HOW TO KNOW APPENDICITIS LISUAL symptoms of appendicitis are pain, low down in the right side of the abdomen; tenderness at the seat of the pain; rigidity of the muscles; rise of temperature; vomiting and either constipa-

ture; vomiting and either constipa-tion or diarrhoea.

Appendicitis is the result of in-fection which usually extends from the colon to the appendix. This is proven by the fact that appendi-citis sufferers frequently have been long sufferers from colitis, or infec-tion of the colon.

When a person finds himself suf-fering from symptoms, suggesting

when a person mas himself suf-fering from symptoms, suggesting appendicitis, he should go to bed at once, and take a large warm enema, and have hot applications made over the lower abdomen.

If the symptoms are not speedily relieved, that is within ten or twelve hours from the beginning of the attack or if nauses and youn't-

ing are present, an operation probably is required.

Delay in cases where the need of an operation is indicated is often extremely dangerous. Even when pain and perhaps other symptoms





Armed Men on Trains to Protect Passengers — Tells of Much Strife in Land.

Relating interesting stories of his travels through different parts of China A. J. Lelacheur, formerly of Saint John, writes to friends in this city.
