRÉAL'S AFFLICTION

MORE ACCOMMODATION YET TO BE PROVIDED.

Nearly Fifty Deaths on Tuesday—St. Roch's Hospital Management to be Criticized—Account of the Evils of the City.

MONTRÉAL, Oct. 28.—The return of the health office show 38 deaths from smallpox in the city yesterday, 3 in Côte St. Louis, 1 in St. Jean Baptista, 1 in St. Gabriel, 1 in St. Côme, and 2 in St. Roch. A case is reported of smallpox at Côte St. Louis, putting the local health officer at defiance by visiting a family, some of the members of which are down with the smallpox.

It was stated that in response to the appeal to the citizens for co-operation in the various branches of work connected with the epidemic, the Canadian Red Cross and one resident of Boston have offered their services. The hospital accommodation sub-committee report was read at the city board of health meeting regarding the building known as the Crystal Palace, which was to be converted into a hospital of 30,000 beds. It is estimated that the building would accommodate 30,000 patients. A kitchen must be organized in the building, and the present Catholic hospital. The cost would be \$4000 and the building could be finished in two months. The report was adopted and the order to be proceeded with at once.
