AT THE JUBILEE REGATTA.

The Prince of Wales aboard the Britannia when she beat the Ailsa in a light breeze.

Harwich, Eng., June 3.—The Jubilee Regatta opened this morning with beautiful weather. A light wind, Howard Gould's Niagara, B. Jameson's Luna, Lord Dudley's Iyoni, Lord Dunraven's Audrey, Prince Rattayni-arrat's Stephanie and Minnow started in the race for the 20 yachts at 10.30. The race was won by the Audrey, the boats finishing in this order: Audrey 4.07.55; Niagara 4.08.00; Stephanie 4.08.07; Dragon 4.09.34; Luna 4.09.54. The Iyoni and Minnow did not finish. The Ailsa, A. R. Walker's Ailsa and the Prince of Wales Britannia, the latter with the Prince of Wales on board, started at 12.00 a.m. in the race for yachts of over 40 tons. The course was 37 miles long. Britannia having the windward position, crossed the line 40 seconds ahead of Ailsa. Britannia rounded the sun light after having sailed over about two-thirds of the course at 1 hour 57 minutes. Ailsa was then half a mile astern. Eventually the Britannia crossed the finish line a winner, 2-1/2 minutes ahead of Ailsa.

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WILLIP TO THE TUNNEL

ENGINEER HASTING TO PROCEED WITH HIS PLANS.

Chairman Lamb on the Defeat of the By-Laws...

The Board of Works yesterday authorized the City Engineer to proceed with the erection of a shaft in the harbor in connection with the proposed tunnel.

Ald. Hubbard favored granting the petition, as clerks and officials had the holiday and there should be no discrimination against the poorer employees.

Ald. Oliver was again discussed, and definite action deferred.

The City Engineer will be asked to investigate the grievance caused by the Street Railway Company detaching trailers from Dundas-street cars at 8 p.m.

Ald. Oliver and Bell got a motion passed that a return be presented showing the length of service of each of the employees of the Engineer's and waterworks departments.

The Engineer's recommendations for asphalt pavements in Spadina-avenue were struck out as works unnecessary and too expensive.

The New Streets Near the Depot. It is the intention to run cars over the York-street bridge to the water-front, and to run a line down York-street, along Station-street and up Simcoe to Front-street, so that passengers may step from the street cars to the trams or boats.

The apportioning of Station-street has already been ordered.

The Harbor Commissioners require the shaft to be in not more than five feet ten inches of water from the zero level, the superstructure not to be more than 50 feet in diameter, to be so placed that it will not interfere with navigation to Hamilton's Point, and to be well lighted during the hours of navigation, and to be paid for by the city.

The Chairman said the adoption of this report did not commit the committee to the construction of the tunnel.

Ald. Oliver thought the Engineer was wearying his time on this matter.

Ald. Hubbard: After the adverse vote on Saturday against any civic expenditure for even necessary works, is it wise for this committee to order Mr. Keating to go on with his plans for the tunnel?

Ald. Oliver: There are assistants and assistants in the Engineer's office whose services could be dispensed with, but for each work as this.

The Chairman said the council had done its duty in submitting the four by-laws to the Mayor, and it is equally its duty to make preparations for the tunnel.

Already we have gone to much expense in connection with it.

The Chairman justified the policy of the committee as to waterworks, which does not cost the city \$1, and which supplies cheap water to the citizens. We are making a revenue of \$40,000 a year out of the waterworks. They are more than self-sustaining, and are paying interest on the debt.

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SHAREHOLDERS' MEETING OF THE TORONTO GENERAL TRUSTS COMPANY.

The thirteenth annual meeting of the shareholders of the Toronto General Trusts Company was held at its offices, on the corner of Yonge and Colborne streets, Toronto, on Monday, the 27th day of May, 1895, at twelve o'clock noon.

In the absence of Hon. Edward Blake, the President, Mr. John Hoskin, Q.C., L.L.D., Vice-President, took the chair, and announced those present were: Mr. E. A. Meredith, L.L.D., Vice-President, Hon. Sir Frank Smith, George Gooderham, George A. Cox, W. H. Beatty, B. Homer Dixon, P. Sutcliffe, Stuyvesant, Robert Jaffray, James Scott, J. J. Foy, Q.C., E. M. Irving, Q.C., J. G. Scott, Q.C., W. Langmuir, George W. Lewis and Edward Galley.

Mr. J. W. Langmuir, the Managing Director of the Company, read the report of the Directors for the year ended 31st March, 1895, as follows:

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Directors of the Toronto General Trusts Company have the pleasure in submitting to the shareholders their thirteenth annual report, with their statements showing the operations of the Company for the financial ending 31st March, 1895, and its financial standing.

The number of estates, trusts and other official positions assumed during the past twelve months was greater than in any previous year in the history of the Company, and the volume of work done has been very largely increased.

Owing, however, to the rearrangement of the office work at the beginning of the year the business has been efficiently and promptly managed with only a trifling addition to the office staff.

In moving the adoption of the report, Vice-President Hoskin, said: I think we have reasonable cause for gratification as the result of last year's operations of the Company. STRUCK FROM THE ROLLS

Barister William Middleton Hall Disbarred by the Benchers for Unprofessional Conduct.

The Benchers have adopted the report of the Discipline Committee of the Law Society, which recommended that William Middleton Hall be disbarred, on account of his guilty conduct in acting as a barrister and solicitor, as disclosed in the recent civic bodie investigation.

Secretary Macbeth of the Law Society has erased his name from the rolls, and a more formal "striking off" will shortly follow in open court. Notice that the society had his case under consideration was served upon Mr. Hall in Chicago, to which he made a reply to the charges preferred against him. In his reply, Mr. Hall said:

"The report of Judge McDougall is not a final proceeding, nor is it a judgment. No copy of the said report or of the evidence upon which it is founded has been served upon me. I am not aware of the contents of the said report except from a newspaper rumor and the notice served upon me herein.

The evidence taken upon the said investigation was in a great measure taken in my evidence.

The evidence does not in any way warrant the findings in the report so far as they relate to me.

The proceedings upon which the report is based were improperly conducted, and with an entire disregard of the rules of evidence, and were not confined within the scope of the resolution of the City Council.

Evidence of impositions was allowed, and made the basis of the attacks upon me by the prosecuting counsel.

The whole tenor of the prosecution was violent and unfair, and as such was sustained and admitted by the judge.

I received no money or the promise of any money to influence my conduct or votes while I was a member of the City Council. The money I did receive was received by me after I ceased to be a member of such council, as a compensation in securing a contract from one private corporation to another private corporation, and was not of malfeasance under the provisions or the statutes in that behalf.

The evidence of Barr and Johnston was obtained under an order or promise of protection from arrest. Barr's evidence was taken at 8 o'clock on Saturday night, and a careful perusal of the evidence will show that it is not to be depended on, and is loose and indefinite.

The bringing of the charges by the prosecuting counsel at different times, and when I was not on the stand, indicate a malicious intent to injure and suggest a prearranged scheme, at all hazards, to make me the scape-goat of the investigation, so as to save the real delinquents.

PEOPLE PANIC STRUCK.

A Fatal Epidemic Raging at N. F. Point Without Medical Assistance.

Halifax, N.S., June 3.—A report from St. John's, Nfld., says that at Port au Port and East St. George the people are panic struck with a disease that has broken out near by. The epidemic originated, on Red Island, among French fishermen, and has now spread to the mainland. Rev. Father O'Rourke, having contracted the disease during his administration to the sufferers at Port au Port. There is no doctor in the place, and the people do not know what the disease is.

Diamonds Portable Under the Wilson Bill.

New York, June 3.—One of the most important decisions handed down by the United States Circuit Court at New York, is that the Wilson tariff bill, as it relates to the duties on diamonds was handed down today by Judge Townsend, and in it the judge reverses the stand taken by the Board of General Appraisers, and holds that diamonds, but not set, are not to be admitted free of duty, but are taxable at the rate of 25 per cent. ad valorem.
