

## MEETINGS AND SERVICES.

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Hours of Divine Service on Sabbath, 11 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Sabbath Schools and Bible Class, 3 p.m.

Weekly Prayer Meeting, every Wednesday, 7.30 p.m.

Ladies' Aid Society, every Thursday, from October till May, 2 p.m.

The Kirk Session meets on the first Monday of every month at 7.30 p.m.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is dispensed quarterly, viz.: on the first Sabbath of March, June, September and December.

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## ELDERS' DISTRICTS.

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District No. 1—*Mr. Paterson*, Hull, Victoria Island, Le Breton Flats, and Richmond Road beyond the toll-gate.

District No. 2—*Mr. Bronson*, Richmond Road from the toll-gate eastward, Rochesterville and Albert Street West.

District No. 3—*Mr. G. P. Drummond*, Ashburnham Hill and eastward to Bank Street, northward to Sparks Street.

District No. 4—*Mr. Hamilton*, from Maria Street southward, and from Bank Street eastward to Elgin Street.

District No. 5—*Mr. Henry*, from Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 6—*Mr. A. Drummond*, from Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

District No. 7—*Mr. Elliott*, Lower Town from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

District No. 8—*Mr. Clegg*, Sandy Hill, from Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to Rideau River.

District No. 9—*Mr. Borthwick*, Gloucester, and Country Sections beyond Rideau River.

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## REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

In accordance with the practice of the past few years the Kirk Session submit to the annual meeting of the Congregation their statement regarding those interests of the Congregation more immediately under their direction; and, in doing so, they have to acknowledge the continued goodness of the Great Head of the Church and the inadequate use made of His mercies.

During the past year the numerical strength of the Congregation has not been greatly changed. Twenty-eight communicants have been added to the roll, and twenty-nine have been removed. At present there are in connection with the Congregation 373 communicants and 272 families. There have been entered on the Records of the Congregation during the year 34 baptisms and 17 deaths.

The Sabbath Schools continue to be well attended and efficiently conducted. Upper Town School, formerly under the superintendence of Mr. G. L. Orme, is now superintended by Mr. Jas. Gibson; Lower Town School by Mr. Larmonth, and Stewarton School by Mr. Elliot. There are upon the Roll of Upper Town School 26 office-bearers and 236 scholars; Lower Town School, 10 office-bearers and 70 scholars; Stewarton School, 9 office-bearers and 75 scholars, making a total of 381 under instruction in connection with the Sunday Schools of the Congregation, and 45 office-bearers engaged in the important work. This number includes the Bible Class formerly conducted by the Pastor, now conducted by Mr. Hamilton.

The contributions of the Sabbath Schools during the year amounted to \$229.72. These contributions have been devoted, as in previous years, to the support and education of the orphans in India, to the purchase of Sunday School papers, etc., and to incidental expenses incurred in the maintenance of the schools.

The Session have frequently drawn the attention of the congregation to the propriety of securing a larger attendance at the weekly prayer meeting. Efforts are made, by devoting one evening each month, to missionary

subjects, by Bible readings, and by other means, to render the weekly prayer meeting interesting and profitable. The Session earnestly desire that a larger proportion of the congregation would avail themselves of it.

The "Schedule System" has been continued for the purpose of securing the contributions of the congregation towards the Schemes of the Church recommended by the General Assembly, and a column has been set apart in the schedule, as on former occasions, for interest on the church loan. The congregation are aware of their obligation to pay \$2.050 per annum, as interest upon the debt still resting on the church. The most practicable way of providing this amount has been to secure the voluntary contributions of the congregation towards it with their contributions towards the general Schemes of the Church. The chief drawback to this arrangement is that, as a number decline to contribute, the burden which should be shared by all the members of the congregation is really borne by the contributors alone. The Session express the hope that a sense of justice on the part of non-contributors will lead them to repair this inequality.

The thanks of the congregation are due to district visitors, who, in addition to the work of reporting cases of sickness, distress, etc., and of distributing tracts and, in some cases, copies of the *Presbyterian Record*, have kindly acted as collectors to receive the contributions of the congregation, for the purposes specified in the schedule.

The Session have received for the Schemes of the Church, including contributions to the interest fund, the sum of \$2,534.73.

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The session have strictly regarded the wishes of contributors, where specified on their schedules, in apportioning the sums received by them. Wherever no such wishes were expressed the Session have exercised their discretion in dividing contributions among the various purposes indicated in the schedules.

Since our last annual meeting God has removed by death the Rev. Dr. Spence, who for many years was minister of this Congregation. The Session, expressing, as they believe, the sentiments of the Congregation, recorded the following minute regarding Dr. Spence's death:—

“The Kirk Session, having received intelligence of the death, on the 4th September, of the Rev. Alexander Spence, D.D., for nineteen years—from 1848 till 1867—minister of this Congregation, desire to record the high regard in which he was held by them. Faithful and considerate towards those who required his counsel, diligent and devoted in the public and private services of his ministry, and ever anxious to promote the welfare of the Congregation, he was esteemed and respected by all who knew him. A valuable counsellor in the Courts of the Church, he received, in recognition of his services, the highest honours that the Church could bestow. The Kirk Session recognize in his munificent bequests the clearest evidence of his deep and continued interest in the welfare of the Church in Canada, and in the poor, the sick and the orphans of Ottawa. They respectfully offer their fervent sympathy to Mrs. Spence in her bereavement and commit her to the compassion and the tender mercy of our Father in Heaven.”

It has been proposed that two memorial windows be placed in rear of the pulpit, one to the memory of the Rev. Dr. Spence, the other to the memory of the Rev. Wm. Durie. Plans for this purpose have been prepared, and, should the Temporal Committee concur in this proposal, it is the desire of the Session that the work should be proceeded with as soon as the means are procured.

The Statements of the Treasurer of the Kirk Session are herewith submitted.

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## REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

*To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa.*

The Temporal Committee beg respectfully to submit the various accounts for the financial year ending on the 15th February, 1879.

From a careful perusal of such accounts, it will be seen that the actual receipts which your Committee had at their disposal during the year, with the exception of the moneys received from the Kirk Session, for the purpose of meeting the liabilities of the Congregation, amounted to \$4,206.40; that the actual claims upon the Committee, which they should have been prepared to meet in full, amounted to about \$6,419.77; and that the amount paid by your Committee on account of these claims was \$5,594.77. Unless, therefore, the Kirk Session had come to the assistance of your Committee, they would have been out of pocket to the extent of \$1,388.37, with a liability in addition of \$825.00.

The figures have been put in this way to shew the Congregation that the liability of your Committee exceeded the receipts, the collection of which were under their immediate control, by \$2,213.40. The Kirk Session, however, paid your Committee out of the moneys received under the schedule system, \$1,650.00, leaving them, notwithstanding such assistance, with a liability which should have been wiped off during the past year of \$563.37. Now, your Committee would call attention to the fact, that if the total pew rents had been paid your Committee, with the assistance of \$816.79 from the Kirk Session, would have been able to pay all their liabilities.

Your Committee are aware that this matter of arrearages of pew rent is a standing grievance. Report after report has called attention to it without any apparent effect; for, out of 187 pew holders in this Church, 75 are in arrear for the year '78-'9, representing the large sum of \$1,396.35; while there is still a balance of old arrears, after wiping out a considerable sum as *bad*, of \$598.83. That your Committee have done their utmost

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to remedy or prevent this state of matters, none know better than the defaulters themselves. It has not been for want of repeated asking that the various amounts have not been collected.

Distasteful as the subject is, your Committee feel compelled to refer to it, in order to point out how unjustly the system which has been adopted of supplying the deficiency in the revenue falls upon the liberal and charitably disposed. For instance, the \$1,650.00 received during the year from the Kirk Session is just so much money (less some few hundred dollars) taken from those who have paid their pew rents in order to make up the deficiency caused by those who have not. For it is to be assumed, that no one will give to the collectors for the Schemes who has failed to contribute, to the extent of his pew rent at least, to the just debts of the Congregation with which he is connected. The Committee would not willingly hurt the feelings of any one who, from unforeseen misfortune, and the general distress, may be unable to meet a liability undertaken in good faith. The Congregation as a whole, as well as such individuals, must expect to suffer from the almost universal depreciation in property and the depressed state of trade and business, and, until better times come, the strong among them must be prepared to bear the burdens of the weak. Can it be, however, that the weak in our Congregation are in the serious proportion towards the strong of 75 to 103?

The Committee for the coming year will necessarily have to face the fact that their revenues will be deficient. The probable claims upon them will be over \$6,000.00, and, even if all the pew rents and Glebe rents, and the probable available arrears of such, be paid, it has been calculated that the Committee will have to rely upon voluntary contributions to the extent of at least \$600.00; and this \$600.00 will be increased to \$2,000.00, if the pew rents are as heavily in arrear during the coming year as during the past.

Owning a large property, the Congregation may be thought by some to be in a position to contribute much more extensively to the work of the Church. But it must be borne in mind, that apart from the rents received

from the tenants of portions of the Glebe (about \$655.00) the real estate is entirely unavailable. The most saleable portions of the Glebe are under long leases having many years yet to run, and, if it were not so, no part of it could probably be now sold for a price which it would be right to accept. It will be seen, therefore, that no trust whatever can be placed in our property, for relieving us from any portion of our debt for many years to come. It is as well that the Congregation should understand this to be the case. Your Committee believe, nevertheless, that, notwithstanding this fact and the pressure of the times, the Congregation both can and will pay their just debts, and contribute generously besides to the work of Christ elsewhere.

They have gone thus fully into the financial position of the Congregation that all may know what is expected from them. There may be some inclined to believe that, with more energetic managers, the balance sheet would be pleasanter to contemplate. This may be so, and yet your Committee feel that they have done their utmost for the interests of the Congregation during the past year. They have collected \$680.00 of the old arrears of pew rents, were valued at \$500; they have collected \$758.52 from which the tenants as against \$597.50, collected during the previous year; and they have collected within \$242.06 of the amount of pew rents collected during the previous year; the total of all the sums collected coming to within \$68.84 of the amount collected by their predecessors for the year 1877-'8. They might, perhaps, have resorted to what to some would have seemed harsh measures for the collection of your debts; but if they have erred at all they have preferred to do so on the side of leniency; believing that the best assistance any managing committee can have must be the right feeling of the individual members of the Congregation, and the regard which each ought to have for the general benefit of the whole and the common good.

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*present pursued should be adopted for the purpose of raising the annual interest on the Church loan.*

*In accordance with this request of the Congregation the Kirk Session and Temporal Committee held a joint-meeting, at which it was resolved :—*

*“ That the Schedule System be continued as heretofore, and that the attention of the Congregation be drawn in the Annual Report to the fact that contributions to the interest on the Church loan, for the past year, fell considerably below the requirements of that fund, and to the equity of the large number who are not accustomed to contribute to this fund, bearing their fair share of the necessary expenditure of the Congregation, in the matter of the interest on the general liability.”*

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REPORT OF  
THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

The Ladies' Aid Society have held weekly meetings during the past season; the proceeds of their work being devoted chiefly towards tinting and painting the Lecture Room and Vestry, assisting the Protestant Orphans' Home and Protestant Hospital, and providing funds for the relief of the poor.

A Committee of this Society, consisting of Mrs. Perley, Mrs. Smellie, Mrs. J. M. Taylor, Mrs. Elliott, Mrs. Gordon, and Miss McLean, were specially entrusted with the work of Poor Relief. This Committee met weekly in the Lecture Room, to relieve those in want, and, owing to the severity of the season and the scarcity of employment, a larger number than usual have required help. Each family that received assistance was visited by some members of the Committee, and relief was given in the form of clothing, food, and fuel, and in some cases by the payment of rent or taxes. A quantity of clothing was prepared for this purpose by the Ladies' Aid Society; donations of clothing, wood and groceries were received from members of the Congregation; and the Committee availed themselves largely of the arrangement made at the general Soup Kitchen for the supply of soup and wood at greatly reduced rates. The work done by the Poor Relief Committee may be seen from the following summary of Receipts and Expenditure:
