B. F. KEITH, VADEVILLE KING, DIES SUDDENLY

Drops Dead in Hotel In Brookline, Mass.

HE WAS 67 YEARS OLD

Married, For Second Time, Only Few Months Ago—Had Built up Wonderful Business—W. H. Golding's Tribute

(Canadian Press) Palm Beach, Fla., March 27.—B. F. Keith, while not unexpected by those in his intimate circle, removes the most conspicuous figure in the entertainment world in America in more than a quarter of a century.

Mr. Keith was sixty-seven years of age. Apparently he had been in the best of health. Mrs. Keith, and Paul Keith, his son, were with him. The body will be taken to Boston tomorrow. Mr. Keith was married to Miss Ethel Bird Chase in Washington, D. C., on October 29, last. They were spending the winter here.

Mr. Keith was understood to be many times a millionaire. The death of Benjamin Franklin Keith, while not unexpected by those in his intimate circle, removes the most conspicuous figure in the entertainment world in America in more than a quarter of a century.

Golding, manager of The Imperial here, said today:—"One of the outside characteristics of the Keith system of business, a characteristic inculcated by the late head of the concern, is what is known as the 'Keith loyalty' on the part of employees, great and small.

Wilson's Plea

President's Appeal in Panama Tolls Matter

A QUESTION OF POLICY

Looks at it From Standpoint of Relations With Other Powers Rather Than in Light of Treaty Obligations

(Canadian Press) Washington, D. C., March 27.—President Wilson made a strong statement today in support of the administration's position on the Panama Canal toll exemption case.

The president considers that the issue ought to be decided by congress without considering in any way its previous stand, because new elements have been injected into the situation, which surpass in importance and gravity those upon which the question hinged before congress previously passed on it.

Members of congress, the president believes, ought to align themselves not according to their interpretations of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, but according to their desire to support or endorse the foreign policy of the government.

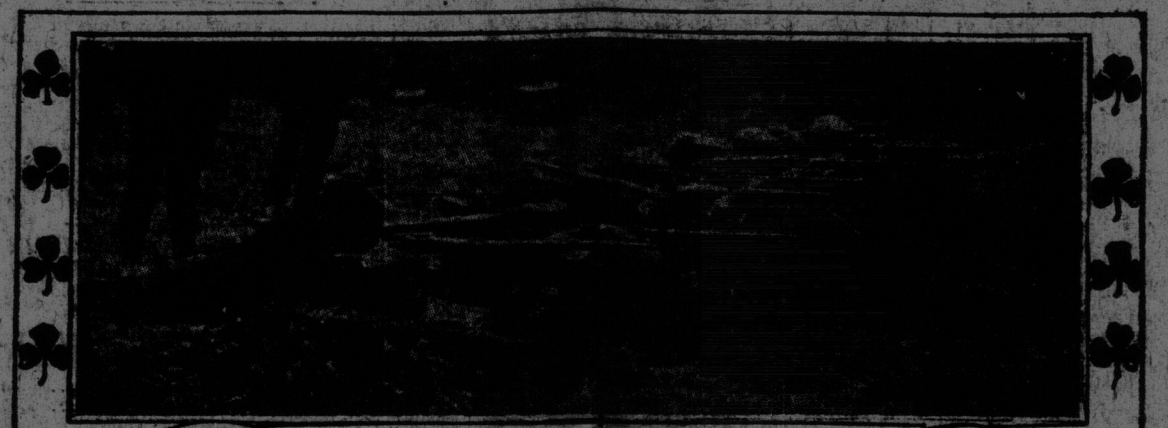

MATTER BEFORE BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL. ALSO ANOTHER INDUSTRY. Tags for Jewellers and Duggan's Proposals for Steamship Service By Allan and Furness Lines.

Cabinet Twice In Session Over Crisis

Asquith's Statement on French Resignation Deferred Till This Afternoon

Again a Day of Agitation Over Matters Arising in Home Rule Situation—Did King Exercise Influence With Seely? Suffragettes Take a Hand

(Canadian Press) London, Eng., March 27.—Field Marshal Sir John French, who has tendered his resignation as head of the British army, was called into the meeting of the cabinet ministers today to discuss the subject which Premier Asquith had promised to give to the House of Commons, had been postponed until five o'clock this afternoon.

THE cabinet meeting was called off at ten o'clock and they were still together at half past twelve. It was deduced from this protracted meeting that they found difficulty in repairing the rift in the army organization caused by the resignations of Sir John French, chief of the general staff, and Lieut. General Sir John Spenser Ewart, adjutant general to the forces.

THE two generals today seemed determined not to withdraw their resignations, as they considered they had received a rebuff by the government's repudiation of the guarantees promised to the signatories of the Third Cavalry Brigade at the Curragh, who had been told they were not to be called on to fight the Ulster Ulster.

ASQUITH called a second meeting of the cabinet this afternoon and a ministerial crisis is believed to be imminent. Members of the cabinet were hurriedly summoned to the premier's home from the House of Commons whither they had gone after attending the cabinet sessions early in the day.

Excitement among members of parliament was increased today when the Press Association sent out this statement:—"Postponement of Premier Asquith's statement had caused grave impression. Ministers discuss the matter before Premier Asquith made his appearance in the House of Commons."

THE cabinet meeting was the first agency to secure the news that French and Ewart had resigned. DID KING INFLUENCE COLONEL SEELY? New York, March 27.—A cable to the Tribune this morning from London says:—"The political situation continues to be one of the utmost gravity. The resignation of Field Marshal Sir John French, chief of the general staff, makes the army still the centre of interest, but the temper of the Liberal, Radical and Labor supporters of the government makes the position of the king one which is in reality of more vital interest, though slightly removed from the actual centre, while the fate of the government itself also hangs in the balance."

TWENTY-FIVE LOSE LIVES IN DISASTERS AT SEA

Issue In Doubt Steamer Goes Down And Eighteen Perish

Federals Say Defeat of Villa Complete HAS LOST THOUSANDS

No Sign of Great Victory in Villa's Telegram to Juarez But He Orders Airship and Railroad Equipment Forwarded

(Canadian Press) Mexico City, Mex., March 27.—Minister of War, Blanquet, today announced that Federal troops had won complete victory over rebels at Torreon. The statement was accepted with reserve.

Washington, D. C., March 27.—The Mexican embassy today received the following despatch from the Mexican consul at Torreon: "Rebels have been severely defeated at Torreon. A column of 5,000 troops, under General Moura, has left Saltillo in flanking movement to reinforce the garrison. The rebels last week also suffered a severe repulse at Monclova, losing more than 1,000 men as well as at Artega, where the losses were more than 100."

Juarez, Mexico, March 27.—From federal sources today came the news that the army situation, but the resignation of Sir John French yesterday, though on the grounds that he put his name to a paper since disavowed by the government officers of the Carrage Camp and has given them reason to believe they have lapsed from the highest ranks.

There were reports in Dublin last night that the Carrage officers are planning to resign aged, while rumors of all kinds are flying about here concerning the prospects of resignation. Ten general officers called at the War Office yesterday and conferred with General French prior to his resignation.

Liverpool, Eng., March 27.—Sunlock, an outsider, owned by T. X. Tyler, today won the Grand National steeple chase. Trianon III was second and Luttrell III third.

King George's entry, Twelfth Laners, was scratched. Sunlock went to post with odds of 100 to 6 against him. Trianon III at 100 to 8 and Luttrell III at 10 to 1. Sunlock won by eight lengths. Twenty horses started and twelve fell.

LIMITS BURDEN ON EACH PARISH

Amendment to Pauper Lunatic Act

WILL HELP ST. JOHN

No Parish Asked to Support More Than Six and Seventy-Five is Limit For Municipality—Bills Agreed To

Fredericton, N. B., March 26.—The house met at 3.15 p. m.

Mr. Dugal gave notice of inquiries regarding the rebuilding of the bridge at Ferry's Point, Kings county; timber license issued for crossing between Miramichi and Bass River, parish of Bathurst, Gloucester county; appointment of Philippe Delavert as provincial constable; cost of opening the draw at the Millish bridge, Baywater, Kings county; bonds guaranteed for the St. John & Quebec Railway Company above Grand Falls Point; steel bridges yet to be painted; business methods of the Canadian Home Investment Company; the Quebec & St. John Construction Company; incorporation of the Sussex, Studholm & Havelock Railway Company.

Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill relating to the provincial hospital. In explaining it he said it was an amendment to the act of last year, which required all municipalities to contribute \$1 per week towards the cost of maintenance of their pauper lunatics. The principle of last year's bill was sound in every respect. The maintenance of such persons was in no sense a charge against the province, but against the municipalities to which they belonged. The government was not asking the municipalities to bear the cost, but only to contribute one-third of what had been maintained in the house, was considerably less than was paid by the municipalities in other provinces, and under the provisions of this bill they would be relieved from making payments. One parish in Gloucester had 11 patients; one in Kent, 9; one in Northumberland, 18; while in Westmorland, three parishes had 18, 11 and 23. In future each of these parishes would pay for six patients only, which would be considerable relief.

The bill provides that no municipality should be called upon to maintain more than six patients, and no municipality more than seventy-five. There are some isolated parishes in which the number of pauper lunatics is very large in proportion to the number and beyond their paying capacity, and under the provisions of this bill they would be relieved from making payments. One parish in Gloucester had 11 patients; one in Kent, 9; one in Northumberland, 18; while in Westmorland, three parishes had 18, 11 and 23. In future each of these parishes would pay for six patients only, which would be considerable relief.

Farm Settlement Board Has Bought 184 and Sold 135—Some of Those From Whom Properties Were Secured

Hon. Mr. Murray, in answer to Mr. Pelletier's inquiry in the N. B. Legislature yesterday said:

Question—How much money has been spent by the Farm Settlement Board, since its organization, in the purchase of farms?

Answer—The Farm Settlement Board spent for actual purchase of farms \$141,165.

Question—How many farms have been purchased—and how many have been sold?

Answer—The Farm Settlement Board has purchased 184 farms and sold 135. Quite a large number of these on hand are engaged to be taken over in the near future, for which we will receive initial payments.

Question—Who were these farms bought from? What was the average of each? Where were they situated and what was the price paid for each?

In reply to this question, Hon. Mr. Murray gave a list of the properties, from whom bought, size, location and price paid. The list includes:

All about that little city are evidences of the activity of the club, and the organization has achieved a state-wide reputation for its effective work in behalf of the public. It has secured a large public library, an auditorium and a city park. It co-operates with the parent-teachers' association and with the public school authorities in the planning of their work. Under the auspices of the club educators from the state university deliver lectures in the public auditorium on subjects of interest. Just now a committee of the club is preparing a shade tree ordinance that will require citizens to plant trees with more uniformity and with due consideration for the beauty of the landscape. Another committee is making a survey of the city preparatory to launching a cleanup campaign on an extensive scale this spring. The club already has secured the passage of an ordinance requiring citizens to clean up yards and cut the weeds in the streets.

A shipment of duck eggs from Ireland, the first made in more than a quarter of a century, recently reached New York. There were 2200 dozen in shipment, which was made possible by the new tariff law.

By means of a new treatment it is hoped to give curly locks to straight-haired children in less than a month, according to the London papers.

THE NEW YORK PICKPOCKET
Hungrier of Thieves—How a "Mob" Works—A Story That Has a Moral
The hungriest thief in New York city, says the New York Herald, is the pickpocket. His greed is insatiable, and when he wages his trade he never quits until he has grabbed almost every dollar in sight.
He will start to work in the early hours of the morning, and if not apprehended he may still be found busily on the job when the after-theatre crowds are surging into restaurants or crowding platforms of the subway or congregating at the various transfer points preparatory to starting home.
In the eyes of the pickpocket a dollar is a dollar, and as the majority of them momentarily expect to be "collared" while playing their trade they firmly believe in making hay while the sun shines, because they must lay by a certain sum for "fall money," a fund to defend them if arrested.
How a "Mob" Works
A few days ago a detective was descending the stairway to the subway at Forty-second street. A line had formed leading to the ticket booth and at a glance he saw there was a suspicious bit of luggage going about the point at the fall out of line, and, securing himself behind a pillar, awaited developments. Sure enough a pickpocket's "mob" was at work.
A man in the line was being violently pushed by the man directly behind him. Upon remonstrating with the impatient one the latter apologized, saying the crowd was due to the impudence of the crowd behind him. The man directly in front of the complaining citizen suddenly determined to sprint his way out of line. He fell back a step and facing about, twisted himself in such a way that he completely turned around the man directly behind him. The one next in line, the "tool" who does the lifting, was prepared for the move, and as the still protesting victim was whirled violently about, he the "tool" had slipped from the pocket of the victim's inner coat a long wallet, and in a flash slipped it to the "fall" who was behind him, and who with outstretched hand received the wallet and quickly made a breif for the next directly behind him.
He was seized, wallet in hand, by the watching detective, who dragging him along by the collar, landed upon the "tool" and grabbed him. Calling to a bystander he ordered him to seize the man in the "mob" who was being whirled out, and by this means the entire crew was rounded up by a lone detective. All three were convicted and sent away.
The Woman Crook
Nearly all the women pickpockets are married to thieves, yet seldom do husband and wife work together. Each has his own lay, and they never cross other's paths while in the field. Sixth Avenue is a fertile field for woman pickpockets. There is a department store there which operates an omnibus line across town and these women apparently were made to order to suit the purposes of thieves.
They crowd their way into the vehicle and in the jam that always follows they open handbags, abstract what of value lies within, and then, complaining of faintness, leave the bus to return and walk for the next one. Lines of women pickpockets are being displayed. Women gather about these little stands in droves.
Every woman is latent on pulling, hauling, and examining every remnant on the counter. The clever pickpocket adds up to the woman she wants to rob, picks up a piece of silk, and, adroitly manipulating it, gets it so that she obscures it to the downward vision of the victim, and then, unobserved, opens her handbag and her highly sensitive fingers go straight to the purse or loose bag therein. She moves on to the next promising-looking candidate and repeats the performance. Two handbags at a single counter have been robbed in this way.
Prepared for the Worst
Pickpockets, especially those belonging to "mob" are provident. They know they are liable to arrest at any moment. Therefore they always keep a big fund on hand which they designate "fall money." This is needed to buy bail or, in case a compromise can be effected, to refund the amount stolen. They are arrested and bail is asked for. By turning over to some professional bondsman an amount in cash equivalent to the bond asked they can effect their liberty.

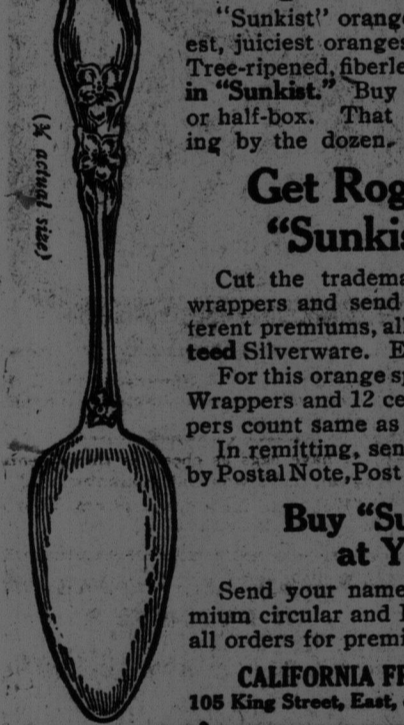
Local Board of Trade Taking Up the Matter STATEMENT PRESENTED

The fact that Canada is supplying British Guiana with only six and a half per cent of her imports and that even this amount is decreasing in spite of the fact that this country is capable of supplying all the needs of the colony and has a heavily subsidized steamship line to aid in the development of the Trade, has aroused the St. John Board of Trade to the need of vigorous steps towards securing a larger share of this profitable business.

countries outside the British Empire millions of dollars worth of products which might be secured from this colony to better advantage.

Board to Take it Up The state of the trade between the two countries has been presented to the council of the Board of Trade by A. J. Sollows, a native of British Guiana for many years engaged in business in St. John, in such a convincing manner that the matter is to be laid before a full meeting of the board with the intention of recommending to the dominion government that a special trade agent be employed to foster the traffic between the two countries.

At present Canada has only one trade agent for the British West Indies and British Guiana, while the opportunities existing in the latter country alone are believed to be of sufficient importance to justify the use of one man's entire time. The recently adopted preferential tariff between the two countries gives Canada an advantage of twenty per cent in the customs duties over her chief rival, the United States, while the steamship freight rates from Canadian ports, in many cases, are no greater than from New York. With these advantages the trade seems to be capable of great expansion even under existing circumstances and the apparent prospect of growth and development in the southern colony will make the trade of more importance than of year to year.

The last census of British Guiana gave the population as 810,000. Sanitary conditions have been given as one of the causes why depopulation of the country has not grown more rapidly through immigration. In the past, but this objection has been largely removed through the efforts which have been made to improve the health of the country. Yellow fever has been absolutely driven out of the colony by the supply of pure water from artesian wells in the larger communities has removed the danger of contagion from poor water.

Another reason for the limitation of development work in the past has been the lack of railway facilities and this also is to be overcome by the construction of a line from Georgetown on the coast, to the east of Brazil, a distance of about 800 miles, through valuable forest and agricultural lands. The interior of the country is mountainous with several large waterfalls, the largest, the Kaieteur, estimated at five times the size of Niagara Falls. The Kaieteur falls alone would generate enough electric energy to supply all the power the colony would use.

Georgetown, the capital of the colony population 80,000, is situated at the mouth of the Demerara river, and is the port. The only drawback to the port has been the lack of a pier and wharf, but preparations are being made for its removal and when this work is completed ships will be able to come up to the river, and to proceed for miles up the river. The town next to be improved is Berbice, with a population of about 15,000 or 15,000, and there are several smaller towns including Buxton, Miblia, Pleasanton and Esquibo with from 5,000 to 7,000 inhabitants.

The Exports The exports of the colony, consisting chiefly of sugar, molasses, rum, cocoa, coconuts, cocoa, gold, diamonds, balata, greenheart timber and crabwood, are steadily increasing in volume. The value of about \$10,000,000, of which \$12,848,000. The shipments of these products to Canada are capable of being greatly increased. In fact, the colony takes almost no rice from British Guiana, while importing vast quantities from other foreign sources. Greenheart timber is regarded as superior to the American hard woods, which quantities are imported from the United States, while greenheart was selected by the United States government engineers for use in the Panama Canal work in preference to their own product. Crabwood would be valuable for the furniture manufacturers, being available at about the same price as oak, while it rivals mahogany in appearance and wearing qualities.

British Guiana's imports for 1913 were valued at about \$9,900,000, of which Canada's share was only \$621,184. The following table gives some idea of the opportunities which the field offers to Canadian merchants and manufacturers.

NOT SO KIND TO NOVA SCOTIA COAL OPERATORS Ottawa, March 26—Further official information presented to parliament today by the minister of railways, on motion of E. M. MacDonald, shows that the claim that Mr. Guelinus asked Nova Scotia mines to supply coal last autumn, before he purchased American coal, affords no justification for the government's action, especially in view of the slowness of work today in Nova Scotia mines.

The Intercolonial management asked the Nova Scotia Steel Company for coal last autumn and got it. They asked the Acadia Coal Company and the Inverness Company to supply coal at Prince Georges, by water. As neither of these companies had been sending coal by water to the St. Lawrence, Mr. Guelinus knew full well that it was impossible for them to get steamers to carry coal to Lewis in October.

These are the facts, and though he paid this high price for American coal he threatens to do so again and refused to pay \$8.15 for the run of nine Nova Scotia coal this year, evidently with the idea of going to the Ogdenstun concern and paying a higher price and hauling the coal 500 miles to its destination.

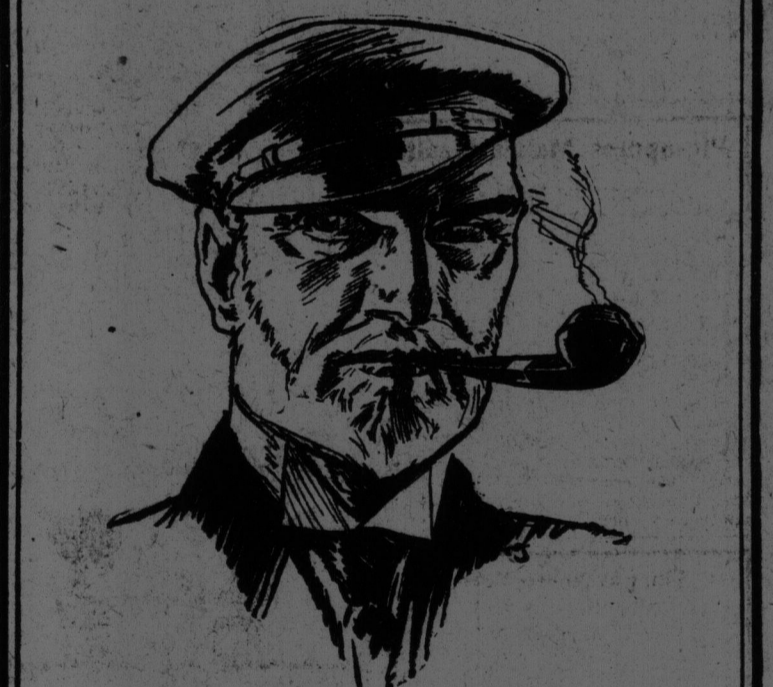
NEW INDUSTRIES

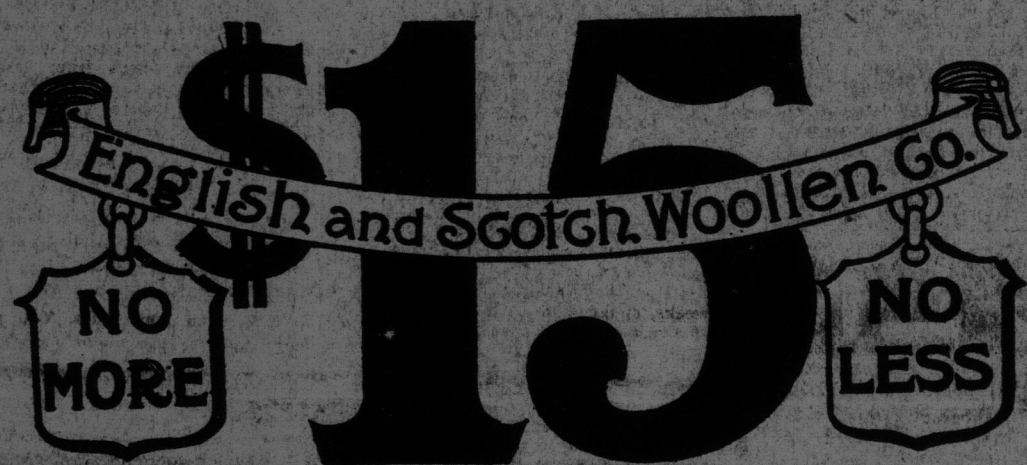

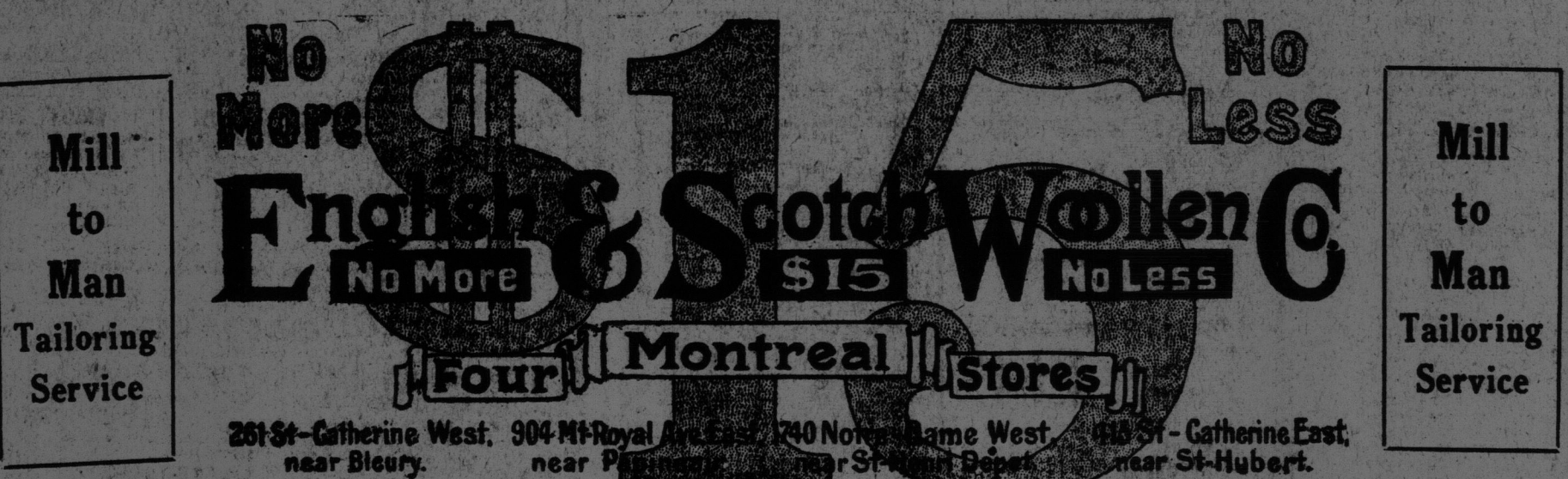

The annual community clean-up has been generally practiced so many years that it has justified itself on thousands of occasions. The annual housecleaning, which thrifty housewives undertake each spring, typifies and affords an example for the community to follow in its annual housecleaning.

backs upon the filth and disorder in their back yards and their alleys, these blenishes and disfigurements shine out in all their disreputableness to greet the eyes of the casual passerby.
There is no more offensive sight than that which may be observed in the back alleys of thousands of villages whose citizens would resent the imputation that they are unenterprising and nonprogressive. In the matter of municipal cleanliness as nowhere else "filthiness breeds contempt." It is unfortunately altogether too easy to become familiar, and therefore indifferent, to dirty streets and to alleys almost blocked with accumulated refuse. In this case "out of sight" may, indeed, be "out of mind," so far as the resident is concerned, but not so to the casual visitor who has become so accustomed to a different state of affairs that the striking contrast comes near to disgusting him with a city and a people that will tolerate such conditions.

From a purely esthetic viewpoint, clean streets, alleys and back yards, are worth all they cost. But they are worth a thousand times as much as a matter of sanitation. Also they afford indisputable evidence and a splendid advertisement of thrift, progressiveness, enterprise and public spirit that repay their cost in the reputation they give to the city that displays these qualities in the form of clean streets, clean alleys and attractive yards.
There is hardly a community that will not arise as a unit in a cleanup campaign if the thing is proposed in the proper manner. Generally little more than the setting of the "cleanup day" is needed for those citizens who themselves are able to secure the needed labor, and in case of labor shortage more than a day may be needed to perform the work. But seldom will any delay be necessary or any excuses be offered.
Sometimes—but only in exceptional cases—the exercise of governmental authority may be necessary. Public sentiment if sufficiently aroused is more effective than almost any other force that can be exerted. One year to exert this

several committees to inspect the streets and alleys and make a report for publication. If the intention of taking this step is made known at the time the cleanup day is announced, there will be little of criticism in the report.
Local Club Should Undertake the Work
The most successful cleanup campaigns have been those conducted under the auspices of the local development, civic or women's clubs. In fact, women seem to handle matters of cleanliness and sanitation better than men. In general they have the direct control of conditions affecting their own yards and the alleys back of them. Hence, if they are specially interested and their aid is solicited in the work, they are more likely to keep yards and alleys in a satisfactory state throughout the year.
Part of City Beautiful Plan
Moreover, the beautifying of yards and margins is a natural sequence if not properly a part of the cleanup campaign. Influence is to appoint a committee or

for an excuse for organizing a women's civic club, either as an auxiliary or independently of the men's club, for the purpose of taking upon itself civic duties which women are specially fitted to perform. The community that does not in some effective way enlist the services of its women is overlooking a tremendous power for uplift and advancement.
The city beautiful and cleanup campaign makes a strong appeal to the young people, even to the boys and girls. Much of the objectionable littering of streets and alleys is due to the thoughtlessness of young folks. If they can be interested in a movement to keep the streets clean they may thus be taught the carefulness and neatness that exemplify good citizenship.
There is in fact hardly another movement that can be so planned as to enlist the services of all citizens; nor is there any other movement so calculated to cultivate a civic spirit and develop a civic conscience. There should be no community, large or small, that does not fully observe its annual "Cleanup and Town Beautiful Day."

INJUSTICE IS DONE A. E. KILLAM

Hon. Mr. Emmerson Scores Against Government

COMPELLED TO RETIRE

Deprived, Too, of Benefit of Provident Fund—Over Age Given as Excuse, Yet Older Man is Appointed

(Moncton Transcript)

The Hon. H. R. Emmerson brought before parliament a few days since the case of A. E. Killam, dismissed bridge inspector of the Intercolonial Railway, who was compelled to vacate his office.

Under the Provident Fund in Class E, it is provided that those who were in the service prior to the coming into force of the act, and who entered at such an advanced age as to cause them to reach the age of seventy years before being fifteen years in the service would obtain their full allowance under the act, provided they had been at least ten years in the service. It is understood that only the period itself, is one month short, and because of that month Mr. Killam is deprived of that to which he is justly entitled, but Mr. Killam disputes the accuracy of the government's claim, and says he was in the service a month before the department made the record.

We would be rather disposed to accept Mr. Killam's claim for a department which is capable of adding ten or twelve years to a man's age in order to bring his age up to the requisite period for forcing his resignation, is quite capable of lopping off a month to deprive an official of his full allowance under the Provident Fund. Mr. Emmerson's speech was very non-contentious, and a plain statement of fact. Mr. Killam claims he was engaged as bridge inspector in March, 1897, by the late Hon. Mr. Blair.

In parliament at Ottawa the department tried to screen itself for such a petty ruling against Mr. Killam, by throwing the responsibility for the decision upon the employees on the "Provident Board," who were selected by the employees of the road. But the personal relation between A. E. Killam and the C. R. employees, both before he entered the service and after, are of such a character, and especially so here in Moncton and Westmorland and adjoining counties, that there is no question that Mr. Killam would obtain their support in receiving justice.

The extraordinary fact is that the Provident Fund Board continued to keep upon Mr. Killam after he was seventy years of age, his contribution toward the Provident Fund, but the department now turns around and appoints a party to the "Shylock method for exacting a pound of flesh, so far as an alleged strict enforcement of the act is concerned. Many cases of gross injustice have been perpetrated by its administration in the past, just as injustice is being perpetrated in the present case.

Mr. Emmerson paid a just tribute to Mr. Killam in the course of which he said—
It is said that Mr. Killam's services were dispensed with because he had attained the age of seventy in 1906, that he was therefore seventy-six or seventy-seven when he retired. Whatever his age in years, no one who knows his robust physique, his strong mentality, his activity in the discharge of his duties, in any degree because of his years.

Mr. Killam today, active, hale, hearty, physically and mentally, is as capable of the performance and discharge of his duties as he was fifteen or twenty years ago. This may possibly be an extreme statement, but it will be confirmed by all those who have knowledge of his position with satisfaction to the railway authorities and in the interest of the railway itself. By whom are those duties discharged today? By a civil engineer and an assistant engineer, both of whom have a staff of assistants. Mr. Killam did the work alone and single-handed. If age is to be a bar, if he is to be removed from the service because of his age, and if the Intercolonial railway are going upon that principle, consider why it is that they should bring from Nova Scotia as a consulting engineer in respect to bridges and all other matters, a gentleman who is upwards of eighty-three years of age.

Mr. Emmerson—Martin Murphy is my son, friend (Mr. Hazen) will know something of his age. For many years he had been provincial engineer in the province of Nova Scotia. He is today in the enjoyment of that pension. As a matter of fact, it has been stated that Mr. Killam's services were dispensed with because of age. If he should be discharged by reason of his age, upon what principle can the management turn around and employ a gentleman—and I have not anything to say against Mr. Murphy—who is, to my knowledge, upwards of eighty-three. I have been told that he is nearer eighty-seven than eighty-three. He was brought there just about the time Mr. Killam's connection with the railway was severed.

The acting minister of railways, the Hon. Mr. Reid, made a sorry exhibition of his ignorance of Intercolonial affairs when he told parliament that Mr. Killam was dismissed, because his advanced years prevented his inspecting the steel bridges which the government was going to erect along the Intercolonial Railway, because of the heavier engines. Mr. Emmerson, of course, pointed out to the delight of the house that outside of the Cape Breton district, the Intercolonial bridges had been strengthened years ago to meet the increased weight of the locomotives and that Mr. Killam did not have to perform any acrobatic stunts in his many years senior successor would have to do. Then there was another quarter of an hour when the acting minister of railways, mixed up the case of A. J. Tingley with that of J. B. Tingley. Taken altogether the member for Westmorland scored heavily.

HOTELS NOT ALL SAFEGUARDED

Paragraphs From Factory Inspector Kenney's Report

MATTER OF FIRE ESCAPES

Recommend Standard of Size and Quality — Thirty-nine Moving Picture Houses in Province—Laws in Larger Centres Observed

The manner in which the laws for the safety of their patrons are observed by some of the hotel keepers of the province is dealt with by John Kenney inspector of factories and hotels, in his annual report to the N. B. government.

"The enforcement of the hotel act has also occupied my time, and I regret to say that the progress along this line has not been so great as I would like. Notwithstanding the fact that this act has been in force about two and one half years, I cannot now say that all buildings included in the act have been properly safeguarded. In some cases, after the proper ropes were provided and placed in position, I have subsequently found them missing. Upon inquiry as to this lapse, a variety of explanations were offered, but principally the defect may be attributed to change of proprietors and house cleaning.

"I have laid information against a number of proprietors to compel compliance with the act. One I have reported on two occasions and presume I shall be compelled to prosecute again, as I am informed he has not yet done what was required.

"In the matter of outside fire escapes for hotels, I am convinced that there should be a standard adopted giving size, dimension, and quality of iron. Compelled reluctantly to provide this means of protection, the proprietors often decide the question, and the result is a poor fire escape. As in other branches of my work, I shall continue to aim at steady improvement in conditions."

The inspector reports that there are thirty-nine moving picture houses, with seating capacity of from 175 to 1,800 each, in the province. He finds the laws well observed in the cities and larger towns, but a disposition to neglect safeguards in the smaller places.

KINDERGARTENS PART OF ST. JOHN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Copy of Petition Which Has Been Sent to Government at Fredericton

The following memorial from the Free Kindergarten Association, endorsed by the board of school trustees, the Women's Council and other organizations in this city, which have also communicated with Premier Fleury, has been sent to the government at Fredericton.

To His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of the province and to the members of his government in council assembled:

The petition and memorial of the Free Kindergarten Association, as undersigned, beg leave to say, that

Whereas, Ontario, Nova Scotia, and many states in the United States have received great advantages from the fact that the kindergarten system has been incorporated into their common school system; and

Whereas, for the last ten years, four free kindergartens have been carried on with great success in the City of Saint John, supported largely by private subscriptions and also by grants from the common council; and

Whereas the board of school trustees in December passed a resolution favoring the incorporation of the kindergarten system into one public school system; therefore

It is the petition of this association that Your Honor and your advisers introduce a bill at this session of the legislative assembly, which will permit the Board of School Trustees of the City of Saint John to incorporate the free kindergarten system as part of the common schools of this city.
