ECHOES OF THE CONGRESS.

Col. W. N. Ponton, one of the Belleville delegates to the recent Chambers of Commerce, has contributed an excellent and timely article on the Congress to The Belleville Intelligencer, reading, in part, as follows:

You have asked me to write a few lines on the recent gathering of representatives from all points of the British compass, who met at Montreal, in order to crystalize into the form of resolutions and recommendations the united opinion and sentiments of those who are endeavoring to serve the empire by deeds as well as words; by unifying and consolidating it thru the silken chains of commerce as well as by the ties and bonds of British brotherhood. This, the fifth Congress, was the first ever held out of the Home Land, and the experiment has passed into a successful experience. Successful, not merely on account of the thoughtful and thoughtfproducing speeches made; successful, not merely thru the influence of mind on mind, man on man, but also especially successful because before the close we Canadians realized more than ever the great insperial heritage which it is our privilege and duty to maintain, and we also realized that, while we will be potent factors in that empire's future, yet we are not the only colony or integral portion of the British empire on which the sun shines. Our visiting delegates, our compatriots from centre to circumference of the great national circle, have also realized the potentialities of the futue which we have in store in this broad Dominion, if Canada is developed by British population, by British capital and under kindred British laws.
