



Baltic City Lost For 825 Years Believed Located By Fishermen

Berlin, Oct. 4-Off Arkona, at the northern extremity of the Baltic island of Ruegen, deep sea fishermen have discovered on the sea bottom the remains of a large mediaeval warship, with many of her old guns still on

With difficulty they salved two of the primitive cannon. From their workmanship it is thought that the vessel was a Danish warship, contemporary with the phrate Hans Stoertebecker, who was hanged in Lubeck market-square in the year 1433.

The diver who brought up the guns maintains that near the ship he saw dimly the remains of immense walls. This has started the theory that the site has been discovered of the long-lost city of Vineta, which was swallowed up by the Baltic 825 years ago, about the time when the North Sea enguiphed the Isle of Lomes and formed the Goodwin Sands.



New York, Oct. 3-A third expedition designed to recover \$3,000,000 in gold, silver and precious stones, which have been at the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean for thirteen years, has sailed from the Tebo Yacht Basin plant of the Todd Shipyards Corporation, South Brooklyn. The expedition will leave on two steam trawlers, the Foam and Spray.

A group of well-known New York business and society men are behind

John F. O'Hagan, a noted diver, was commissioned to organize the expedition. With him are Frank J. Grilley and Fredelin, C. C. Neilson, former United States Navy divers.

The sunken treasure is all aboard the Ward Line steamship Merida which went down sixty miles off the Virginia Capes thirteen years ago after a collision with the United Fruit Company's steamer Admiral Farragut.

The cargo of the Merida consisted of a large amount of silver, about \$500,000 in gold and many precious stones, among them the famous Maximilian rubies, once the pride of the Empress Marie Charlotte, mad widow of the ill-fated ruler of Mexico.

The vessel had 4,700 tons of copper in her hold as ballast. She is be-lieved to be resting on an even keel on a hard sandy bottom. The first expedition to recover the treasure was made in 1917. In 1921, the steamer Ripple was sent to hunt for the treasure. Both expeditions
