Wies Continue to Keep Back the Germans In Spite of Violent Attacks

ositions Held Everywhere — Forward Movement of Russians Positively Announced — Important Success in Warsaw Region

On the Battle Front, via Paris, Oct. 22—Much progress has been recently made by the French on the eastern wing, where the positions are of the greatest importance for the future campaign.

There has also been furious fighting at Roye where the French recently gained at least a dozen German charges. They finally compelled the Germans to retire with great losses.

IRMAN LOSSES

Berlin, via London, Oct. 22—A German casualty list issued today contains names of about 11,500 killed, wounded and missing.

IRMAN SHIP IN BALTIC HEARD FROM

London, Oct. 22—The Copenhagen correspondent of the Daily Telegraph reports a German fleet off Falsterbo, Sweden, in the Baltic Sea.

Paris, Oct. 22—The official announcement issued this afternoon by the French War Office says the positions occupied by the allies in Belgium and Northern France, have been maintained in spite of the violent attacks of the enemy.

The text of the announcement follows: "On our left wing German forces in strength have continued their violent attacks, particularly in the vicinity of Dixmude, Warneton, Armentieres, Dinghem and Labasse, but the positions occupied by the allies have been maintained."

"On the rest of the front the enemy has delivered only partial attacks, etc. all have been repulsed, particularly at Fricourt, to the east of Albert; the plateau to the west of Craonne; in the region of Souain, in the Argonne; at Fourde Paris, southwest of Varennes; in the region of Molancourt; the Woivre district, in the direction of Champeau and at a point southeast of Mithel, in the forest of Ailly."

RLIN REPORT

Berlin, via The Hague and London, Oct. 22—Empress Wilhelmina is expected to visit the front in the Lorraine region in the near future. The German government has been positively announced. An important success in the region of Warsaw has driven back the enemy more than thirteen kilometers (eight miles). The advance of the Russians at Inavogrod and to the south of Przemysl, is equally perceptible.

The German government has summoned the Reichstag to a short war session early in December.

BYE-ELECTIONS IN NOVEMBER BUT NOT LIKELY ALL OF THEM

Ottawa, Oct. 22—Warrants for the holding of bye-elections in the constituencies of Quebec county and Champlain have been issued by Speaker Spruille, who is in Ottawa today. Writs will be issued soon for the taking of the vote in the two constituencies in November.

There will be a meeting of the government today to decide the date of the bye-elections. It is believed that the writs will be issued for the ridings of the two new ministers only, and that there will be no contest brought on yet in the other ridings.

Westmorland, however, that point will be settled by the meeting of the government today.

The administration hopes for the return of Hon. F. Chase Casgrain and Hon. P. E. Blondin by acclamation. The government is particularly anxious to see the return of the latter at this time, therefore the inclination is to keep the number of bye-elections down to the lowest minimum on the theory that the fewer changes the less likelihood there is of trouble.

BRITAIN'S WAR RULES FOR THE SUEZ CANAL

London, Oct. 22—Through the official press bureau, the government sets forth its attitude towards the ships of an enemy in the Suez Canal. Some vessels, it states, were detained by the Egyptian government because of hostile acts committed in the canal and some because it was believed that they contemplated hostile acts. In a third class are placed the ships which refused to leave through free passage was offered, thus disclosing an intention to use the ports of the canal as a refuge—a measure not contemplated by the Suez Canal convention.

As such action might block the use of the canal by other ships, it is contended that "the Egyptian government is fully justified in removing all the enemy's ships which have been long enough at canal points to show clearly that they have no intention of departing in the ordinary way."

KNOCKED OUT IN THE PRIZE RING AND DIES

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 22—John Lundgren, opponent of John Levedowski, who was killed in a boxing bout between the pair at Tolleston, Ind., last night, was arrested here today.

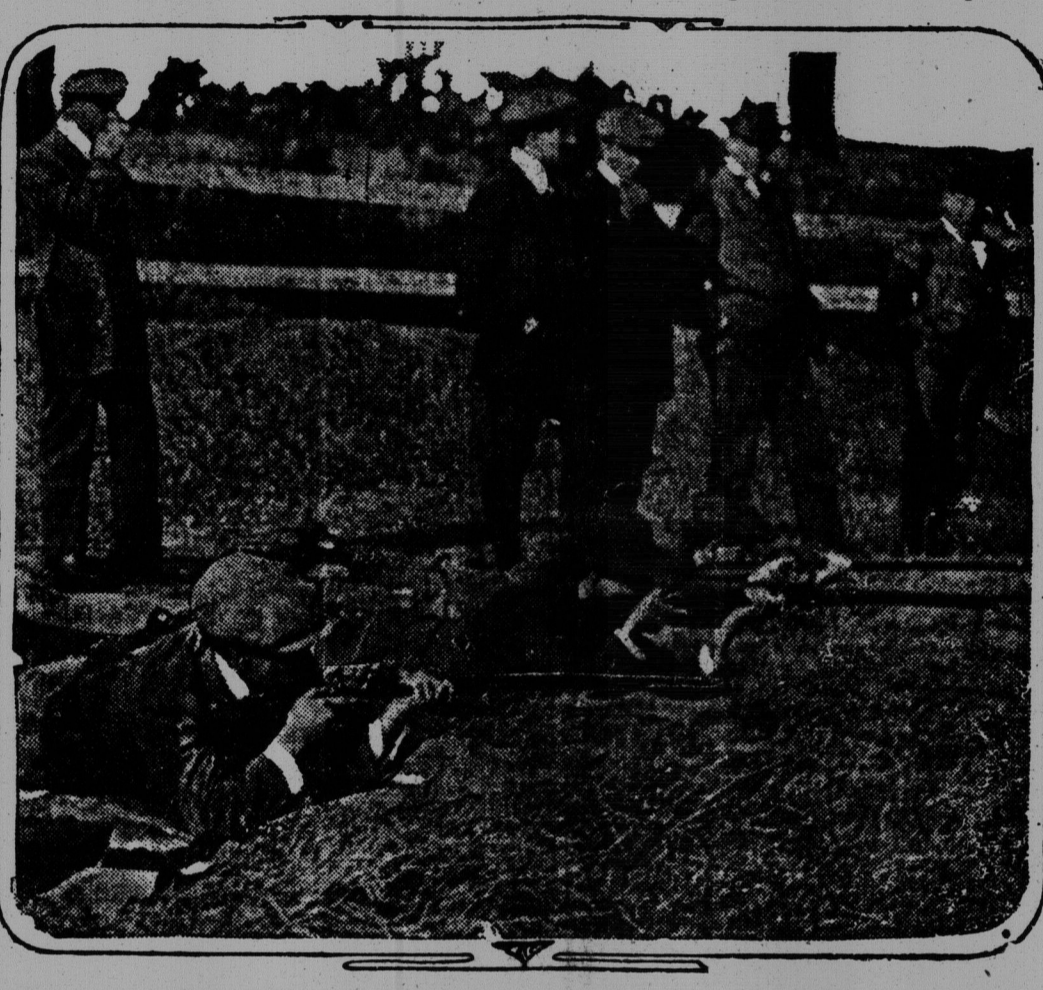
"It must have been heart trouble, as we had scarcely begun to mix things when I knocked him out," said Lundgren, who left Tolleston before the fall termination of the fight was known to him.

WESTERN BORN IN FIRE GRIP

London, Oct. 22—A Russian despatch from Batavia, Java, says enormous fires are devastating the whole region of Western Borneo. Dense smoke clouds are obstructing navigation on the route from Java to Singapore. The lights houses are invisible.

The Java, China and Japan lines, in the despatch adds, is some days overdue and it is feared the ship has been wrecked on a bank in the straits in consequence of the smoke.

SAVED WARSAW FROM HORRORS OF BOMBARDMENT

Spirited Work of Russian Troops Wins Headquarters Praise

ANOTHER HOPE BLASTED

Letters on Prisoners Show German Intention to Have Been in Warsaw Between Oct. 15 and 17—German General Among The Prisoners

Petrograd, Oct. 22—The official news bureau in a statement reviewing the fighting around Warsaw, says: "The Russian troops displayed exceptional energy in coming to the defence of Warsaw and saving the city from a German bombardment. The Russian concentration was effected with greater swiftness than was called for by strategic reasons."

"Documents taken from prisoners captured during the fighting near Warsaw, show that the Germans were confident of entering that city, between October 15 and 17."

"The Siberian regiments arriving at Warsaw were immediately sent to the front, but not before they were warmly hailed by the population, which was greatly impressed by the martial appearance of these young soldiers. During their bayonet charges at night, in the forest of Motchilovsk, the Siberian troops took many prisoners belonging to the 21st German Corps."

"The 17th German Corps, with some reserve troops, attempted to push forward in the region between Honie and Prouschon, and suffered severely. It was there that the Siberian troops, together with other Russian forces, inflicted terrible losses on the enemy. Many villages in the vicinity were taken and retaken in hand to hand fighting."

"In engagements near Kostienka, the Caucasian regiments also gave proof of extraordinary courage. For eight days these regiments were fighting on the left bank of the Vistula, in marshes where the trenches were constantly under water. Here they sustained the fire of the enemy's heavy artillery, but all the German attacks were repulsed. Several regiments suffered severe losses and one regiment had three commanders seriously wounded, one after the other."

"The direction of the great battle going to the south of Przemysl which has been under way for six days is in the hands of General Broussiloff. The Austrian losses have been enormous. Many prisoners have been taken including both Austrians and Germans."

A General Captured

London, Oct. 22—A despatch from Warsaw to Reuters says: "Numerous parties of German prisoners are continually arriving. Among the latest batch is a general, who had been brought in with the troops of the Emperor William."

LOOKED FOR GOOD NEWS IN OFFICIAL STATEMENT TODAY

Sturdy Stand of Allies Against Fierce German Attacks Augured Well

Paris, Oct. 22—The latest despatches from the battle front in France and Belgium told just enough to make the public want more. Positions having been everywhere maintained against the onslaughts of the enemy, today's official statement of the War Office was the object of hope on the part of the French.

Meanwhile the fighting forces, before resuming the contest, sought anew to discover the weak spot in each other's lines. Napoleon's maxim "do not attack in the front the positions you can obtain by turning," is apparently a manoeuvre which the Germans are adhering to in what appears to be a supreme effort.

In this battle of the North, the allied armies, supported by an English squadron, have thus far withstood repeated fierce attacks from the enemy.

NOW BELIEVE MONTREAL EXPLOSION AN ACCIDENT

Death List Now Two and Two Women and Babe May Be in Ruins

Montreal, Oct. 22—The mystery of the disastrous explosion in a Frontenac street tenement on Tuesday night has not yet been solved. The supposed Austrian bomb thrower, whose dead body was picked up at the scene of the wreckage, is said to have been a Russian who is said to have been a boarder in Nickel Bey's portion of the tenement, and on friendly terms with all the inmates.

It is now thought the explosion may have been the accidental discharge of dynamite stored in the basement by one of the laborers who lived in the tenement. Police Inspector McLaughlin, who has been working on the case, appears to regard the wreckage as due to an accident.

A second death, that of Mrs. Morris Jurinsky, whose legs were amputated in Notre Dame hospital on Tuesday night, occurred yesterday morning. Mrs. Sarah Gilbert, both of whose legs also were amputated, is still in the hospital, in a stable condition, but it is thought she cannot recover. It is believed that the bodies of two Jewish women and a baby are in the ruins.

GUNNERS ON THE BRITISH SHIPS MAKE SHOTS TELL

Superb Marksmanship In Fighting on Belgian Coast

FIGHTING DESPERATE

Some Villages Shelled by Both Allies and Germans — Five Hundred of Enemy Dead in One Place — Reinforcements From Liege

London, Oct. 22—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Dunkirk says that the British naval bombardment has utterly destroyed the town of Zyre, which the Germans held in force. The house occupied by the German headquarters staff was blown to bits.

The naval marksmanship, according to the despatch, was superb. A British signalman in a stationary balloon, was shot by the Germans.

London, Oct. 22—The correspondent of the Times at Boulogne, under date of Wednesday, describes the desperate fighting of the last week, in which the Germans have been driven back from village to village to the outskirts of Lille.

"The destruction has been terrible. Some of the villages have been shelled both by the allies and the Germans, and many non-combatants have been killed. A whole family was found dead in one house. In one of the villages 400 Germans were found after the fighting, with a large lead bullet."

"During the attacks, the allies had only time to make rough trenches two feet deep and were obliged to lie in them at full length."

London, Oct. 22—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Daily Chronicle in a despatch dated Wednesday, concerning the fighting of the Belgian coast, says: "For three days British warships have been bombarding the German troops, who are trying to reach Newport. With the co-operation of the French artillery, the Germans were driven back on Middekerke, where the invaders are encamping themselves."

The Germans today bombarded Newport from Meriskerke. Their attack was vigorously repelled by the allies and the warships. The battle is not yet decided. Many villages have been set afire."

Reinforcements from Liege

London, Oct. 22—German reinforcements, among them, with two 17-inch howitzers, have arrived in Antwerp from Liege, according to a Rotterdam despatch to the Daily Mail. The reinforcements are going in the direction of Bruges.

UNITED STATES WANTS BRINDILLA FREED; SEIZED BY BRITISH

Washington, Oct. 22—The United States has protested to Great Britain against the seizure of the American steamer Brindilla, now at Halifax, as unjustifiable, and demanding her immediate release.

KINGS COUNTY VOTES \$2,000 TO PATRIOTIC FUND; \$1,500 TO BELGIANS AT FINE MEETING

National Anthem and Tipperary Figure in Municipal Council Session—Councillors Give Fees to Hampton Red Cross

Hampton, N. B., Oct. 22—At a special session of the Kings County Council this morning with the warden, E. A. Flewelling, in the chair, a grant in aid of the patriotic fund and a grant to the Belgium relief fund were discussed. Every parish was represented by councillors and local rate-payers also were present, with a delegation of the local Red Cross branch, including Mrs. J. A. McAvity, Mrs. J. J. Ryan, Mrs. J. E. Angevine, Mrs. R. A. March, Mrs. C. J. Horseman and Mrs. G. M. Wilson. E. M. Sprout, on behalf of the local committee, made a strong appeal for the grants and was followed by E. Allan Schofield. He also urged consideration of a grant for war fund upon which the Red Cross and other societies might draw. Councillor F. E. Sharpe in a fervent patriotic address concurred with a motion that the council retire for fifteen minutes to talk over the matter and decide upon action. Just before noon the council again assembled and two resolutions were adopted, first instructing the secretary-treasurer to forward \$2,000 to C. B. Allan, St. John for the Canadian Patriotic Fund, authorizing him to draw on the secretary-treasurer for a further sum of \$1,500 as required; second, that the secretary-treasurer forward to Mayor Frink, St. John, \$1,500 for the Belgium relief fund. Three cheers and a tiger were given by the Hampton men present. On motion of Councillor Sharpe, the fees of councillors were presented to the Hampton branch of the Red Cross society. The council adjourned singing "God Save the King" and "It's a Long Way to Tipperary."

BOTH FUNDS PROGRESS WELL; MAN TO TAKE CHARGE OF BELGIAN AID

The local branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund is now down practically to a systematic working basis and is running smoothly. Although the St. John representation in the Canadian expeditionary forces amounted to nearly 500 men, only 108 families have so far applied for relief, but, although they are not coming so fast as at the inception of the movement, applications for aid are being received almost daily. For the guidance of those looking after the relief work, a system is being worked out by which a detailed account of each of the beneficiaries can be ascertained at a moment's notice. The fund was exclusively by means of an alphabetically arranged envelope system, each envelope containing a card showing the name and address, number of family and circumstances of the soldier and his beneficiary. With the assistance of the secretary, Mr. Allan, and Senator Thorne, Alexander McMillan, of the firm of J. & A. McMillan, has made and presented to the fund a double indexed book, on which will be kept the accounts of disbursements. There has been some misunderstanding in regard to the families of volunteers for home defence, and their participation in the benefits of the Patriotic Fund. Some of these cases came before the local committee, and a communication was addressed to the local treasurer, asking for a ruling. He replied that the fund was exclusively for the families of those men who were in active foreign service, stating that the men on home (Continued on page 2, sixth column)

MISTRESS OR MAID? Whose Story Will Jury Believe in Carman Murder Trial?

Mincola, N. Y., Oct. 22—Unimportant witnesses were expected to be placed on the stand today, when counsel for Mrs. Florence Conklin Carman, charged with the murder of Mrs. Louise D. Bailey, began the presentation of their case. It is almost certain that Mrs. Carman's evidence will be held until the last when her denial of her former maid's testimony will be fresh in the minds of the jurors when they retire to consider the evidence.

The defense has subpoenaed twenty witnesses. Mrs. Carman entered the tiny courtroom on this, the fourth day of her trial, expecting to take the stand this afternoon as her own chief witness.

Presentation of the state's case, it was thought would be concluded today. Frank Farrell, a Bowery character who had seen a woman running from the window through which the shot was fired, accused the Carman house to the rear, was recalled to the stand for a continuation of his cross examination when court convened this morning.

As on preceding days, the courtroom was crowded with women.

KAISER'S SON-IN-LAW MISSING; BELIEVED HE IS A PRISONER

London, Oct. 22—Anxiety is felt in Brunswick as to the whereabouts of Duke Ernest August, the German Emperor's son-in-law. The duke, who was leading a squadron of Hussars on the French front, is reported to have been made prisoner. His wife, Princess Victoria Louise, is about to leave for the Kaiser's headquarters.

It is reported that the British steamer Cormorant, of Cork, has been sunk by a mine in the North Sea.

VALCARTIER STORY SIFTED, OFFICIAL INVESTIGATORS SAY IT IS UNFOUNDED

Ottawa, Oct. 22—An official investigation has been held by staff officers of the Valcartier Camp into rumors regarding alleged wasteful destruction of superfluous clothing, supplies, etc. when the troops left the camp. The report of the investigating officers states that there is no justification for the rumors.

Only worthless articles, including some civilian clothing in dirty condition and some articles of obsolete pattern of uniform were burned. The report states that no articles of government property, "possibly," says the report, "these men resented it and retaliated by persistently spreading the rumors alluded to."

JAPANESE WARSHIPS SEEK GERMANS

Tokio, Oct. 22—A Japanese squadron, it is officially announced is seeking the German fleet in the neighborhood of Hawaii.

WAITING FOR GERMANS TO COME OUT

Honolulu, Oct. 22—Standing just outside the three mile limit, her searchlights constantly illuminating the entrance to Honolulu harbor, the Japanese battleship Hizen kept patrol last night, while anchored in the roads, the German warship Geler awaited the verdict of port officials as to how long she may remain in the harbor for repairs.

While the port officials have been uncommunicative, regarding this time allowance, two reports have gained credence. One is that the repairs will be completed within a few days, when she must leave port, and face the enemy lying in waiting without; or, it is reported, she will be ordered to leave the harbor late yesterday fully coalled and provisioned, fourteen days out from Yokosuka, a naval depot near Yokohama. Her commander, Captain Yawamaki, when instructed by Rear Admiral Moore to preserve neutrality, said he would do so, and also declared that he had no intention of entering the harbor.

THE WAR NEWS

Today's war news confirms that of yesterday, both in relation to the success of the allies in France and Belgium and that of the Russians in Poland and Galicia.

oration delivered before the Canadian Club yesterday by Rev. Dr. Herridge will not soon be forgotten by those who listened. There was nothing bombastic or truculent about his references to the war. His address was the serious expression of sane thoughts concerning Canada's duty, as well as Canada's opportunity.

Dr. Herridge very properly dwelt upon the effect of this war in breaking down prejudice. In this country, he said, we are no longer gits or Tories, Catholics or Protestants, French or English; but Canadians united in a great task.

Canadians will be interested in the sentiments expressed in Australia in relation to the war. The Labor Party won in the recent federal elections in Australia, and it is worthy of note that this party gives its enthusiastic support to Britain in the war.

The decision of the British commandant to open the canteen for the Canadian soldiers will not be interpreted as a suggestion that they are in need of what is called "Dutch courage."

Scottish assemblies in St. John will not be quite the same without the presence of Mr. Andrew Malcolm, who for so many years contributed to the pleasure and entertainment of the members. Mr. Malcolm was in the best sense a good citizen. He was especially prominent in connection with Sunday School work, and was a strong advocate of the cause of temperance.

Accidentally Shot Edward McCoy, the thirteen year old son of Arthur McCoy, of Lower St. Mary's, was accidentally shot yesterday by his brother, Lloyd, aged twelve. The boys were out shooting and the younger one was behind carrying a high power rifle. He tripped and fell and the gun was accidentally discharged, the bullet receiving the bullet in his throat. He died almost instantly.

Have your kettle ready with boiling water, butter your mold, place in your butter and steam three hours. Serve with hard sauce.

Almond Macaroons.
Half a pound of almonds, blanched and pounded with a tablespoonful of essence of lemon until a smooth paste. Add an equal quantity of sifted white sugar and the beaten whites of two eggs. Work well together with a spoon. Dip your hand in water and work them into balls the size of a nutmeg. Lay them on white paper an inch apart, then dip your hand in water and smooth them. Put them in a cool oven for three-quarters of an hour. Coconut can be grated and used in place of the almonds, and thus make coconut macaroons.

WAR GEOGRAPHY.
Armentieres—A prosperous mining town, with 28,000 inhabitants, about fifty-four miles from Calais. It is situated on the Lys river, near the Belgium frontier.
Arras—Situated on the right bank of the Scarpe, about half way between Calais and Amiens. It is the chief town

of the department of Pas-de-Calais, and carries on an important grain trade. It was here that the French and English, after the battle of Agincourt, in 1415, signed their treaty of peace. Through the middle ages the town was noted for its tapestries, but their manufacture has completely died out.
Soldau—A German town of 8,700, about five miles from the southern frontier of East Prussia, and a strategic railroad junction. A big battle was fought here in the winter campaign of 1906.

the front of the yoke and at side of the pantallettes.
To make the combination requires 2 1/2 yards of 36-inch batiste, nainsook, cotton crepe or linen. The front and back (A) are cut from an open fold of the material, but for the shoulder strap, front and back yoke the goods may be folded, section (B) being laid on the lengthwise fold.
Now close the leg seam as notched. If desired drawn in at lower edge, insert a tape and draw in the required size; if preferred to hang free, simply finish with a hem or a dainty embroidered scallop.
For the straight, one-piece yoke sew yoke to upper edge of front and back, centers and notches even, leaving edges free of single large "O" perforation in front section; fold the yoke through the center, fall remaining edge over seams, insert ribbon through opening at center-front and tie in a dainty bow.
Fold the shoulder strap through center and stitch notched edges together. Sew to upper edge of yoke, matching single small, double small and single large "O" perforations. Lap right back on left, centers even for opening; center-back indicated by line of double "O" perforations.
If desired with shaped yoke, close under-arm seam as notched; close shoulder seam. Sew to upper edge of front and back center-fronts and back edges even; large "O" perforations in back yoke.
China silk is used frequently in designing such lingerie.

Ghent—The capital of East Flanders, is situated on the Scheidt and the Lys, which flow through it in several arms. It is about 150 miles from Ostend, and about the same from Antwerp. By the Scheidt it is connected with the ocean, and ocean vessels of moderate size can dock in its port. Ghent is the "Flower City," exporting annually whole cargoes of camellias, saffrons, laurel trees and other hot-house plants. Industrially it is famous for its linen and cotton goods, and iron foundries. At present the population is more than 200,000, if the large suburbs of Ledeburg, Gentbrugge and Mount St. Amand are included. The turbulent, independent spirit of the people has been a problem, through all the city's long history, to the various rulers who claimed that part of Flanders. In 1540, for instance, Emperor Charles V of Austria, had a powerful citadel erected near the gate just to keep the citizens in check.

Now, however, the city council has taken the matter in hand, and as a commencement imported a carload of new cents from Winnipeg. In future, odd cents will be given at the City Hall when they are called for in the change of those paying taxes, etc. The banks will probably follow suit later; then the stores and finally the copper shall have established itself permanently. It appeared to the council as rather an anachronism that during quiet times the five cent piece should be the lowest medium of exchange. It is felt that the innovation will have some beneficial effect upon the cost of living.

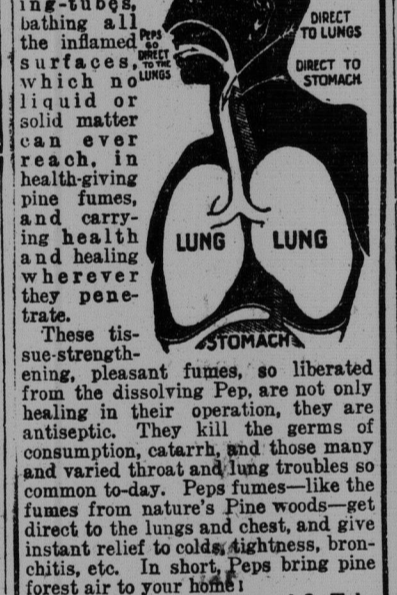

ALLIES GAINING GROUND ON EAST AND WEST FRONTIERS

Both French and British pay tribute to the valor of the Belgians, who, with the allies, are holding back the German advance along the North Sea coast.

These British monitors, the Severn, Hunter and Mersey, with six-inch and other heavy guns, are shelling the Germans in the vicinity of Ostend, where it is said, terrible execution has been done, and machine gun detachments have been landed from these vessels and are assisting in the defence of Nieuport.

An American commission, headed by Herbert C. Hoover, of California, and composed of Americans resident in London and Brussels, will, by reason of an agreement reached between Belgium, Great Britain and Germany, take under its charge the care of hundreds of thousands of Belgians who are threatened with starvation in their own country.

Optimistic reports, from the Russian viewpoint, came from Petrograd, where it is officially announced that the German troops have been driven from the roads leading to Warsaw and are in full retreat, having left their wounded on the field of battle.

Similarly the Russians report that the advances of the Austrians in Galicia have been stayed.

Sasebo, the naval port of Japan, reports that the Japanese have destroyed the military equipment and seized large quantities of gold and munitions of war on the German islands recently occupied in the South Seas.

By order of the Russian emperor the students of the universities and high schools have been called to the colors.

JAPANESE ACCOUNT FOR TWO AUXILIARIES. Rome, via London, Oct. 21—11.15 p. m.—The Japanese embassy in Rome tonight gave out the following communication received from Tokio:

"We have found two auxiliary cruisers of the enemy. One sank herself, the other we captured."

AWAKENING LAND DEMAND IN WEST. Saskatoon, Sask., Oct. 21—"When peace is restored," said Sir Thomas Bligh recently, "emigration from Europe to the newer countries, where land can be obtained on moderate terms, will doubtless be on a large scale; and Canada should profit very substantially by the incoming of new settlers and the consequent increase in production."

And, it would almost seem that coming events in a certain measure cast their shadows before, so far as the United States is concerned.

This is because people there are only beginning to realize that the agricultural repertoire of this west is by no means restricted to wheat, oats, barley and flax. They know now that it extends to all manner of fodder crops—including alfalfa—a fact which finally removes every obstacle formerly advanced against dairying, animal husbandry and every line of diversified agriculture.

HERR LEUTNANT

The Changeless German Mind in Captivity

Arrogant and Officious Even Under Kindly Treatment by French Captives—Letters Disclose Some Phases of War

Bordeaux, Sept. 22—Even in captivity the Prussian officer maintains that aristocratic arrogance which proves him, among other things—to aristocrat.

Having been admitted to a barrack-yard around which about fifty German prisoners were taking their exercise, I was at once struck by the bearing of two men pronouncing apart from the others, obviously conscious of superiority over their surroundings; their keepers and their companions in misfortune.

"Coffee as usual," said the dapper French corporal in charge of the Senegalese Guards. He proceeded to tell me how the lieutenant had complained only that morning of being disturbed in his cell by the constant passing of people down the corridors—and had demanded that this should cease forthwith.

"The same young officer said to the attendant who brought him coffee as usual on the morning after his arrival in Bordeaux: 'Take it away, my good fellow, and remember in future that I always drink black coffee first and milk afterwards, but never café au lait!'"

"Blucher." It seemed almost sacrilege for a humble British journalist to approach such beings, but finally I mustered sufficient courage to ask the French corporal to see if he would grant me an audience. But my hopes were dashed when, after an interesting lecture on strategy from the major were dashed to the ground when the may-cheeked Herr Leutnant took up my card, threw the pieces on the ground, and said: "A reporter from London. Acht! Ask him why the English papers are telling such lies about the war."

Another captive officer in the barracks was named Blucher. Since his arrival at Bordeaux he had spent most of his time in telling everybody he met that he was a descendant of the Blucher whose timely arrival at Waterloo sent Napoleon to St. Helena.

For most part, said the French corporal, the German soldiers themselves were good fellows, though some showed no gratitude for the kind treatment and liberty accorded them. I chatted with one of two and found they knew nothing of the battles they had fought in, but only that they had lived on next to nothing for more than a week when the German line of communications became defective. One man—a Heasian—admitted that there had been atrocities.

"But why burn? Why loot? Why kill old men, young children and women?" "We must," he replied, and added that once, when his regiment was in a large Belgian village, they were told by a peasant that they were free to do as they liked, without restriction, for three hours. I asked what happened, but he was silent.

Most of them were delighted to talk about their families, and said they hoped, for the sake of their wives and children, that the reports of an impending famine in Germany were untrue. My guide said that many wrote home nearly every day.

"Perhaps it will be divided up as it was before 1870." "Then we shall be a real kingdom again and be free." And then, after a pause, "That would be too splendid."

On some of the prisoners were found short diaries of their adventures. It was shown one entry in that of a Bavarian, which read: "August 24—After five days of short rations we have at length found all we want in a Bavarian."

If God remains good to us, and we do this a few more times, I shall be home in time for our marriage to take place before Christmas.'

AMERICANS IN MONTREAL TO GIVE TWO ARMORED MOTORS. (Montreal Star) The movement to raise a force of Americans, living in Montreal, to aid in fighting the empire's battles in Europe, has assumed fairly definite shape, and it is now proposed to equip and send to the front two armored motor cars, such as have already been used in Belgium with tremendous effect.

A wealthy American, living in the United States and interested in the Montreal movement, has practically promised to furnish the two armored automobiles to be manned by Americans resident in this city. The type of car proposed is somewhat larger than those furnished the British Army by Hon. Clifford Sifton and his associates. Each will carry three machine guns.

To man the war cars sixteen men will be required, and these will be obtained very easily here. Three of the men will have to be chauffeurs, although it is stated that before the cars will be sent to the front every man of the two crews must master the secrets of operating the automobiles, and also learn how to handle the machine guns. Pending definite news in regard to the looking much will be done here in the way of organization, beyond keeping the lot in a general way for efficient members of the crews.

Murray E. Williams, of the firm of O'Brien & Williams, brokers, who was the first to suggest the formation of an American force here, said today, in speaking of the new move: "We think that the armored automobiles will be more efficient than a regiment, and much less trouble to equip and send to the front. These cars have already demonstrated their efficiency in the present war, and they are capable of being operated over comparatively rough ground, as well as on roads. There will not be the slightest trouble in getting a crew of Americans in Montreal to handle them."

GERMAN PAPER LIES

Britain Overrun and Ravaged Like Belgium Letter From English Woman Who Was in Berlin Shows Extraordinary Methods of Keeping Up The War Spirit

The species of "news" which is being given the German people to buoy up their courage during the present war was shown by a letter received a few days ago by J. F. Haskell, of Haskell & Elliott, Toronto, from his sister-in-law who has resided in Germany for some years. In her letter she wrote that she had returned to England, but so alarmed was she when in Berlin at the reports in the German papers that London was threatened and a large part of Great Britain overrun by German troops just as Belgium had been, that she had decided to leave her luggage and valuables in Berlin, as a safer place than London.

In her letter to Mr. Haskell, his sister-in-law said that when the war broke out she had been living in the country, and immediately went to Berlin, where she then she found a great deal of unemployment, and committees had been formed to help the people who had been thrown out of work. Already more than 2,000 girls who had worked in factories in Berlin had been deprived of their work, and were in such a position that soup kitchens had to be opened for their relief.

Then came word that British women and children might leave Germany, and, with 500 others, she went through, traveling via Holland, where they were very well treated.

The British men in Germany were not so well treated. Those between sixteen and forty-five were not allowed to leave and were herded together in a building which Mr. Haskell's correspondent described as a stable, where they had to sleep on loose straw and were given one cheap blanket apiece. Many of these were men of good class, tourists, or people who had been living in Berlin, and they suffered a good deal under this rough treatment. The older men were sent to these detention camps, but were allowed to live as they pleased, provided they reported to the police three times a week.

It is said that he was a victim of a vendetta declared when the Hindus were refused admittance to Canada some months ago.

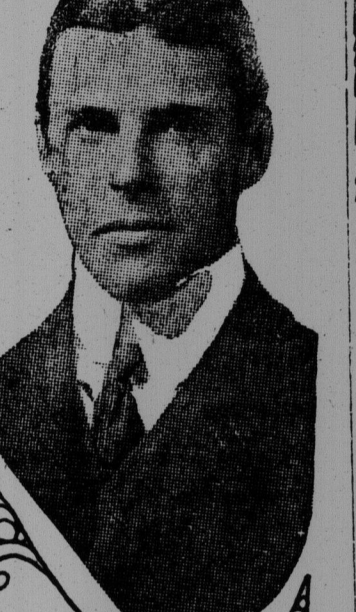

RECRUITING ORDERS NOT YET RECEIVED

Rumor of Negotiations to Have Cavalry Unit in Second Contingent

Officers of the local militia are still awaiting orders from the headquarters of the 6th division at Halifax to proceed with recruiting. There are a few minor matters which have to be dealt with before the orders are sent here from Halifax. They pertain, it is understood, only to the mobilization of a battalion of infantry, with the necessary army medical and army service requirements, and do not mention the muster of a cavalry detachment. Negotiations are now under way, according to very authentic rumors, concerning the establishing of a cavalry unit with the second contingent from Canada and definite advice from the British War Office are expected very soon.

Meanwhile every unit in the city is actively engaged in drilling, and recruiting is progressing very favorably. The active campaign in the interests of recruiting will not be begun, however, until the orders to this effect are received. When they do reach here the local militia officers will be found with the enlistment rolls well started toward the muster of the New Brunswick regiment.

MESSRS. MCGICOLL AND MCTIER OF C.P.R. ARE IN THE CITY TODAY

Arriving on the Montreal train today in their private car "St. Andrews" were D. McNeill, vice-president, and A. D. MacTier, general manager, of the C. P. R. H. C. Grout, Atlantic division superintendent, accompanied them in his private car, "Metaphor," which he was using whilst Mr. "Roseberry" is undergoing repairs.

Mr. McNeill and Mr. MacTier declined to say much concerning the C. P. R. plans here for the winter. Immediately upon their arrival they proceeded to West St. John where they spent the greater part of the remainder of the day inspecting the Canadian Pacific properties. The announcement of the first of their winter sailings by this company for St. John was already been made in the Times. Messrs. McNeill and MacTier will leave this evening on their return to Montreal.

ARRESTED IN HALIFAX

Theft Charge Against Parker McCanaghy, Said to be St. John Man

Halifax, N.S. Oct. 22—Parker McCanaghy of St. John was arrested here yesterday afternoon by Policeman McDonald, on charge of stealing a \$10 bill from a Russian seaman, who has just returned from Hudson Bay. McDonald says he saw McCanaghy grab the money from the hand of the Russian and placed him under arrest on the spot. McCanaghy was convicted today and remanded for sentence.

BALL AT CAPITAL

Proceeds For Patriotic Fund—More Aid For Belgians

Fredrickton, Oct. 22—Arrangements have been made to hold a ball in the legislative buildings on the evening of November 4, in aid of the patriotic fund. An energetic committee has the matter in hand. Men's tickets will be sold at 25c. and ladies' fifty cents.

A very successful meeting in aid of the Belgian fund was held last night at Burt's Corner. Judge Wilson and Councillor Harry Smith were among the speakers. The sum of \$19 was collected and a committee was appointed to gather contributions of farm produce. A. R. Slipp and W. J. Osborne addressed a similar meeting at Harvey Station.

A turkey, donated to the Belgian fund by Mrs. S. J. Dorcas, of Kingsclear, was disposed of by lottery for \$22 realized.

Fredrickton, Oct. 22—It is scarcely likely that there will be an inquest into the death of Edward McCoy, victim of yesterday's shooting accident on Little River road. He was in his fourteenth year and was the eldest of five children. The funeral will be held tomorrow.

LEFT IN SORRY PLIGHT

Aaron Benjamin, a respectable looking young man, appeared before the magistrate this morning charged with being drunk in the I. C. R. yard and was sentenced to pay \$25 or go to jail for two months. He said he had been robbed of \$86 and had no money to pay his fine. He had in his possession a ticket for Boston which he said would be out of date by the time his sentence had expired and coupled that he might then be a public charge. He was told that he should have thought of the consequence before he took the first drink.

Benjamin was arrested last evening by I. C. R. Policeman Scovil Smith. He said he was waiting for a train to take him back to his home in Boston.

A CLOSE CALL

Bullet Hits Little River Man Just Over Eye

SHOT FIRED BY BOY

Playing With 22 Calibre Rifle He Sent Shot at Target on Door on Other Side of Which Was Alonzo Bond

Alonzo Bond, of Little River, escaped death by a fraction of an inch in a shooting accident that occurred in his home this morning about seven o'clock. With a bullet lodged in his skull just above the left eye he was hurried to the hospital this morning and the missile extracted. It is not expected that the results will be serious.

Some children who were visiting at the house were playing with a 22 calibre rifle and had attached a target to a door in the house and not knowing that Mr. Bond was on the other side, one of the lads pulled the trigger. The bullet passed through the door and struck Mr. Bond a glancing blow over the left eye. Another hit lower and it would have struck him in the eye.

A telephone message was sent immediately to Dr. F. F. Dunlop, who hurried to the scene. He found that the bullet was still lodged in the victim's forehead and after stopping the flow of blood he brought the patient to the hospital, where the leaden missile was extracted and the wound dressed. The bullet was found to be a .22 long. Had it struck Mr. Bond directly from in front instead of at an angle it might have caused serious injuries or death. He is now at his home and it is expected that he will not be inconvenienced by his rather close call.

WINTER PORT MATTERS

St. John Scores First Goal Says a Halifax Newspaper

(Halifax Echo).

St. John has scored the first goal in the winter-port "game." The latest Canadian Pacific steamship service posters disclose the fact that the company's new liner Misanabie will sail "from St. John, N. B., on December 15 direct to Montreal." As is well known, the steamer Misanabie has taken up the service of the ill-fated C. P. R. liner Empress of Britain was some time ago abandoned by the admiralty and has not yet been released. It is presumed that, should she be allowed to return to her regular service this winter, she will make St. John her terminal port.

The recent announcement that the White Star liners Atlantic and Laurentic will return to the Canadian service makes the outlook most pleasant from the Halifax point of view.

The one and only trip made by a White Star liner to St. John, the famous voyage of the Teutonic last year, was sufficiently discouraging to prevent a repetition on the part of that line. It is safe to presume that the Canadian Northern line which was requisitioned and released from admiralty service and the two Royal boats will make Halifax their terminal winter port this season. If this report becomes a fact, then Halifax and St. John will so far as the two C. P. R. and two Royal liners are concerned, be in about the same position as they were in 1913. The only difference will be that the C. P. R. liners may omit their former call at Halifax, both east bound and west bound, for the mails.

As for the Allan line there is now only one of the three ships engaged in the Montreal-Liverpool service. All the other Liverpool boats, including the Alsatian and Calgarian, are, so far as is known, still under admiralty orders. The Glasgow service still continues in full swing and it is doubtful whether any attempt will be made during the coming season to take boats from this service direct to Halifax on the Liverpool mail route. The freight service is, of course, of particular importance under the existing war conditions, and the number of Allan boats on the winter Boston to Glasgow, Portland to Glasgow and Philadelphia to Glasgow service will all probably be allowed to remain.

Should any of the larger and faster of the Allan boats be released from admiralty service, it is to be hoped that they will make Halifax the terminal port for their regular mail, passenger and freight service.

STONE CHURCH TEA

The ladies of the junior branch of the W. A. of St. John's (Stone) church are giving an afternoon tea in the school-room this afternoon in aid of the Red Cross Society. The room has been decorated with scores of pictures relating to the war and the soldiers of the allies, clippings from various newspapers, magazines and pictorials, and arranged in groups. Among the collection is an enlarged sketch copied from Punch, entitled "The Glory of a Lion is in its Mane." The shading on the sketch made to represent the mane of a lion is so arranged as to form the words Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and other colonies. Flags of all nations affected by the war, with the exception of the German flag, are displayed in all parts of the room. The decorations are greatly admired, and Miss Annie Hipwell, who was in charge of the work, is being highly praised on the interesting collection so well arranged. A program of readings, recitations and patriotic musical selections rendered. A small charge was made for admission, and half of the proceeds will be donated towards the work of the Red Cross Society.
