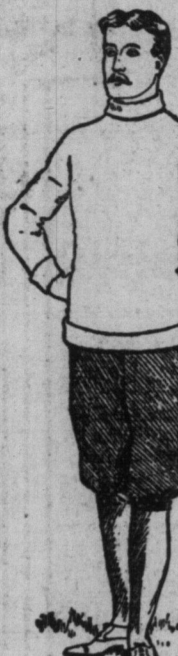

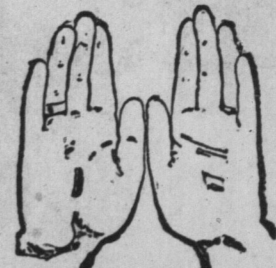

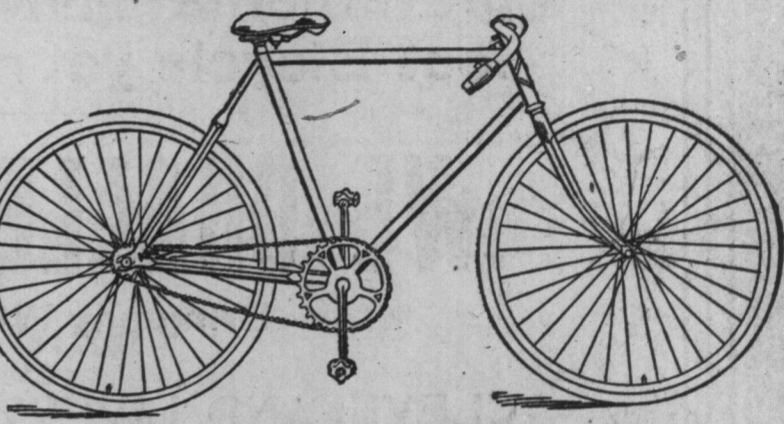

EPISTOLARY ECCENTRICITIES

Very curious specimens of the epistolary art are daily consigned to the editorial basket; now and again one escapes into print. An unflattering notice of a musical performance in a London paper elicited a long letter from the offended violinist, in which he asserted that the critic was not present at the entertainment, and announced his desire to have it generally known "that I look upon all critics that praise me as men of intelligence and worthy of the greatest respect; and I look upon those rare ones who disparage me as having a screw loose in their cerebral development. In conclusion, I consider that if the person who wrote the notice was present, at the performance he is only worthy to be an inmate of a home for idiots; and if he was not present, he is a mean, unmanly cur, and should get seven years' hard labor. However, I have not the least doubt but that I will be gaining the applause of admiring thousands when the poor fellow is getting worm-eaten in an unknown and contemptible grave—Yours obliged, Paganini Redivivus."

A thief thus wrote to the editor of the New York Tribune: "Sir,—Please advise your readers always to leave their names and addresses in their pocketbooks. It frequently happens in our business that we come into possession of portemonnaies containing private papers and photographs which we would gladly return; but we have no means of doing so. BIG FIRE IN CLEVELAND.

Dangler Stove Works Damaged \$300,000—Screw Company \$50,000—One Man Killed.

Cleveland, O., March 24.—Fire broke out early to-day in the jannaping department of the big Dangler Stove and Manufacturing Company, and notwithstanding the enormous quantity of water poured into the building by 15 engines, the structure, filled with valuable machinery and large quantities of manufactured goods, was practically destroyed. The high wind which prevailed caused the fire to spread to the plant of the Cleveland Machine Screw Company, adjoining the Dangler Works, and it was also destroyed. The loss on the Dangler Works is conservatively estimated at \$300,000, and on the Cleveland Machine Screw plant at \$50,000. The Machine Screw Works loss is fully covered by insurance, but the Dangler plant is only partially insured.

Three hours after the fire started a wall at the Screw Works fell, burying beneath it Lieut. Booth of fire company No. 7. It is believed he was instantly killed. His body has not been recovered.

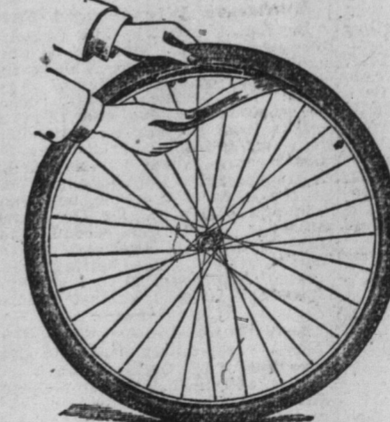

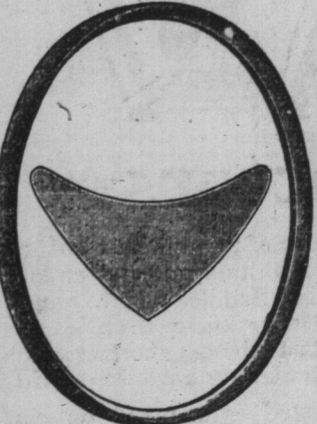

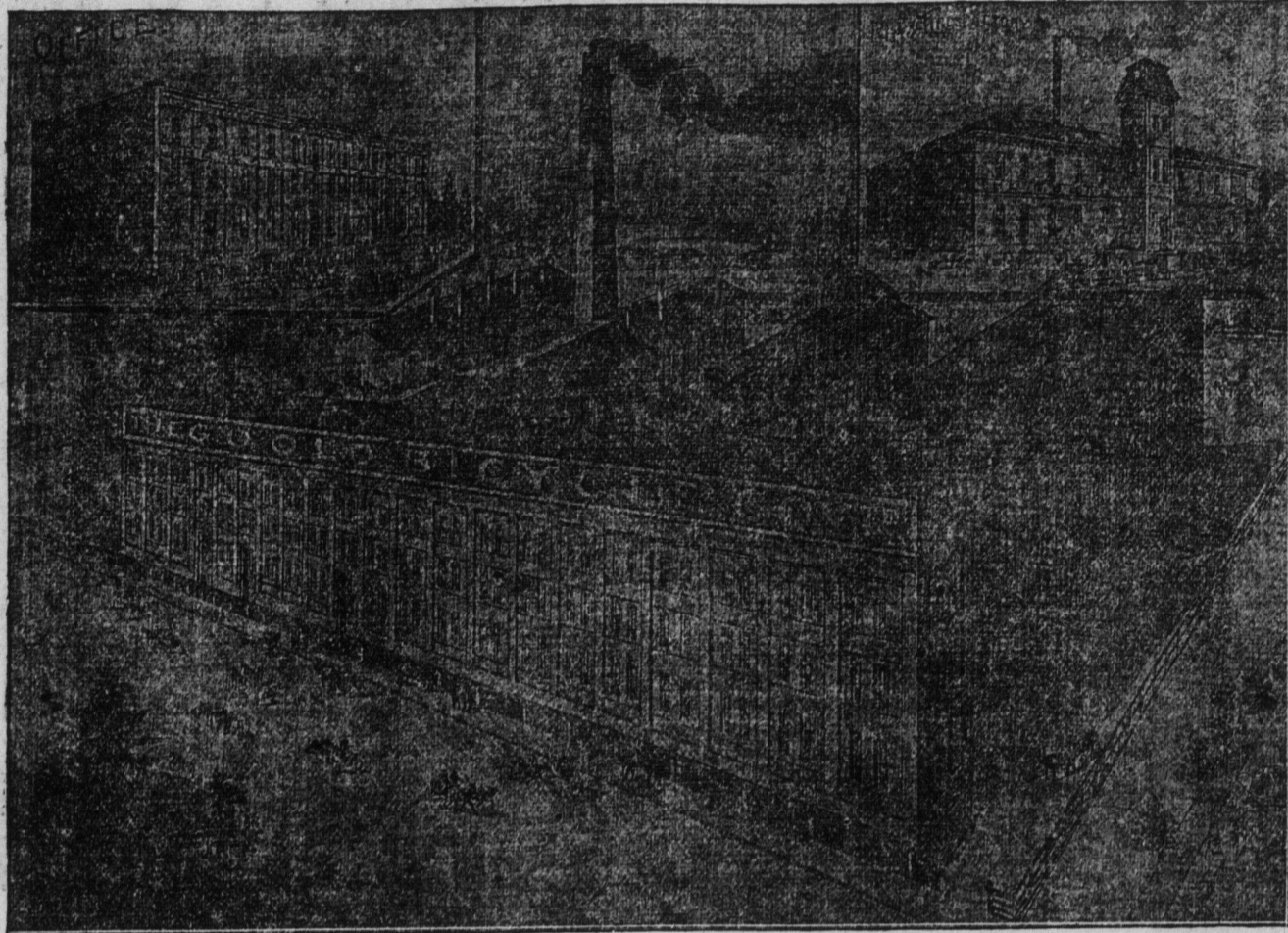

STILL MORE BODIES FOUND

In the Ruins of the Windsor Hotel, But There Have Been No Identifications.

MISSING ONES REPORTED SAFE.

Syracuse Man Fears His Two Nieces, Who Were Employed There, Are Lost.

New York, March 24.—About 10 a.m. portions of another body were found on the 47th-street side of the Windsor Hotel ruins. Another body was found at 11.30 a.m., in the northeastern portion of the ruins. The findings of stays near the bones is taken as an indication that the body is that of a woman, probably an employe of the hotel. Nearly were several letters, some of them written in lead pencil. On one of them could be deciphered the name, "Miss Casey." It was stated that Miss Casey was an employe of the hotel, but was safe. Some of the attaches of the hotel who were at the ruins thought that the bones might be those of a girl who roomed with Miss Casey.

Official Descriptions. The official descriptions of three bodies taken to the morgue to-day are as follows: Body No. 10.—Pieces of body and legs; feet and hands missing; no clothing found near the body; no possible means of identifying sex or finding out age. Body No. 11.—An unknown body, supposed to be that of a female; head, arms and legs missing; part of a corset of white cotton underwear; part of black cotton stockings; white silk handkerchief.

Three More Reported Safe. Maggie Farrell, Nellie Curtis and Kate Soy, employes, reported missing, are said to be safe. An elderly woman at the morgue to-day saw body No. 3, and stated she felt sure it was that of Julia Katen, an employe. Julia Katen, the woman stated, was 28 years of age, and came from Manchester, England, and had only been in this country a few years.

Mr. McGree's Fears. Syracuse, N.Y., March 24.—John McGree of this city fears that his nieces, Della McGree and Kate Dunn, are among the victims of the Windsor Hotel fire. They are step-sisters, and the last time he heard from them they were working in the hotel. He says his fears are founded on the fact that Kate Dunn's bankbook was yesterday found among the ruins. William McGree, the father of the girls, lives at Castle Market, Ballinakil, Queen's County, Ireland.

FILIPINOS ARE VERY ACTIVE.

Preparing Their Malabon Defences Evidently in Anticipation of an Attack.

A THOUSAND AMERICANS KILLED,

According to Reports From the Enemy—Oregon Volunteers and 22nd Regulars Sent Forward.

Manila, March 24.—(Noon.)—The enemy are extremely active in the vicinity of Malabon, in preparing defences, evidently anticipating an attack. They keep well under cover. A small body, however, emerged from the jungle on the extreme left yesterday and fired upon the Kansas troops in the trenches, fatally wounding Private Cohen of Company B, and Private Muser of Company E. The Oregon volunteers and the 22nd regulars marched to the front yesterday. The Third and Seventeenth Regiments have disembarked from the Sherman. General H. G. Otis' brigade struck their tents this morning, and an early move is probable. Sixteen English refugees arrived here yesterday from Dapunan, the railroad terminus, on board the steamer Saturnus. They report that the natives are generally friendly and the officers invariably courteous. Mr. Higgin, manager of the railroad, and about a dozen unmarried men in charge of various business interests, declined to take advantage of the opportunity to leave.

A POLITICAL SHUTTLECOCK

Is the French Shore Question in Newfoundland, Says a Prominent Merchant.

NO MONEY IN THE COD FISHERY.

The Dispute Has Been Kept Alive to Suit the Schemes and Whims of Politicians.

New York, March 24.—A despatch to The Herald from St. John's, Nfld., says: James Murray, in an interview on the French shore question, treats it from the standpoint of an old residential merchant of many years' experience in the trade of the colony, and also as a former member of the Legislature for one of the districts of the treaty coast. "The French shore question," he said, "is merely a stage property of the politicians, brought out into prominence, or run back into obscurity, just as it suits their schemes and needs. There is enough substantial basis for the French grievance, in fact, to swear by, and barely enough to keep it from becoming extinct altogether. Were it not for the periodical efforts of local politicians to galvanize it into renewed life, the French fishery would have died out long ago."

OTHER SIDE OF THE CASE. Mr. George T. Brown favors the Hunting of Deer in the Water. Editor World: An article in The World to-day regarding the "shooting of deer in water" has occasioned considerable comment amongst the hunters in this locality, and so general is the disapproval of the views expressed in that article that I ask you to kindly allow me space in your valuable paper to voice the opinions on the subject held by hunters in general in this vicinity.

Of some 30 or more hunters of our personal acquaintance, with perhaps three exceptions at most, they are in favor of a change in the present law with regard to shooting deer in water, and I venture to say that we can furnish you with a petition signed by at least 90 per cent. of the hunters in this vicinity. During the past three seasons the expenditure of most hunters, whose opinions we voice, has been most unsatisfactory, in having deer which are wounded reach a lake, only to die in the water, or reach the opposite shore, and there to fall and suffer a slow, agonizing death.

WILL GRAHAM TAKE AN M.P.? Refuses to Discuss His Own Intentions, But Gives a List of Possible Candidates. Ask any member of the Local House stopping at the Rossin who is going to succeed Hon. John F. Wood of Brockville and the answer is invariably, "George Graham of The Recorder." The journalist M.L.A. was puffing a corn-cob pipe last night when asked by a World reporter if he would accept the Liberal nomination next Tuesday. "I won't say that I won't, and I won't say that I will," was the reply. "sure it is one thing, however, I'll gladly do," he continued, "and that is give you the list of likely candidates so far mentioned."

MAJOR SHOW SAT MORN

And Permitted the Cattle Market Bill to Be Thrown Down by the Legislature.

WHAT DOES THIS ALL MEAN?

Does His Worship, as Mayor, Think More about the City Clerkship Than His Present Position.

The bill authorizing the extension of the Cattle Market by taking in Stanley Park is in danger. The Attorney-General, at the Municipal Committee yesterday, put his foot down on it a little in advance. True, it is not to be dealt with till Tuesday next, but Chairman Graham of the Legislation and Reception, has heard Mr. Hardy bespeak the injustice Cattle Market extension might do property-owners fronting on the park, and is in despair. Of course, it would take little to cool the ardor of Aid. Graham on this question. He comes from Ward 5. But there is no doubt that Mr. Pittie and the alleged others who threaten damages have got in their work at Parliament Hill.

But, said an alderman yesterday, why should not Mr. Hardy leave the defence of the local ratepayers to the courts? Granted that the extension of the market would work to the detriment of their property, why could they not resort to litigation or arbitration?

"I don't think for one minute that extension would hurt anybody about there. There is a wide expanse of street and lots between the park and the nearest residences, so, how could it? But, at any rate, it is surely Toronto's own business if she wants to dedicate a park, and is prepared to pay damages to anybody entitled to them."

Mayor Plays His Game.
If this bill receives the neutralized attention from the Mayor that other bills did yesterday, his defeat is a foregone conclusion. The Council gave instructions to have support given to the proposed amendments to the act creating the Board of Control. They also sanctioned Aid. Hallam's measure to rescind the act which made possible the existence of any Fleming-Sharp deal.

The Mayor sat passively by at the committee yesterday, and saw both of these measures thrown out. Both involved legislation concerning his official position, and a word from him might have gone a long way. He is paid almost a year to do as the Council, as representing the city, orders. He only gave color to the suggestion that he was utilizing his \$4000 temporary office to reach out for a \$2200 permanent job.

He thinks he has reconciled Aid. Hallam by flattery his vanity, or, more specifically, by giving him a leading role in the new City Hall opening next week. These things indicate that the Mayor is only awaiting the opportunity for a coup.

Wood's' Lament Reached.
As for Aid. Woods and the job of caretaker of the new City Hall, well, the danger is not imminent. The heavyweight Controller is insidious and persistent in his operations, but he has got a mighty power of opinion and disgust to overcome.

He has some of his conferees, on the contrary, do not take the rumors as to his ambitions seriously, and that is the best way they could be facilitated.

Engineer Must Settle It.
The Board of Works yesterday afternoon overruled the sub-committee's report in favor of referring the High Level Pumping Station eternal question to be investigated by the County Judge. The Engineer is the man they should refer it to, for his decision is final. The Engineer was quoted to be in favor of "cleaning out the whole station," and the sentiment of the committee was emphatically averse to such proceeding.

It was Aid. Lamb who, as usual, started the ball rolling. He pointed out that Mr. Heil did not apparently command respect and that the men were apparently insubordinate.

"There is no use prolonging the agony," he said. "I think we should announce our intention to do his duty and, no matter whose head may fall, I will back him up. I have come to the conclusion that Mr. Heil, though no doubt a competent engineer, is incapable of handling the men under him. These sentiments were expressed in succession by Aid. Score, Gowanlock, and even by Aid. Crane, who had moved on the sub-committee to refer it to the judge. Aid. Gowanlock went a step further and saw to the head of the Waterworks Department, Engineer Fellows.

Aid. Lamb, Gowanlock, Frame, Russell, E. Graham, Score and Ford, in favor of sending it to the Engineer, and Aid. Woods, Denison and Davison supported the report. By motion of Aid. Crane, the Engineer is to report upon the proposed new street railway belt line through the Church, Bloor, Avenue-road, Dupont, Bathurst and King-streets, and the Union Station and Front-streets.

Major-Street Settled.
Probably the last round between brick and asphalt for Major-street was fought out. Asphalt got the decision. A large deputation of property owners from the street told their dissent to the operations of the rival companies in language which stretched parliamentary procedure to the limit. They told about being called out of bed to sign petitions, and produced a petition, which was signed by the petitioners, which was read by G. S. Lindsey, partly yielded to brick and G. S. BRITISH TRADE CONDITIONS.

Sir Charles Howard Vincent Wants to Know What Government Will Do About Them.

MR. RITCHIE REASSURES HIM.

Says the Figures Are Substantially Correct, But Things Are All Right Now in England.

London, March 24.—In the House of Commons to-day Sir Charles Howard Vincent, Conservative, asked whether, in view of the enormous increase of exports from the United States, while the exports of the United Kingdom do not show such vitality, the Government is prepared to issue a royal commission or appoint a select committee to inquire into the cause of such a condition.

The President of the Board of Trade, Mr. C. F. Ritchie, replied that the facts and figures set forth were substantially correct. The cause of such a condition of things, he added, were generally well known and there was no necessity for a special inquiry into the matter, especially as there was no reason to regard the condition of trade and industry in Great Britain as other than satisfactory.

DEAD BODY IN A CAR.

Man Murdered and Remains Placed in Refrigerator Car.

The authorities are inclined to believe that the man was murdered in some other city and then sent to Chicago in the refrigerator. The man has been dead for about a week. He was about 35 years old and was apparently a miner. The car in which the body was found arrived in Chicago yesterday over the Pan-Handle route from Newberry, S. C.

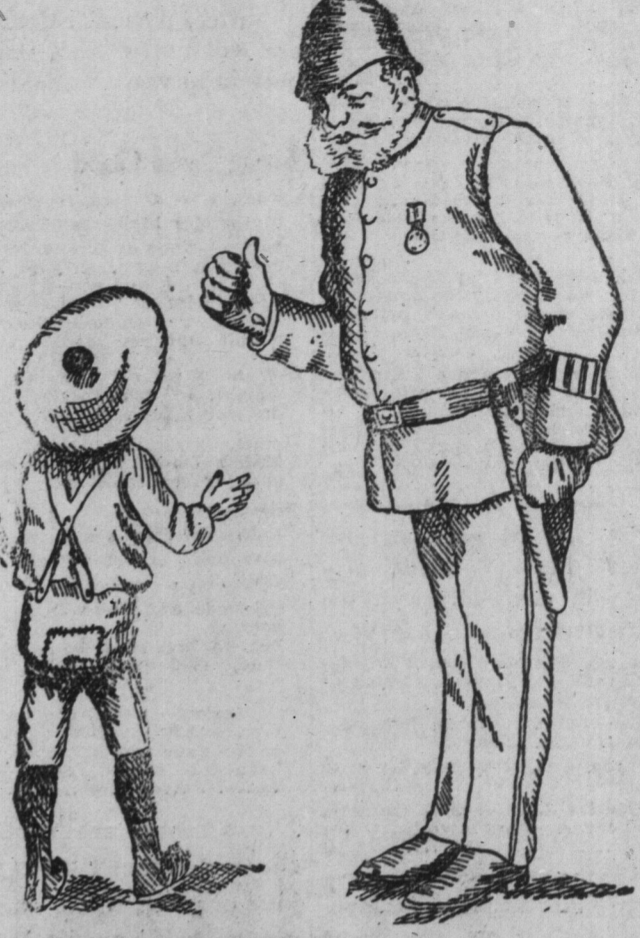

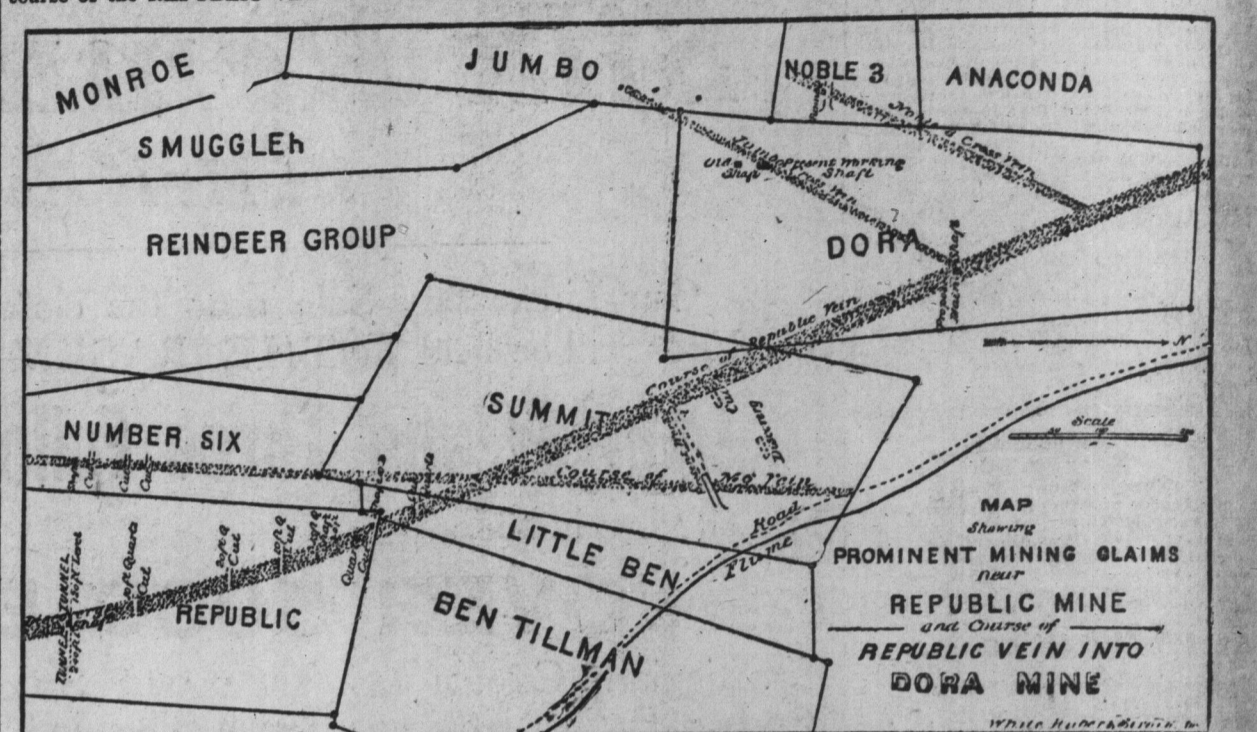

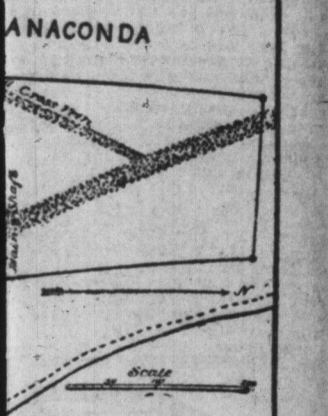

MR. TUCKER'S BILL TO MAKE THEIR ACTS LIABLE TO A PENALTY CREATES A STIR.

There was a hot debate at the Legislative Assembly yesterday, when the interference of local officials in the elections for members of that body was discussed.

PREMIER HARDY OPPOSES IT.

Mr. Tuckey (West Wellington) moved the second reading of his bill to amend the Ontario Elections Act.

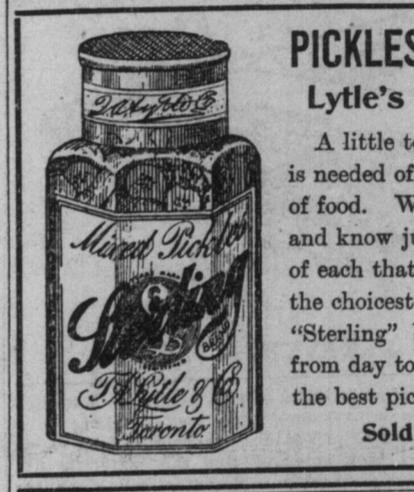

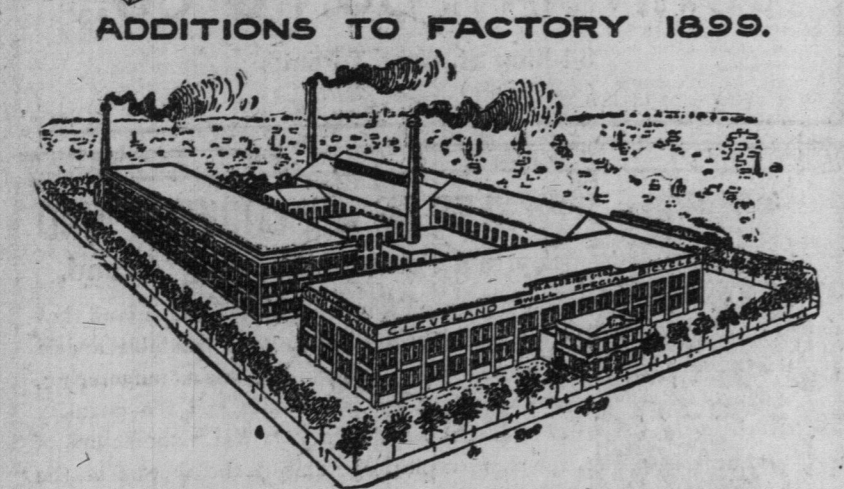

GERMANS ARE GROWLING. CRUSADE ON COLORED MEN.

Some of the Newspapers Are Agitating an Aggressive Policy in Samoa. Whites in Texas Appear to Have Inaugurated a War of Extermination.

WANT THE TREATY CALLED OFF. THE BLACKS ARE BEING HUNTED

Berlin, March 24.—The newspapers here aggressively discuss the Samoan question and a portion of the press maintains that Germany must adequately protect German interests there. The semi-official Press, referring to German representations in Samoa, says: "This is the wisest thing all around, as then no arrangements would be made easier for the German people." The Lokal Anzeiger, Boersen Courier and other German papers are also expressing the same opinion. The removal of Mr. Maxse (the British Consul at Apia), whose intrusion has occasioned the whole trouble, is especially necessary before peace can be reestablished in Samoa. The correspondent here of the Associated Press learns from an authoritative source that Germany does not intend to remove Herr Rose, the German Consul at Apia, unless Great Britain and the United States remove their consuls. CHURCH WAR OF THE KNIFE

Ritualistic Quarrel Still Furiously Rages Throughout the Old Land. HARCOURT ON OPEN REBELLION. Lord Halifax an Ecclesiastical Jack Cade—Protest to the Bishop of London.

London, March 24.—There is no near approach to discipline in the Church of England. The parishioner who preaches against being preached to death by wild curates has some cause to dread being reasoned into unreason by battling theologians. Sir William Harcourt, for the Protestants, and Lord Halifax, for the High Church party, are at it again. The limits of the English language preclude their going on much longer. Ecclesiastical Jack Cade. Sir William, in a letter called "Open Rebellion," bursts defiance at "Lord Halifax, the ecclesiastical Jack Cade," but pretends even him to be the bishops whose duty it was to deal with the matter. But it suited their purpose, partly from sympathy, mostly from cowardice, to maintain or reign an ignorance which absolved them from action. Lord Halifax has his own party in the English Church Union have delivered us from the minimizing cant of Episcopal and ministerial optimism. Sir William sets on the Church Union's declaration that "we have not the right to set aside by the Crown or Parliament the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England, and that the ultimate court of appeal in matters of clergy discipline is the highest lay authority—the Crown—represented by its Privy Council, whose legal authority is vested in its Judicial Committee. Set of Meticulous Priests. Getting back on the Church Union's "We," Sir William says: "We deny nothing of the sort. We might as well deny the right of the Crown and Parliament to tax the people. The only reply to this nonsense which it is necessary to give is that the Crown and Parliament are the only powers which have the right to establish by law, and have continued to do so for more than three centuries. This is the kind of title which the law-abiding English people have the habit of respecting, and it is not going to be set aside by a set of meticulous priests, who have combined together to restore the mass and the confessional. Object of the Catholic Revival. "The practices and ceremonies of the reformed Liturgy were deliberately cut away and clean rejected for the reason that they had no more sense and no more sanctity than the practices and ceremonies of the old Liturgy. It is not the whole object of the 'Catholic revival' to restore the old Liturgy, but to restore the whole of the old Liturgy, which were thus 'clean rejected' at the Reformation. Of such miserable stuff is this 'Catholic revival' made. It is characterized alike by the feebleness and the violence of men who seem to have lost the faculty of discriminating between what is true and what is not, between law and anarchy, between common-sense and unreason. It carries with it its own punishment in the reprobation of all reasonable and law-abiding men."

And One Report Says They Have Begun Concentrating for a General Fight.

Texarkana, Ark., March 24.—Details of the wholesale lynchings reported to have occurred in Little River County, Arkansas, are slow in coming in. Three more dead negroes have been found in Red River bottoms between New Boston, Texas, and Rocky Comfort, Ark. Two of them, Joe King and Moses Jones, have been hanged or shot to death. The third body was asked when found. A Texan justice of the peace held an inquest over these bodies to-day, and a verdict was returned by the jury, declaring that the men "came to their death from natural causes, or were frozen to death." There is some doubt as to where these lynchings occurred, it being near the State line, and may have been either in Little River County, Arkansas, or in Bowie County, Texas. Sensational Reports. Sensational reports are current. One states that the whites are still out in organized possession of the county, and the negro revolutionary plot, with the avowed intention of strangling them up wherever they may be, has been organized and are recovering from their panicky terror, and are securing arms and threaten vengeance on the whites. A colored man who arrived here to-day from Wilton says that every negro in the neighborhood of Rocky Comfort and Richmond has left his home and is afraid to return. A large number of them have crossed the Red River, and gone into Bowie County, Texas. He says more negroes have been killed than have yet been reported.

GAME LAWS OF ONTARIO.

"Venator" Writes a Hot Letter to The World Against the Shooting of Deer in the Water.

WHY IS ALL THIS SOMERSAULT?

Legislative Assembly Ought Not to Pass Laws for Those Who Hunt—After Dollars.

Editor World: In reading the report of the Game Commissioners, just issued, one is led to ask, what are these men doing? Are they advertising agents, or what? If they have stated their opinions correctly, the reason for their appointment is to increase Canadian game that American tourists and sportsmen may come and shoot it (see page 7 of report). On the preceding page we are treated to some highly amusing quotations from a speech by the Chief Game and Fish Commissioner of Maine, in and as for ourselves, all we can say is that "we have our doubts about them." As to American tourists and sportsmen, we have experience of them every summer; they have nearly depleted Lakes Muskoka, Rosseau and Joseph of fish, and are not particular whether they are in or out of the close season; they mean to shoot, and that is law unto themselves, and we have had their sport effected, but what do they care? It means only a few more dollars to the expense of the trip, and they have had their sport. And this is the class of people the Game Commissioners consider we Canadians should provide sport for. Why not sell the whole of the game to a syndicate, have it shot off in one season, put the proceeds in the Provincial Treasury, and have done forever with the whole matter? Cannot these commissioners in protecting game rise superior to the value of it? Some of the suggestions are undoubtedly good, and would be of value if carried out, but we think the drawbacks of cold storage are over-estimated, and provided game is reared there within the limits of Ontario, it is not necessary to transport, and remains the property of the party having the license, and has the tags attached. It cannot matter the time it stays. The question is not how long certain game is stored, but have any additions to the stock been made after the close season? As to licensing guides, we do not expect it will have the result anticipated. Theoretically it is all right, but sportsmen who know the northern hunting districts better than the commissioners will not touch for its success. The men who register are keen hunters—after the dollar. It is quite refreshing to find that some commissioners have at last realized the fact of the great slaughter of moose and deer by Indians, but, sad to relate, the remedy proposed is the licensed guide. The provision that game in transport be packed in crates, open, is utterly useless. Will any man sending out of the country, especially in the close season, be such a fool as to pack in an open crate? The only guard is that of searching. Perhaps the most regrettable recommendation is (No. 34) to permit non-residents to take away game. Will these silent men inform us why we should set the example? We in Ontario cannot bring game from Manitoba, British Columbia or other provinces, and in many of the states the same embargo prevails. Why, then, should we give them what they deny us? Game is not so very plentiful that we can be so generous to those who live up now the most beneficial recommendation

of the report, that is No. 33, to restore the water-shooting of deer; and it would be most interesting to discover the influence which has been used to change the opinion of the wardens and commissioners. It has for some time been the opinion of those best qualified to judge that the abolition of water-shooting has most largely to do with the increase of deer. Let all of a sudden we find a complete somersault in this matter, and that, too, in the face of the fact that the opinions of those who answered the questions on this subject sent out by the Chief Game Warden. We apprehend those who answered the questions were those who took the most interest in the matter. That comparatively few sport replicas is due to the fact of the very mixed units of the hunting parties, which are often composed of men living widely asunder, meeting once a year for the hunt and to have a good time, and, if possible, to make the game killed pay for their expenses. The hunt over, they trouble themselves no more about it. The desire to make sport is the worst feature of so many of these hunting parties. To them water-shooting means so many more deer, so many more dollars. In writing of this phase of the subject we do so of personal knowledge and experience, and we can name parties and places, by whom and where, the full complement of deer has never been obtained since water-shooting was abolished, but before that more deer were killed than could be taken out. We have heard the same facts from game wardens and deputy-game wardens, and taking the report we find only one of the former who hints at the restoration on the ground of wounded deer escaping and dying in the water, and that is in the case of the Crown Lands man, who has not done anything in the field, neither has the Chief Game Warden. What personal knowledge can they have of the habits of the game, or of the wishes and requirements of the sportsmen?
