





Trusts Corporation (being the nineteenth of the Toronto General Trusts Company), accompanied by the usual financial statements showing the results of the corporation's business for the year ended 31st December, 1900.

The subscribed capital stock of the corporation is \$1,000,000, of which there has been paid up to 31st December last the sum of \$906,720, leaving two instalments of 10 per cent, each due on the partially-paid stock at that date. The last instalment falls due on the 19th March, and when received the paid-up capital stock will be \$1,000,000, and the Reserve Fund \$250,000, thus furnishing the clients of the corporetion, in addition to the specific investments held for each estate, security to the extent of \$1,250,000 for the proper performance of all the duties entrusted to the cor-

The profit and loss statement, herewith submitted (which has reference only to the capital funds of the corporation), shows the revenues for the year and the sources from which they were derived, and the charges against the same for management and all other outlays. 



Put Heads Together.

Hon. William Ross proposed that the leaders on both sides of the House should put their heads together and make a few gentle changes in the resolution.

Mr. Costigan's original motion was as follows:

That a humble address be presented to His Most Gracious Majesty. Your Majesty's most faitiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, beg leave most humbly to represent: That as a token of the civil and religious liberation of the equality of rights guaranteed to all British subjects in the Canadian Confederation, as well as under the British crown.

That by virtue of the Act of Settlement of 1689, the British sovereign, on the first day of the meeting of the first Parliament, or at the coronation, is called upon to make the following declaration:

"I, A, B, by the grace of God, King

"I, A, B., by the grace of God, King (or Queen) of Great Britain and Ire-land, Defender of the Faith, do solemnly and sincerely, in the presence of God, profess, testify and declare that I do believe that in the sacrament of


