UNIONISTS TIRE THE IRISH

LATER PROTEST AGAINST YIELDING TO HOME RULE'S ENEMIES

The Conservatives and Liberal-Unionists support the Government on an Amendment to Prevent the Irish Legislature dealing with Immigration and Aliens—Irish Members and Liberals Oppose.

LONDON, June 7.—In the House of Commons today Irish members of both factions took ground against any further yielding to enemies of Home Rule.

The Government finally accepted the amendment, Irish Chief Secretary Morley suggesting that it could not be met by inserting the word "aliens" after "alienage" in subsection 3 of clause 2.

Mr. Broderick assented to Mr. Morley's suggestion, whereupon Tim Healy, Nationalist, pointed out that the amendment would work as a constant check upon the Government.

The amendment carried 338 to 139. The Irish Nationalists and many Liberals voted against the Government, while all the Conservatives and Liberal-Unionists supported the Government.

The words "as such" were also inserted after some further discussion, so that the Irish Legislature is debared from legislating in respect to "alienage, treason-felony, alienation, alienation, and other offences."

Trade and Guaranties Restrictions. Mr. L. H. Courtney, Liberal-Unionist member for Bodmin, Cornwall, moved to amend the bill so as to provide for the issue of a licence to any person who is a citizen of the United Kingdom.

Mr. Gladstone opposed the amendment. He admitted that there was a large element in Ireland for the control of external trade, but the Irish members of Parliament accepted the clause.

Farsell Once Proposed Protective Policy. Mr. Farsell had once mentioned the prospect of Ireland adopting a protective policy, but he withdrew that suggestion in accepting the Home Rule bill of 1886.

The Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain said that whether desirable or otherwise it would be the inevitable consequence of Home Rule that Ireland would control external trade.
