New York, Sept. 26.-Hundreds of residents of the north of Ireland are anxious to emigrate to Canada, according to Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration in the Dominion cabinet, who arrived here Saturday on the Mauretania on his way back to the capital after an extensive trip of inspection of the Canadian immigration offices in the old country. Mr. Calder visited the agencies of Mr. Calder visited the agencies of his department in England and Scotland and found the organization working efficiently. He did not go to Ireland, but to a Canadian Press correspondent he stated that reports he had received from the Belfast office showed that there was unusual

activity there.
"Our Belfast office has had many inquiries from prospective immigrants recently," he said, "and there are indications that Canada will get many new citizens from the north of Ireland. Our Dublin office, however, owing to conditions prevailing there at present, is merely marking
