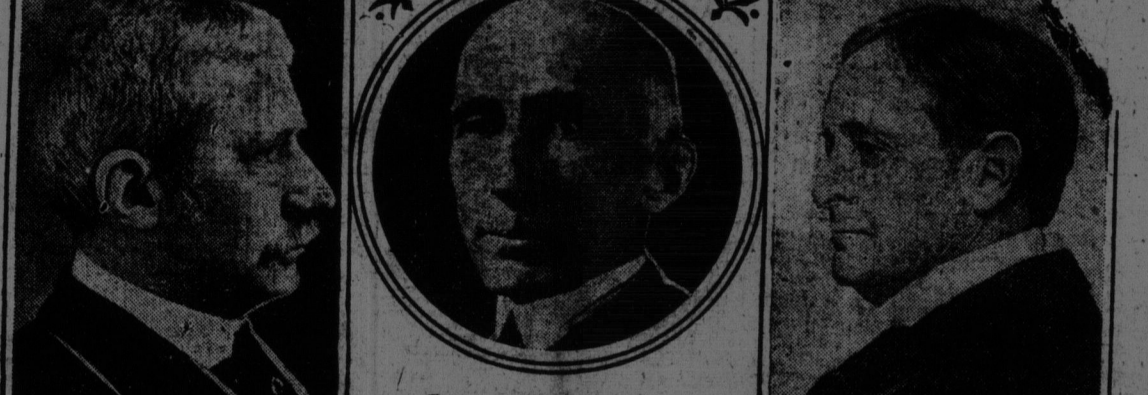
NO LOSS OF LIFE

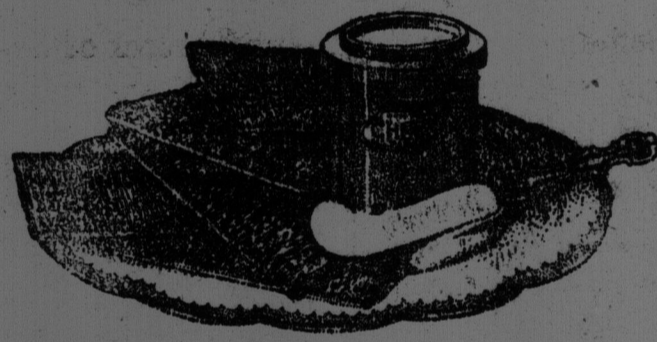

MODERN STYLES OF WOMEN INDECENT

Christain Modesty and Religion Outdone in Present Day Dress

ADDRESS BY MGR. BRUCHESE

Archbishop of Montreal Advises Mothers to Prohibit Such Shameless Styles in Their Family Circles—An Appeal to the Women

The modern dress of some women is the undoing of Christian modesty, the loss of religion and virtue and has broken down the line of demarcation between the pure maiden and those who are sinners. Thus did His Grace Archbishop Bruchese attack prevailing styles of feminine dress at the afternoon and evening Labor Day service for women in Notre Dame church, Montreal. The Rev. Father Bruchese had just concluded a forcible sermon to the ten thousand women in the church, when His Grace arose in the sanctuary. "My dear women," he said, "this is a sacred date. We have Christianized the feast of labor. May God bless you in your labors and in everything you undertake. You have come in your thousands to sanctify labor. The church has blessed your cradle and your fireside, and she will bless your grave. Christ is your model. He was the Divine Workman.

Mary, the Model. "May I not put before you this afternoon Mary, His Mother, as your model. She was a servant of God, and of man. Sanctify, like her, your labor and your fireside, your office or factory. Obey your priests, your employers, but above all obey your father and mother, is still a part of the Decalogue. Be submissive to your parents, for they have labored and suffered for you. If they are poor, help them, it will bring joy to you and to them. Be charitable to the poor and afflicted. Charity will be sweet when it is performed with the wages you earn in the sweat of your brow. Bring virtue into your homes. Let the rich be charitable to the poor. If grandeur is the quality of furniture, what if it is barren of virtue and robbed of heavenly hope? A Hollow Sham. "If the castellated towers rise towards the sky, what a mockery if the soul never goes thither. If gold glisters in burning coffers, what a hollow sham if the gold of virtue does not gleam and gladden in the chambers of the heart. "The day I blessed your federation, I told you what a power for good you would be. I told you that your powerful union would accomplish the greatest work of your aid in your crusade for temperance and see what magnificent results. "Today, I ask you with more fervor, to aid me to stamp out the outrageously immodest style of dress that has been introduced among our women, among the poor, as well as the rich. The present style of dress is the undoing of Christian modesty, the loss of religion and the killing of all virtue. The latest style is not only vulgar, but indecent. Just at present there are even youngsters who think they are stylish only when their dress verges on the indecent. So shameless has the style of women's dress become that the line of demarcation has been broken down between the pure Christian maiden and the frivolous and sin-stained.

Modesty Banished. "Oh, where are the Christian women of our mothers' days? Are modesty, innocence and purity to be banished from our families? The shameful and indecent styles must be banished from our midst. They are shameful and sinful. God must not die in the soul of our young women. I consider it my duty to warn the mothers against these fashions in dress, which are revolting to every feeling of delicacy and propriety, and are fraught with the greatest dangers to morals. Our mothers must stand for their own dignity and purity. "The latest style of dress is a disgrace to our so-called civilization. It is especially the duty of mothers or older sisters to inculcate a high degree of modesty in their young daughters and sisters. If you women unite against this innovation you will have a salutary influence. You have a family, condemn it in your circle. Be apostles of modesty and innocence and decent dress. Let a woman's glory be her modesty and purity and refinement. If you will help me in this crusade God will bless you and the church will be pleased with you and Mary, the Mother, the all-pure, will protect you."

Offers Hospital to Newcastle. Newcastle, Sept. 5.—Newcastle is to have a public hospital if present plans worked up by E. A. McCurdy, secretary of the board of trade, and others do not miscarry. A person, not named by Mr. McCurdy, has offered \$25,000 to build and equip a hospital here on condition that the means of maintenance is found elsewhere.

FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED; \$500 REWARD OFFERED. Woodstock, N. Daily Hints For the Cook

Gratinades. Cut 1 1/2 pounds of round steak into inch square pieces. Arrange in a baking pan and sprinkle with chopped celery, grated or minced onion, with salt and pepper. Put in a saucepan 2 tablespoons of butter, 2 of flour and 2 cupfuls of strained tomatoes. Stew the tomatoes first, season with pepper and salt, and when smooth and thick pour over the meat and bake in a very hot oven for half an hour. Serve with baked white or sweet potatoes.

Jelly Roll. To 2 well-beaten eggs add 1 cup of fine sugar (granulated). Beat well, add 1 cup of flour with 1 teaspoon of cream of tartar, well sifted, with it. Add 1-2 teaspoon soda, dissolved in a very little milk, a little salt and teaspoon extract of lemon. Spread thin on long shallow pan, bake until just done and no more. Have ready a clean towel, jelly and silver knife. Turn cake upside down on towel, quickly spread with jelly and roll up. Don't let it get cool. Wrap in clean napkin a little while and keep in shape. Have your dough about 1-4 inch in pan before baking.

MINISTRY MAY RESIGN

Sydney, N. S. W., Sept. 5.—The difficulties of the new federal government are becoming more acute, says The Telegraph's correspondent. In the senate much bitterness exists, the conduct of the business has been taken entirely out of the government's hands. The other night the standing orders were suspended to permit Senator Pearce to attack Senator Miller's allegation that 80,000 names were irregularly placed on the electoral rolls before the last election. LONDON SOCIETY
A Fortune But Must Also Take Name
PRINCE ARTHUR'S HOUSE

He Will Pay Something Like \$15,000 a Year For it—Re-arrangement of Inventions to the Royal Functions for Future

(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, Aug. 28.—Princess Mary is in her seventeenth year, when most royal young women are turning their thoughts to matrimony, but not Her Royal Highness. The queen likes to keep her daughter a child and will not allow her to put up her hair or lengthen her skirts. In the ordinary course of events, her father would take her for a child of twelve or fourteen. It appears that the queen has a perfect terror at the thought of any one of her children marrying. This is the only weak spot in a strong character, and those who know her cannot explain it. Guests on the royal yacht recently were surprised at the appearance of Princess Mary at dessert in a lace pinafore over her short frock.

A Fortune and a Name

Quite romantic is the history of Theobald's Park, a beautiful place in Hertfordshire, and the way it came to Sir Hedworth Meux and his wife, who was the widow of Lord Chelsea, and should, in the ordinary course of events, have been Countess Cadogan. Lady Meux was one of the prime movers in the great firm of brewers of that name, a managing woman with a tremendous personality, and when her husband was dying she made him leave her his fabulous fortune and works of art. She could never "hit" it with his people, nor indeed with society in general, which she hated. It was here that Sir Hedworth and his wife came in. They were kind to her; they seemed to understand her peculiar temperament. She who was not an aristocrat, was immensely pleased by the attentions of Sir Hedworth, who is an admiral in the navy and could coast birds off the bushes. It Will Be a Little Child's Dream to See the Sheds of the Fight for Single Tax Eastern Reformers Convene--Interest in Land Taxation Steadily Increases. (Toronto Telegram)

Canadian citizens are becoming more and more interested in the subject of single taxation. Facts were presented to the assembled delegates of the Tax Reform League of Eastern Canada, at their annual convention in St. James' Park House yesterday afternoon and last evening, proving that such is the truth. One substantial item of proof is that the Canadian League Bureau reports a large demand for lectures on this subject and another is that the Tax Reform League is steadily adding members to its active membership.

It was decided yesterday afternoon to compile literature in connection with the success of single taxation in Alberta. Mr. Lyon, the author of the scheme to publish these facts, stated that in no Alberta municipality, where the reformed system of taxes is in operation is there a higher rate than 22 mills on the dollar and that in almost every place there had been an evident tendency toward the lowering of rates. The booklet containing the information will be presented to the legislature and the press to bring it to public notice.

The methods of levying taxes on land values only, without placing any assessment on buildings or improvements, were well presented in papers and addresses by Messrs. W. C. Good, of Brantford; W. W. Buchanan, of Winnipeg; and J. R. Brown, of Toronto, at the evening mass meeting, which was attended by large numbers including both sexes.

The Men Who Will Fight For the World's Championship

CHRISTY MATHEWSON HAS BEEN PITCHING BASEBALL IN THE BIG LEAGUES ALMOST EVER SINCE TWENTY-ONE YEARS OLD

IV—'CHRISTY' MATHEWSON, THE 'OLD MASTER' AND GIANT STAR

New York, Sept. 4.—Scientists have been searching for a perpetual motion machine for years. They have overlooked 'Christy' Mathewson, of the Giants, who is now enjoying his thirteenth season at the national pastime and looks better than ever in his club and worse to opposing batters.

Matty is called 'Big Six,' and the origin of this nickname has never been clearly explained except that some baseball writers thought it sounded well. It is generally believed the title came from the fact that he is six feet tall, but a discoverer of baseball dope, who is distinctly in the Dock Cook class, maintains it is because Matty wears a six and seven-eighths hat and that it would be awkward to call him 'Big Six and Seven-Eighths.'

Christy Mathewson has been pitching baseball in the Big League almost ever since anybody can remember, that is, anybody except Honus Wagner, the famous German light of Pittsburgh, around whom the National League was practically built. Matty has taken an important place in the history of the United States, beside such well known characters as George Washington and Abraham Lincoln. Washington was the father of his country, and Mr. Lincoln freed the slaves, while Christy Mathewson led a whole lot to do with correcting the Giants of a chronic habit of finishing in last place in the National League. It is easier for most school boys to remember Matty's pitching average than it is for them to tell you off hand the date on which Columbus discovered America.

Matty was born in Factoryville, Pa., in 1880, but was never blamed for that, because he moved out of the town as soon as he could, which he had done. His early ambition was to play a slip horn in the Factoryville band, and he earned out to be a good musician except that he could never produce any music. The leader used to give him a muscle 100 times a day, but that had been made harmless by treatment, and then he would go through the motions and the proprietor of the orchestra would collect for twelve pieces when only eleven were delivered. It is easy to see from this that Christy began his career of deceiving folks early in life and has been at it practically ever since with some few exceptions, notably when pitching against 'Joe' Tinker, formerly of the Cubs. His slip horn experience taught him that success means the gentle art of getting away with it.

Matty pitched a whole lot of baseball before he came to New York, receiving his start with the Factoryville team when a mere boy and appearing successfully for the Keystone Academy, Springton, N. Y., at Birkbeck College, Taunton, Mass., and Norfolk, Va., clubs. 'Phonon' John Smith, then the manager of Norfolk and now a policeman in New Hampshire, told George Davis, the Giants' manager, about Matty, and he came to New York in 1900 when New York needed him.

'Big Six' is the father of the famous fadeaway, which is his own invention. It being a ball that changes its mind several times in its course from his hand to the plate and in this way has confused a lot of batters so that they have

strained their backs trying to reach it. He has made a phenomenal record with the Giants. He won three games in the world's series with the Athletics in 1905 and one of the two taken by the Giants in 1911. Although he showed remarkable form in the series with the Red Sox last fall, he did not get credit for a victory because of perfunctory support.

Checkers was his only disquisition until he bought an automobile. Now he can't stand the smell of gasoline without wanting to shift a gear. He looks best in his street clothes since one knee has to ask the other one's permission before it can pass. However, this has never interfered with his pitching arm. He has quite a reputation as an orator, getting the decision in many an argument because he can talk louder than anyone else on the club.

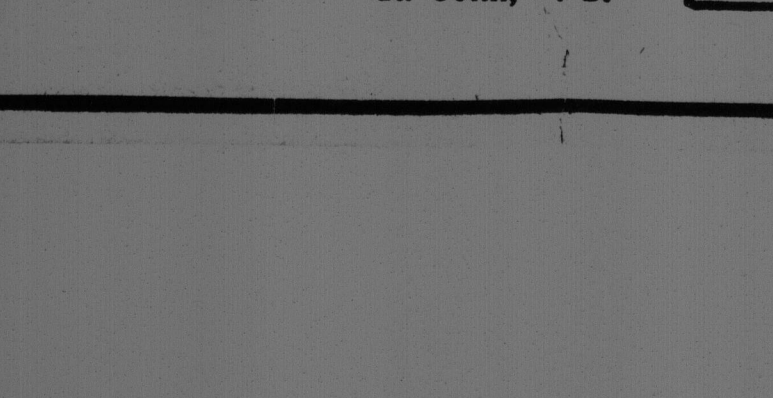
WALK FIVE OR SIX MILES EVERY DAY AND KEEP YOUNG

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 5.—Judge E. H. Sullivan, presiding judge of the superior courts of Spokane county, believes he has discovered the much sought fountain of youth. FORMER ST. JOHN PASTOR MAKES FINE IMPRESSION IN ENGLAND

Rev. J. L. Gordon is Called the Dr. Parker of Canada After Sermons Preached in Empire Metropolis

(Times' Special Correspondence) London, Aug. 26.—The first contingent of the Canadian representatives who are visiting this country in connection with the National Brotherhood Conference to be held next month in Birmingham arrived last week.

The party includes Dr. John L. Gordon of Winnipeg, whose facial likeness to Lloyd George was immediately remarked. He has arrived at a time when Canadian preachers are enjoying considerable vogue in London and the provinces, and are addressing crowded congregations from what are considered to be some of the most difficult pulpits to fill in London. The affectionate British Congregationalists, for instance, are so firmly pledged to the personalities and ministrations of leaders of Nonconformist thought like Sylvester Home, R. J. Campbell and Thomas Yates, that other preachers are always supposed to suffer by comparison.

At Whitefields Tabernacle, however, Dr. Gordon met with an instantaneous success, and at the Kensington Chapel he gave a fifty-minute sermon which was pronounced to be a justification for calling him 'the Dr. Parker of Canada.'

He has been requested to make several engagements in London and all over the country. London he believes to be the best governed city in the world and one of the most literary, for 'round his head he has counted as many as one hundred bookshelves.

Equal success has met Rev. John MacNeill of the Walmer Road Baptist church, Toronto. He has been occupying the pulpit of Rev. R. J. Campbell at the City Temple for the last few weeks. Founded by the renowned Dr. Parker, the City Temple is to Congregationalists what St. Paul's Cathedral or Westminster Abbey is to the members of the Anglican church. It has perhaps the most cosmopolitan congregation of any London place of worship, American, Canadian and continental preachers are usually to be found there in large numbers. Such mighty preachers as Spurgeon, Moffat, Henry Ward Beecher and Chalmers, as well as Dr. Parker, have left their tradition, and it is no small tribute to Mr. MacNeill's personality and eloquence that he has been invited to repeat his visit next year.

In comparison with the 'older churches of London, the City Temple is very young. The present building dates from the late eighties, but it was established in 1840.

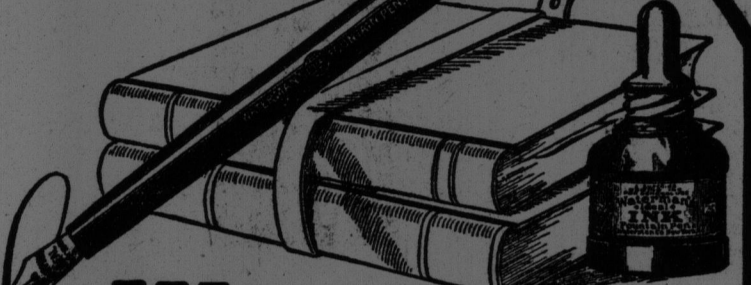

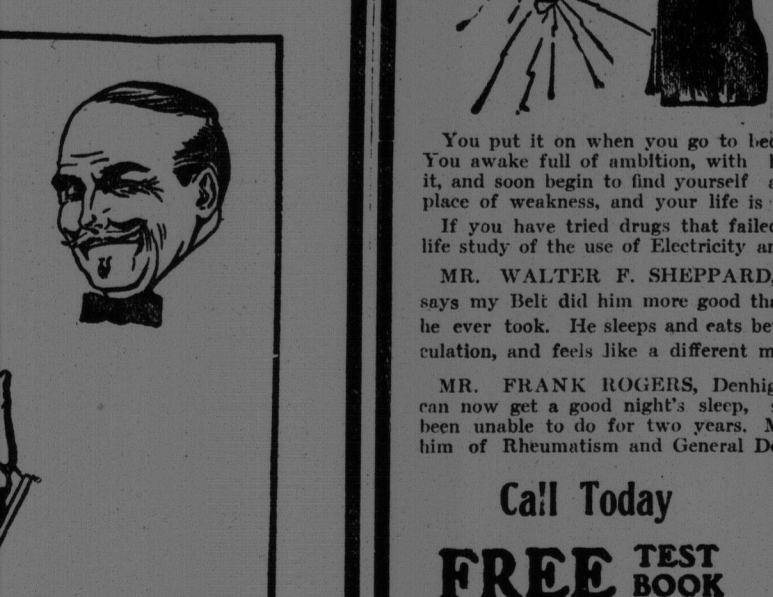

KNOW NOT A WORD OF ENGLISH BUT PLUCKILY TAKE UP SCHOOL WORK

Here's an Inspiration in Overcoming of Difficulties by Two Russian Children in Victoria School

The plucky ambition of some of the foreign settlers in Canada is securing as future citizens is well illustrated by an instance which has recently come up in one of our public schools. Joseph Bessan and his little sister, two Russian children, came to this country but a few weeks ago. In spite of the fact that they did not know a word of English when the schools opened two weeks ago, they applied for permits and were admitted to Grade 1 in the Victoria school. It was found, however, that they were much older than their playmates and had already had some instruction in their native land. So they were placed in Grade 2, the little girl in Miss Linsley's room and the little boy in Miss Cummings'. There they are attending daily now, strangers among strange people, not understanding a word in the books given them or a syllable of what is said around them, but both bravely determined to try.

Two of their little playmates are Hebrews who understand Yiddish, with which they are also familiar. With these companions as interpreters and by the use of many signs and gestures the little strangers are getting their first acquaintance with the English language as soon as they have picked up a few of the more current phrases, and this they will do rapidly, for they are bright kiddies, their teacher will be able to get on more intimate terms with them and by giving them extra instruction will keep them well up with their more fortunately prepared fellows.

The case of these Russian youngsters is not unique in St. John. One teacher in the Centennial school had in her class five little Hebrews, who knew only their own language. They were quick learners, however, and one of them, little Morris Jacobson, took two grades in one year. He made rapid strides in learning English and before he left school at the end of the last term he confided to his teacher that he really believed "English was easier than Hebrew after all."

If these little ones keep just as courageous in meeting difficulties when they grow up as they are now Canada is fortunate in obtaining such material for her future citizens.

ST. JOHN MAN FALLS OVER EASTPORT WHARF; FOUND UNCONSCIOUS

Daley, forty-five years old of St. John, who has been a deck-hand on the steamer Governor Dingy, fell from the Market wharf to the beach, a drop of about fifteen feet on Thursday night and was fortunately seen before the food tide, which would no doubt have caused his death by drowning. He was picked up unconscious. He is badly cut and has symptoms of internal injuries. He likely will recover.


