

LIBERAL DOWNED UNIONIST FREE TRADE VS. PROTECTION

Chamberlain's Candidate Overwhelmed by Big Majority in Contest in Argyllshire. London, Aug. 28.—The Liberals to-day gained a notable victory in Argyllshire, where on Wednesday last was held the first parliamentary election fought on the fiscal question raised by Colonial Secretary Chamberlain.

SOMETHING OF THE RIDING. Editor World: Argyllshire is in some respects one of the most representative counties of Scotland. It combines all the characteristics of a Highland constituency with a considerable leavening of a business and commercial electorate.

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SAY NOTHING BUT SAW WOOD IS LABOR'S ATTITUDE NOW

Trades Council Section Relation With Capital So Strained to Demand Secret Planning. When the newspaper reporters sought admission to the regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council on Thursday night, they were gently but firmly denied the usual privilege of entrance. The door was closely guarded and only those directly connected with the Council and who were able to produce on the spot the necessary evidence of their connection were allowed within the room.

Question of Self-Interest. Speaking of the matter a prominent official said: "It has come to this, that we can no longer let the enemies of unionism know what our plans for the future are. The fight is growing intense. Every advantage must be taken by our opponents. Labor men are fighting and fighting for conditions that will afford them means of livelihood. Ever since the organization of the Trades Council we have let the public know what we are doing. We intend to change the same measure of privacy for a time at least. It may look peculiar, but it is not more ominous looking than it is intended to be. Labor unions are important means of being brought to the public and we realize that we have considerable power in many ways."

Will Dominate in Elections. Besides this there are a number of important matters being brought to the public mind. Whether it is concerning forthcoming municipal elections or not, it is not necessary to say. Still, I am at liberty to state that union men this year will be a power in politics and it will be constant with out least rest the result of the coming elections.

There is a Wide Gulf. "Never was capital and labor more widely separated, and the enemies have taken every precaution to keep their movements secret, and I think it is about time that we followed suit. If it were constant with out least rest the result of the coming elections."

Unprecedented Crop of Some Fruits Thruout the Niagara District. Fruit receipts in Toronto have been heavy, if ever, been as large as they are at present. The Niagara peninsula brings in thousands of packages daily, the greater part from Niagara and St. Catharines districts, where there is a glut. Plums are especially plentiful—so plentiful that the growers will not find it profitable to pick any but the choicest varieties. Even the canning factories have refused to accept any more, and what they take they get at their own price. Five cents a basket and pick them yourself is the price in some parts. Pears, peaches and apples are looking well. Grapes are also well advanced and promise an abundant yield. All in all there will be fruit of all kinds in great abundance, and the prices in Toronto and the other centers of the fruit trade should be away down.

U.S. Determined to Protect Chinese Charged With Sedition.

Washington, Aug. 28.—It was said today at the State Department that U. S. Minister Conger had been instructed that he should not be a consenting party to the surrender of the six Chinese subjects who were arrested by the authorities of the foreign settlement in Shanghai in July last and put on trial on the charge of sedition before the mixed court of the settlement, and whom the consular body of Shanghai refused to surrender on the demand of the Chinese government for punishment according to Chinese customs.

**IS CHAMBERLAIN GREAT? SEEMS LIKE A PARADOX**

It is not so much the fact that people have slipped into the vulgar way of saying "Joe" that forbids us to include Mr. Chamberlain among the Olympians whom we picture as seen from a good distance. There is the way they say it that acts as a deterrent.

**WROUGHT MAY BE FORCED TO HOLD SPECIAL MEETING**

Ald. Spence is Circulating a Petition Among the Aldermen—Has Eleven Signers.

Ald. Spence is not after the Mayor to force him to call a special meeting of the Council in order to pass upon the resolution that Mr. Spence has drawn up protesting against the passage of the Toronto and Hamilton Railway Bill by the Senate.

Ald. Spence asked the Mayor last week to call the meeting, and His Worship declined on the plea that the matter had been dealt with by the city's deputations and they had obtained many concessions from the government as could be expected in the face of the strong lobby the company had in line in favor of the bill.

By the rules of the Council, the Mayor has to call a special meeting, when presented with a petition signed by a majority of the members, and this petition Ald. Spence is busy procuring. Up to the present he has obtained eleven names, as follows: Ald. Curry, Fleming, McGhie, Bell, Dunn, Graham, Harrison, Foster, Spence, Neale and Richardson.

Edwin E. Long of Shantlesville found a snake among the glasses on a sideboard in his house. He killed it.

Jacob Crum, a farmer near Reading, placed five feet long. He tried to stir the other legs. The boy began to kick and managed to tread with the other foot on the reptile's head. He held it down until it got loose. The snake was killed.

John Angstadt of Bisket saw a blacksnake and a spotted one in a fight near his barn. He watched them until one killed the other.

Annie O'Han of Hamburg, walking along the railroad, trod on a copperhead. It sank its fangs into her right foot.

Edwin K. Moser of Strause plowed up a nest of seven blacksnakes. Thomas Kohl, of Angeleno, moved a seven-foot copperhead into his pieces. William Hans of Greenville killed a snake with a white cobra. Mrs. J. M. Kline of Albany killed a rattler in the neighborhood for many years.
