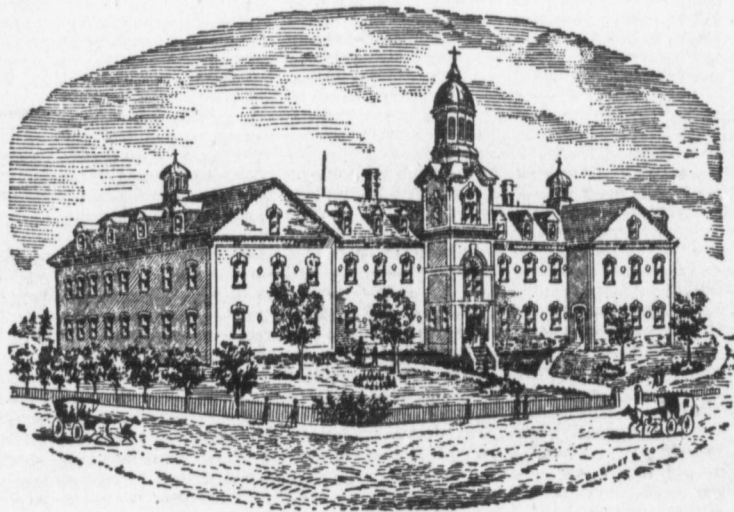

ST. FRANCIS XAVIER'S COLLEGE.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

St. Francis Xavier's College was founded in 1854 by the Rt. Rev. Colin F. McKinnon, Bishop of Arichat, for the higher education of students aspiring to the priesthood and to the learned professions. In this respect it has more than fulfilled the hopes of the Rt Rev. Founder. Another and very important work done by the College is that of preparing young men for the teaching profession. It has in fact ever since its inception and particularly in recent years been the chief factor in supplying teachers for the Counties of Antigonish, Inverness, Richmond and Cape Breton. Of late its constituency has become much enlarged, a considerable portion of the students now in attendance being from Western Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the United States. In 1866 the College received University powers by the following Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia :

AN ACT TO ENABLE THE COLLEGE OF ST. FRANCIS XAVIER, AT ANTIGONISH, TO CONFER DEGREES.

(Passed the 7th day of May, A. D. 1866.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows :

1. St. Francis Xavier's College, at Antigonish, shall be held and taken to be an University, with all and every the usual privileges of such an institution, and that the students in the said College shall have the liberty and privilege of taking the degrees of Bachelor, Master and Doctor in the several Arts and Faculties, at the appointed times, and shall have power, within themselves,

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In 1880 a new brick wing was erected by the Rt. Rev. John Cameron, D. D., the work on which was done under the direction of the Rev. John J. Chisholm, P. P., of Heatherton. The funds for the erection of this building were contributed chiefly by the Bishop and Clergy of this Diocese. His Lordship contributed over six thousand dollars; the Very Rev. Neil McLeod, V. G., \$990, the late Rev. John Quinan, \$250; the Rev. Ronald McDonald, P. P., of Pictou, now Rt. Rev. Bishop of Harbor Grace, \$200, the rest of the Clergy, \$2,224.14.

In 1881 the Provincial grant, which varied from eight to fifteen hundred dollars a year, was withdrawn, and His Lordship Bishop Cameron appealed to the people of the Diocese to form an endowment fund. For this purpose the sum of over twenty thousand dollars has been collected and invested.

In 1882 a Board of Governors was organized under the following Act:

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE GOVERNORS OF ST. FRANCIS XAVIER'S COLLEGE.

(Passed the 10th day of March, 1882.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

1. The Right Rev. John Cameron, D. D., Bishop of Arichat, and his successors in office canonically appointed, together with the Rev. John Shaw, P. P., Rev. Neil McNeil, D. D., Wm. Gerroir, Esq., J. P., and Colin F. McIsaac, Esq., Barrister, shall be a body politic and corporate by the name of the "Governors of St. Francis Xavier's College, Antigonish."

2. The Corporation hereby created shall have perpetual succession and a common seal, and shall have power to take by

donation, deed, devise, bequest, purchase, or otherwise howsoever, real and personal property, and to sell and convey the same.

3. The four last named members of the said Board of Governors, under the first section of this Act, shall continue to hold office until death, resignation, or permanent removal from the Province of Nova Scotia, but if any one of them shall cease to be in communion with the Roman Catholic Church, he shall cease to be a member of the Corporation hereby created.

4. Any vacancy which may from time to time occur among the said Governors, shall be supplied by the election of a person in communion with the Roman Catholic Church by the remaining members of the Corporation, subject, however, to the notification and approval of the said Bishop of Arichat and his successors. The term of office of the person so elected shall be the same as that mentioned in the third section of this Act.

5. The Corporation hereby created may from time to time make statutes, rules and ordinances, not inconsistent with the laws of this Province, for the management of the said College, and all matters appertaining thereto, and for the management of the funds and property entrusted to it, and may appoint the professors and teachers in the said College, and remove them from time to time, and regulate the salaries to be paid to them. The exercise of any of the powers mentioned in this section shall, however, be subject to the approval of the said Bishop of Arichat for the time being, and his successors.

6. The said College of St. Francis Xavier shall continue to be a University, with all and every the usual privileges of such institutions.

7. The Corporation hereby created shall have power to appoint a Treasurer, Secretary, and such other officers and servants as they may from time to time deem necessary for the purposes of the Corporation, and may hold real estate, not exceeding fifty thousand dollars.

In 1887 the following amendment was made necessary by a change in the name of the Diocese :

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AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 77 OF THE ACTS OF 1882, ENTITLED
 "AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE GOVERNORS OF ST. FRANCIS
 XAVIER'S COLLEGE.

(Passed the 3rd day of May, 1887.)

1. The word "Arichat," wherever it appears in the several sections of said chapter, is hereby struck out and the word "Antigonish" substituted therefor.

In 1888 another amendment was made to enable the Board to borrow money needed to erect new building:

AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 77, OF THE ACTS OF 1882, ENTITLED,
 "AN ACT TO INCORPORATE, ETC."

(Passed the 16th day of April, 1888.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

1 Section two of said Act is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following words: "The said Corporation may borrow a sum of money, not exceeding sixteen thousand dollars, for repairing and enlarging the College building at Antigonish, and shall repay the same in four annual instalments, with interest at a rate not exceeding six per centum per annum, such interest to be paid annually. The loan may be obtained at once or in portions from time to time as the Governors may require the same, and they shall give the lenders debentures or coupons for the amount of the loan, the interest on which shall be paid annually. The loan shall be a charge upon the land and personal property of the Corporation, and not against the individual members thereof."

In 1888 the sum mentioned in the above amendment was borrowed, and the new building completed. With the wing erected in 1880 the building consists of a central part ninety by thirty-nine feet, with a tower ninety feet high projecting sixteen feet in front, and two wings, each thirty-eight feet wide, one of them eighty and the other eighty-three feet in length, the latter

having an extension twenty-two by twenty-seven. The material is brick, which has proved to be of excellent quality. The building is well plumbed and ventilated and is heated throughout with hot water.

In 1894 a further amendment was made to legalize the election by the Alumni Association, recently established, of two additional Governors. It is the following:

AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 77, OF THE ACTS OF 1882, ENTITLED "AN ACT TO INCORPORATE, ETC."

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

1. Section 1 of Chapter 77, of the Acts of 1882, is hereby amended by adding after the word "Barrister," in the fifth line, the words "And two persons to be elected annually by the Alumni Association of St. Francis Xavier's College."

2. Section 4 of said Act is hereby amended by adding the words "Named in Section 3 of said Act," after the word "Governors" in the second line thereof.

COURSE OF STUDIES.

The studies taken up each year of the course and the amount of time assigned to the various subjects are set forth in and may be easily gathered from the subjoined Time Table. For the greater convenience of students intending to qualify for Provincial scholarships the text-books used are as far as possible the same as those prescribed by the Council of Public Instruction of this Province for the County academies.

By arrangement with a business firm in town, most of these text books can be supplied at short notice by the College. Others are imported direct from the publishers for the benefit of students.

Special attention is given to English, the Classics, particularly Latin, and to Philosophy; nor are the Sciences, so-called, by any means neglected. The two professors in Philosophy are graduates of the Propaganda College, Rome, as are also the professors of the higher Classics. Elocution and some other subjects are very well taught by a graduate of the well-known Jesuit College, Boston, Mass., whilst the professor of Chemistry and Botany made his Science course at the Universities of McGill and Harvard. The studies in the lower classes are adapted to the needs of young men wishing to prepare for commercial life.

There are three classes receiving instruction in Christian Doctrine. Once a week an hour is given to each class separately

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and on Sundays all assemble in the College chapel to hear a discourse from one of the Reverend Professors. To permit of greater freedom in the choice of studies and to avoid more easily conflicts between one lecture and another it has been found expedient to have class work begin with 8 30 a. m. and close at 4 p. m., there being an intermission of an hour and a half at 12.30 p. m.; but unless in exceptional cases no one will be required to attend class more than five hours each day.

The year is divided into two sessions, the first ending Jan. 31st and the second with the close of the year. At the end of each session there will be a written examination. One will begin early in January and will be known as the Sessional Examination; the other will begin in June and will be the Terminal Examination. Upon the results of both these examinations promotion at the end of the year will depend. To secure a pass into the next year an average of 50 per cent. on the papers set at both examinations must be made. No less than 50 out of a possible 100 may be made in English, Latin, Christian Doctrine and Philosophy, nor less than 30 in any other branch.

ADMISSION.

Applicants for admission not personally known to some member of the Faculty must bring a certificate of good moral character from a responsible person. Students from other colleges will be expected to bring testimonials from the institution last attended. Students are admitted at any time during the year, but those coming late are placed at a serious disadvantage, besides being a hindrance to the progress of others. Parents are therefore requested to send their sons in time to begin study on the day set down in the Calendar.

In connection with the College there is a High School department into which pupils are admitted from the common schools, but they must be sufficiently advanced to take up the work usually done in the first year of the Provincial High Schools. For the year 1894-5 there will also be a class of pupils in the College doing the work of Grades VII. and VIII. of the common school course of this Province.

MATRICULATION.

To be admitted as an undergraduate in Arts a Matriculation Examination must be passed of which the following is a syllabus:

Latin: Grammar, Morphology and Elementary Syntax, Composition as in Arnold's Latin Prose Composition to Ex. 30. Cæsar, Gallic War Book VI., Cornelius Nepos, One Life, (for 1894-5 Epaminondas.) Or any equivalent work.

Greek or French: Grammar and easy sentences, as in Initia Græca Part I, or French Principia, Part I.

Mathematics: Arithmetic entire; Geometry, Books I., II. and III, and exercises at end of books I. and II.; Algebra to the end of Simple Equations.

English: Grammar, Parsing and Analysis of Sentences, Composition, Elementary and advanced as in Dalglish, Short Essay and Critical study of an author announced from year to year (for 1894-95 Goldsmith's *Traveller*.)

History: British and Canadian.

Geography: Canadian and General.

The examination will be held in June of each year. A certificate of successful examination on a syllabus equivalent to the above, will exempt from the College Matriculation, provided the candidate made the marks on each subject required by the college standards. The standard for Matriculation is the same as that for the Terminal Examinations.

DEGREES.

Undergraduates of good character who complete the course are entitled to the degree of B. A., provided they make an average of not less than 60 per cent. at the Sessional and Terminal examinations of each year, and make no less than 60 out of a possible 100 in Latin, English and Philosophy, not less than 50 on Christian Doctrine nor less than 40 on any other subject of the course.

A Bachelor of Arts, of at least three years standing and of good reputation, who produces a thesis satisfactory to the Faculty on a literary, scientific, or philosophical subject, is entitled to the degree of M. A.

A persistent indulgence in tobacco chewing within College buildings may entail an extra weekly charge upon students so indulging.

All students not qualifying the Academic Department for a participation in the Government Grant to County Academies are charged tuition.

Charges are payable at the beginning of each session, i. e., in September and February. The College will not undertake to provide for the current expenses of Students unless a sum is placed for that purpose on deposit in advance with the Rector. The Rector, to supply the neglect of parents or guardians in this particular, may draw on them at sight in advance for a sum considered to be sufficient. Parents are recommended not to give pocket money to their sons. The College Bursar will supply what is necessary. The College will not hold itself responsible for moneys not deposited with the Rector or Bursar.

In preparing their outfit Students should not forget a good supply of Stockings (half a dozen pairs), of pocket handkerchiefs (a half dozen), and of towels (three). An overcoat, a pair of over-shoes and two pairs of rubbers will be necessary during the fall, winter, and spring months.

DISCIPLINE.

The discipline of the College is so tempered, that whilst opportunity is afforded for the development of a sense of personal responsibility, no one is allowed to so abuse his opportunities as to waste his own time or be an obstacle to the well being or progress of others. Habitual infringement of discipline, profanity, or immodesty of language, or the introduction and use of intoxicating liquors lead to expulsion. Damage done by Students to College property is chargeable to their account.

All reading matter intended for Students must be submitted to the Vice-Rector for approval. Letters, whether sent or received, are subject to the inspection of the Rector. Day scholars are forbidden to perform errands of any kind for boarders. Parents wishing to call home their sons are requested to communicate directly with the Rector.

Day scholars when late for class or after absence from class must bring a note of explanation from parents and present it to all their teachers from whose classes they absented themselves. Prefects will take the place of parents in the case of boarders. Monthly Confession and Communion is a rule of the College. On the first Sunday of October, Rosary Sunday, students all take a pledge of total abstinence from intoxicating liquors.

THE LIBRARY.

The library consists of about 2800 volumes. Over fifty years ago a student named John Ryan, of Halifax, died in the Propaganda College, Rome. In his will he bequeathed his property to the Church in Nova Scotia, and after the division into two dioceses, that of Arichat received its share of Ryan's bequest, part of which was a large library purchased in Rome. The

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present College Library is in great part made up of the Ryan collection; but both Bishop McKinnon and Bishop Cameron contributed from their own libraries many valuable works. The late Rev. Alexander McLeod, of Arisaig; Rev. John V. MacDonell, St. Andrew's; Rev. John Quinan, of Main-a-dieu, and Rev. John McDoagall, Red Islands, also bequeathed their libraries to the College.

With the formation of the Association of Alumni a new era has opened for this department of the College. Each alumnus promises to contribute yearly or induce somebody else to contribute something to the library, or to the museum or for the maintenance of the out-door and in-door sports. Largely through this action of the Alumni the contributions to the library for the past year were much more considerable than formerly. The following is a list of works donated during the year:

Besides these the College at its own expense procured a number of works during the year for reference by professors and students and for the students' reading. A small fee of 50 cents is charged for the use of books from the reading library. To save expenses to the students the use of many school books is given for a nominal sum.

SOURCES OF REVENUE.

The revenue of the College is derived from an Endowment Fund, from tuition, and from occasional donations. The Academic Department receives the usual grant according to the average attendance. Were it not for the self-sacrifice of the Reverend Professors, who, besides their board, receive little more than a nominal salary, the revenue from the above sources would be insufficient to meet expenses. A debt of some thousands of dollars on the College buildings still remains unpaid, and a further expenditure of three or four thousand dollars will have to be made next summer for the enlargement of the kitchen and other necessary improvements. ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

The hopes expressed in our last Calendar, regarding the early formation of an Association of Alumni, have been realized. On the 11th and 12th of October, 1893, the first meeting was held, and the manifest enthusiasm displayed by all the old students present demonstrated conclusively that no mistake had been made in sending to them the invitation to bind themselves in an Association for the purpose of promoting more effectually the interests of the College.

At this meeting fifty members were enrolled and paid their annual fee which was fixed at \$1.00. Dr. Hugh Cameron, M. P., Inverness, presided, and Alexander McNeil, Esq., Barrister, of Halifax, was secretary. A set of by-laws was drawn out and ordered to be printed and sent to the members before the next meeting which, it was resolved, should be coincident with the College Closing Exercises in June, 1894. The following officers were elected :

On the evening of the 11th a dinner was given by the College, in the College dining room, and it was followed in the Assembly hall by a very entertaining programme of toasts, choice recitations, music — vocal and instrumental, the whole closing with a very amusing farce. It was resolved at the next day's meeting to make the dinner a feature of each yearly gathering.

The Board of Governors of the College having signified their consent to an addition to its body of two members to be elected annually by the Alumni, the Association, to legalize the election, took measures to have itself incorporated, and to secure such amendments to the Act of 1882 under which the Governors of the College were made a corporate body, as would admit the new Governors on to the Board on a footing of legal equality with the others. The Act of 1882 was accordingly amended in the Session of the Legislature of 1894; and in the same session an Act was passed incorporating the Alumni.

 and assigns, are hereby declared a body corporate by the name
 and style of "The Alumni Association of St. Francis Xavier's
 College," and under that name shall have all the powers, rights
 and privileges made incident to a corporation by any law in force
 in this province.

2. The object of the said corporation is hereby declared to
 be the promotion of the interests of the St. Francis Xavier's
 College, by such ways and means as the said corporation may
 from time to time deem advisable.

3. The members of said corporation shall be all those who
 are or shall from time to time be admitted as members of the
 said alumni association, in accordance with the constitution and
 by-laws that for the time being govern the said association in
 such matters, and who shall continue to be members in good
 standing in accordance with said constitution and by-laws.

4. The said corporation shall have full power in its corpor-
 ate name to purchase, receive, take, hold, possess and enjoy for
 its own use and benefit property of every kind, real, personal or
 mixed, and improve and use the same for the benefit of the said
 corporation, and shall have full power to take, receive and
 enjoy all profits, rents, interests, dividends, and increase of any
 such property, and the corporation is hereby fully empowered
 and authorized to convey, sell, assign, and transfer any of its
 property either by way of mortgage or absolutely, and to convert

the said property or any part thereof into money, and from time to time to invest any moneys of the said corporation in such securities and in such manners as the corporation sees fit.

5. All books, moneys, goods and chattels, property and debts belonging to or owing to the said society or association hereby incorporated, shall be on the coming into operation of this Act fully and completely vested in the said corporation, and belong to the same, their successors and assigns absolutely forever.

6. All fees, fines, dues, subscriptions, or moneys at any time due and payable under and by virtue of any by-law of the said corporation to the said corporation by any member thereof, may be sued for and recovered by the said corporation from such member, with costs, in any court of competent jurisdiction; on the trial of any such suit, the roll of members of the said corporation, containing the defendant's name, shall be taken and received as *prima facie* evidence that he is a member of the said corporation; and the records of the said corporation showing the by-laws under which the fee, fine, dues or subscription sought to be recovered is due and payable, shall be taken and received as *prima facie* evidence that such by-law was duly and legally passed and enacted.

7. The said corporation is hereby fully authorized and empowered to make and ordain, and at pleasure to repeal, alter, amend or add to any and all such by-laws as may be found necessary or expedient for the government and conduct of its affairs, whether the same refer to the carrying into effect the object of the said corporation, the conditions of eligibility for membership, the admission and expulsion of members, the number and names of its officers, the number and places of its meetings, the method of conducting its business, the imposition of fees, fines, dues or subscriptions upon its members, or to any

PROSPECTUS.

This institution was founded in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-three, by the Rt. Rev. Dr. Cameron, Bishop of Antigonish. It is under the direction of the Sisters of the Congregation de Notre Dame whose chief centre and Mother House is at Villa Maria, Montreal.

The location and healthful surroundings of St. Bernard's secure for it every sanitary advantage. A tennis court, a croquet lawn, and the many beautiful walks in the vicinity of the town, afford facility for agreeable exercise in the open air. The building is heated throughout with hot water, and its spacious and well-ventilated dormitory has a bath-room attached.

The class-rooms are furnished with all the improvements and appliances requisite in a modern course of study. A select library to which the pupils have free access, is used for reading matter and for reference; and the valuable philosophical and chemical apparatus, belonging to the laboratory of St. Francis Xavier's College is at the disposal of teachers and pupils in illustrating lectures in Physics, Chemistry and Botany.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Board and Tuition in the entire English Course, Latin, French, Vocal Music in class, Calis- thenics, Embroidery, and Plain Sewing, \$2.00 per week.

Payments for each session should be made in advance. Pupils are received at any time during the year, but parents and guardians are earnestly requested to send their daughters or wards at the very opening of the term. The loss of the introductory lessons places pupils at a very serious disadvantage for the rest of the term and materially retards their progress.

Those who wish clothing, books, music, etc., provided by the Institution must deposit a sum sufficient for the purpose with the Mother Superior.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The Course of Study is divided into three parts: Elementary, Intermediate and Senior.

ELEMENTARY COURSE.

The Elementary Department embraces four classes. In these classes, instruction is given in the following subjects:

Christian Doctrine, Reading, Writing, Linear Drawing, Language, Recitations, Spelling, Arithmetic, Sacred History, Location or Geography, Hygiene, Object and Information Lessons, Word Forms or Grammar, Sewing, French, Calisthenics, Singing, Politeness.

INTERMEDIATE COURSE.

The Intermediate Department embraces three classes in all of which instruction is continued in the branches begun in the Elementary Department. In addition to these, History and the elements of Book-Keeping, Algebra and Geometry are taught.

Information Lessons now develop into a study of the rudiments of the Natural Sciences.

SENIOR OR ACADEMIC COURSE.

The Senior Department consists of three classes. The pupils who enter this department have learned to prepare abstracts of

subjects already studied and are able to give information. Information Lessons are given in the classification of animals and plants. Pupils are acquainted with a course in the Natural Sciences.

The study of the Constitution of the earth is continued throughout the entire term. Pupils are introduced into the grounds of the Institution upon society.

The Mathematics are taught with a view to strengthening the mind.

The proficiency in the French language in this advanced department is shown by its Leading Author being given three times a year in St. Xavier's. French and also Physics are taught from the College.

The scholastic year is divided into three months each. The first term begins in September and ends on February the first. Exercises in the last term are upon which future success depends at the end of each

Pupils whose conduct during the entire term is satisfactory at the third year of the School of Graduation or at the end of the senior course they are admitted to the terminal examination and go below 30 points in English; and the

subjects already studied. They have acquired habits of observation and are able to judge with some discrimination. By Information Lessons, they have obtained a fair knowledge of the classification of animals, plants and minerals, and have become acquainted with a large number of facts connected with the Natural Sciences.

The study of Christian Doctrine systematically continued throughout the entire course, here produces a fuller insight into the grounds of Faith and the effects of Christian Morals upon society.

The Mathematical Studies are still pursued, with a view to strengthening the reasoning faculties.

The proficiency in English already acquired, admits in this advanced department of a more comprehensive study of its Leading Authors. Lectures on English Literature are given three times a week by a Professor of St. Francis Xavier's. French and Latin are elective. The latter branch, and also Physics and Chemistry, are taught by Professors from the College.

The scholastic year is divided into two sessions of five months each. The first session begins the first Monday of September and ends January thirty-first. The second begins on February the first and terminates with the Commencement Exercises in the last week of June. A written examination upon which future classification will largely depend is held at the end of each term.

GRADUATION.

Pupils whose conduct and application have given satisfaction during the entire course will receive at the end of the third year of the Senior or Academic Course, a Certificate of Graduation or Diploma, provided that after entering the senior course they make an average at each sessional and terminal examination of 50 per cent. on all the papers set, and go below 30 per cent. in no subject, nor below 50 in English; and that in the terminal examinations of the

last or third year they make an average of 60 per cent., and do not fall below 60 in English, nor below 50 in Christian Doctrine, nor below 40 in any other subject.

Strangers placing pupils at the Academy are in all cases required to give satisfactory reference.

Letters written or received by the young ladies are subject to the inspection of the Mother Superior.

Each pupil's wardrobe should be marked in full.

In addition to a plentiful supply of linen, and clothing suitable for the different seasons, each pupil should be provided with a blouse waist of blue flannel for Calisthenics, a dressing jacket, towels, a toilet set consisting of brushes, combs, soap, and tooth-powder, a table set consisting of knife and fork, spoons, a napkin ring, and table napkins; also a work-box furnished with all the requisites for sewing, mending and darning.

A plain black costume is worn on Sundays and a pure white dress is required for the Commencement Exercises.

In accordance with the spirit of the Congregation de Notre Dame, the aim of each teacher is to form her pupils to habits of order, economy and simplicity and to inculcate that love of labor and that Christian devotedness which make and mark the true woman.

As the Sisters consider themselves conscientiously bound to do all in their power to secure the physical as well as the mental and moral well-being of those entrusted to their care, special attention is paid to the health of their pupils. Should a pupil be taken seriously ill, the services of a physician are secured and immediate information is given to parents.
