



#### TORIES MAKING AWAY FAST WITH REVENUE

Expenditures Higher Though Income Decreased-Canada Will Have to Borrow

Ottawa, Sept. 5—The financial statement of the dominion for the fiscal year as shown by returns entered on the books of the finance department up to the end of August gives one reason for Hon. W. T. White's protracted stay in England this summer.

The treasury is being depleted by rapidly increasing expenditures and the growth of revenue is not keeping pace with the growth of the ministerial extravagance. Consequently the finance minister has to resort to borrowing on the dominion credit at a time of general financial stringency.

During August the net public debt of the dominion increased by \$3,681,217, as compared with a decrease of \$3,097,926 in August of last year.

The net debt now stands at \$301,750,895, as compared with \$298,068,768 at end of July.

Expenditure on consolidated fund account for the five months, ended with August, totalled \$39,428,572, an increase of \$4,077,435, as compared with the corresponding period of the last fiscal year.

Expenditure on capital account for

Revenue for the five months totalled 1,628,457, an increase of \$4,725,290, of hich \$1,626,968 is due to increased cusms collections; \$500,000 to growing ost office revnue, and \$419,485 to excise presenting increased production of quor and tobacco.

Despite optimistic statements still anded out by the customs department continued monthly increases in cusms collections, the figures of the finace department for August again show slight decrease, as was also the case a July. The customs revenue for August a slight decrease, as was also the case in July. The customs revenue for August is given as \$9,845,721, a decerase of \$56,192, as compared with August of last year. The decrease of the last two months are the first recorded for years. The total revenue for August was \$14,547,858, an increase of \$102,004 over August of last year. The total expenditure during the month was \$18,229,069, an increase of \$6,472,193.

The government is evidently beginning to strike its stride in regard to lavish expenditure.

#### MORNING LOCALS

#### KNOW NOT A WORD OF ENGLISH BUT PLUCKILY TAKE UP SCHOOL WORK

Here's an Inspiration in Overcom- Early Good Results From Chief ing of Difficulties by Two Russian Children in Victoria School

The plucky ambition of some of the foreign settlers Canada is securing as future citizens is well illustrated by an instance which has recently come up in one of our public schools. Joseph Bassan and his little sister, two Russian children, came to this country but a few weeks ago. In spite of the fact that they did not know a word of English when the schools opened two weeks ago, they applied for permits and were admitted to Grade I. in the Victoria school. It was found, however, that they were much older than their playmates and had already had some instruction in their nadive land. So they were placed in Grade V., the little girl in Miss Lingley's room and the little boy in Miss Cummings. There they are attending dally now; strangers among strange people, not understanding a word in the books given them or a syllable of what is said around them, but both bravely determined to try.
