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





## REPORT OF DIRECTORS

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## REPORT OF DIRECTORS

--OF THE-

## Montreal Amateur Athletic Association,

For presentation to the Annual Meeting, 18th May, 1885.

GENTLEMEN:

It is with feelings of the liveliest satisfaction that your Directors lay before you a summary of the growth and proceedings of the Association during the past year, which has been one of unparallelled success and progress hardly looked for by the most sanguine among us.

Financially and otherwise the past twelve months have shewn that the Association gathers strength as it grows older, and proves once more the truth of the old adage, that "nothing succeeds like success."

The Financial Statement which has been mailed to every m em ber in accordance with the requirements of the By-Laws, shews some Four Thousand odd Dollars on the credit side; and our Capital Account now stands at \$13,688.10: the Association has no liabilities beyond the \$9,000 mortgage on the Building, and the Estimated Outstanding Accounts, which must always be in suspense in a large concern of this kind; representing undue bills for advertising, gas, competition prizes, etc., to meet which there is sufficient cash in hand; and the sum of Four Thousand Dollars besides has been placed on special deposit in the Bank of Montreal, to meet the above mentioned mortgage, which falls due 5th March, 1886; by which date the light of last year's experience leads us to hope the balance of \$5,000 will have been accumulated; so that the whole debt may be then cleared off, and the Association stand without a single liability by the unaided efforts of its own members, without extraneous assistance of any kind.

The fact should not be overlooked that in addition to the surplus shewn in the Statement, nearly \$2,000 have been expended on repairs and improvements to the Building, all of which has been considered and treated in the Books as part of the current expenses of the year.

These repairs, etc., have included the enlargement of the Billiard Room, purchase of three new tables, balls, cues, racks, wainscotting, seating, painting and tinting the whole room, repairing the rest of the tables, etc.; painting and tinting the Gymnasium, purchasing a quantity of new apparatus, including a Home-Trainer for Bicyclists, cleats for Tug of War practice, more pulley-weight apparatus, dumb-bells, single sticks, etc.; improvements to the dressing-rooms, new boxes, the insertion of registers from the furnace, painting and tinting. A new cloth and carpet for the stage, altering the front entrance, casing in the shooting gallery, and a new rifle, improving the upper end of the bowling alleys, new balls, pins, etc., and a new furnace.

Some old gymnastic apparatus of no further use to us has been donated to the "Mackay Institute," where it has probably already done much good.

The services of Mr. W. A. Doig were secured as Intructor of Gymnastics for the winter season, and your Directors consider the Association very fortunate in finding a teacher who manifests such an interest in his duties and his pupils that he has volunteered to continue his services gratuitously during the summer months, in order to keep his class together. The gymnastic season closed with a competition on 26th, 28th and 30th March, in which three prizes were offered, and which were won by the following members:

In out-door sports, the usual handicap Spring Games were held on the 2nd of June, and the Fall Games on the 4th October. In addition, an all-round competition for the "Club" Championship, was held on the 16th August, won by W. Kerr. A Hare and Hounds Run, was held on October 18th, and on the following Saturday, a Cross-Country Steeplechase to the Back River, the first two men, Messrs. D. D. McTaggart and W. Kerr being sent to New York, to represent the Association in the Race for the Cross-Country Championship of America, on the 4th November, which was won by McTaggart, Kerr a good third. Four medals were also given for a Team Race on Snow-Shoes to the Back River on 7th March, which was won by the Montreal S. S. Club. In the Carnival Drive the Association was represented by a very handsome car drawn by six horses. During the Session of the British Association the Geographical Section held their meetings in our Club House; this was one of the most important sections, and the officials expressed themselves in eulogistic terms on the accommodation afforded. During the winter the Bell Telephone Co. placed an instrument in the Club Rooms for the use of members free of charge.

The number of members who have canine companions, which they introduced to the Club House becoming very large the Directors found it necessary to prohibit dogs from entering the Building.

The Fraser Institute having come to terms respecting the books and shelving of the Mercantile Library Association, they have been removed from the Building, and at the present time improvements are being made in the Reading Room, a portion of which will be reserved for a Board Room and Secretary's Office, which, when completed, will make the Room very comfortable. New portfolios have been provided for the weekly papers, and fyles for the dailies, and several new additions to the list of journals have been made.

The Chess Club have found other quarters, and have removed their property from the Building. This was in consequence of the charge in the By-Laws, discontinuing subscriptions to Departments of the Building, made at the special meeting on 26th March last.

The Roof has been covered with Sparham Cement this spring, and with the above improvements the Club House may now be said to be in first-class condition.

The usual petition against granting liquor licenses in this neighborhood was circulated in the spring, so far with the desired result.

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Since the last Annual Meeting two new clubs have been admited to affiliation, viz:-The Tuque Bleue Toboggan Club and the Montreal Football Club, and these additions to the already numerous attractions of the Association have no doubt materially assisted in producing the enormous increase in membership of this year, as shewn by the following table.

The increase in Association membership during the previous year was 95, or one fourth of this year's, and the total increase 176, or rather less in proportion.

Clubs within the Association now include the M. A. A. A. Dramatic Club, the M. A. A. A. Cinderella Club, the Montreal Hockey Club and the Montreal Fencing Club; to belong to any of which it is necessary to be a full member of the Association.

The Hockey Club, formed last winter, made a very successful debut, winning the Championship from the Victorias, as well as the Carnival Cup for which the Victoria, McGill. Crystal, Ottawa and Montreal football teams competed with them. The Cup has been presented to the Association.

The Dramatic Club gave two very successful entertainments, one in January and one in April, and deserved better audiences than attended on either occasion; this is their third season.

The members of the Association organized a committee and gave an "At Home" on the 12th December, in the Club House, and the experiment resulted so favorably that a permanent organization for such purposes under the name of the "Cinderella Club" was formed, and they gave an "At Home" on the 6th March, which proved, if anything, a greater success than the first.

An Ethiopan Minstrel entertainment was to have been held in April. but had to be deferred till May from lack of time for preparation, it will therefore come under the next Annual Report.

The Fencing Club has also come into existence this year, and has every appearance of being a vigorous infant.

The caretaker, Geo. Crawford, who had given great satisfaction to the officials and members, left on the 1st May, and a new man has been engaged, who will, the Directors hope, after gaining a little experience, fill the position competently.

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## CHAIRMEN OF DEPARTMENT'S REPORTS.

MONTREAL. May, 1885.

To the Board of Directors of the M A. A. Association.

#### GENTLEMEN:

It is my privilege and pleasure for the fourth time to present to you the Annual Report of the Gymnasium Department of our Association.

Agreeably to my recommendations of last year, the necessary funds were appropriated and expended in purchasing new pulley weight and other apparatus, repairing and decorating the hall, and fitting up the dressing rooms with new boxes, etc., and improving the heating arrangements, all of which has tended to increase our membership and place our Gymnasium in the position it occupies in this country to-day, namely, second to none as regards equipment and general fitness for the purposes intended, a statement our many visitors from other places have repeatedly endorsed.

While our experience in the matter of Gymnastic Instructors has taught us that it were better to be without any than to suffer the infliction of so-called instructors (?) whose ideas of the value of muscle apart from brains did not accord with our own, and while my recommendations in these respects were supported, the necessity of having some one who could intelligently take hold of the classes and conduct them so that members could get full benefit therefrom, without entailing unwarrantable expense, was ever before me.

At the beginning of the season, Mr. Wm. A. Doig, having applied for and apparently shown himself capable of filling the position, was engaged, and has proved himself the right man for the place, he having at once made himself popular and introduced several new features that enlisted the interest of members, especially beginners, whose improvement has been most marked. An unfortunate accident to his knee, early in December, caused his con-

finement in the Hospital for some weeks, and retarded the classes somewhat, but a committee of members appointed by the chairman, assisted in keeping them together until his reappearance.

There were 74 regular class nights in the six months (including Christmas and New Year and one other evening, January 29th, at which there were none present). The largest number present any evening, 50, the smallest, 2. The average attendance, 20. The total number of members attending and entered on the list, 115; many of these appearing but once however. The members attending 25 classes and over, are Messrs. C. G. Hyde, 54; J. B. McPherson, 54; F. B. Ness, 49; J. Turner, 40; Jos. Wilson, 39; G. C. Fletcher, 37; F. A. Rodden, 36; C. S. Reynolds, 33; P. Guy, 31; F. W. Stewart, 31; C. A. Reynolds, 30; H. A. Harries, 29; C. L. DeMartigny, 28; G. Barry, 27; F. Darling, 27; C. W. King, 25. Owing to Mr. Doig's enforced absence, and the outdoor and other attractions our Association offers, which tend to draw members away from the comparatively dry work of the Gymnasium, the average is not so good as might be, but it is on the whole very fair. The results attendant upon constant practice are apparent in the score sheet of the competition.

Medals were offered for competition as per schedule (A,) and were won by

The full list of scores (B) being hereto annexed.

A protest having been entered and proved against Mr. Wilson, for competing in the Caledonian Society's Games, last August, he was debarred, and under the By-Laws forfeited his membership. but as he claimed extenuating circumstances, his request for re-instatement to be laid before the Amateur Athletic Association of Canada, will likely be favorably considered.

A prize was also offered in connection with Dr. Sargent's system on certain conditions (C), and was awarded to Mr. Henry Harries, in conformity with Dr. Gurd's report (D).

I would strongly urge upon members, the desirability of securing such an advantage as the medical examination conducted by ra

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Dr. Gurd will afford as a preliminary to any athletic work, (the fee of \$1.00 being a merely nominal charge), while to those who desire rational exercise on an intelligent plan the system is invaluable.

I have no particular recommendations to offer for the ensuing season, further than that the present arrangements be continued and that the Gymnasium be kept up in the most efficient manner possible, and the comfort and convenience of members desiring to use it studied in every way.

I would impress upon all our athletes, runners, football players, bicycle riders, and lacrosse men, the immense advantage a proper course of gymnastic training would give to one so equipped, in any athletic contest, over one who might not be so evenly developed, but also, taking higher ground, would remind them at the same time that gymnastics in such a case, and as a rule is only a "means to an end," and that the "end" and incentive should not be considered the mere winning of an "event" and its accompanying trophy, but the attainment of a harmonious and perfect development of the physique, and the incalculable benefits resulting therefrom.

## (A). GYMNASTIC COMPETITION.

To be held at the close of the season, March, 1885.

IST PRIZE—IST CLASS—GOLD MEDAL.
Open to all.

1st PRIZE-2nd CLASS-SILVER MEDAL.

From which former winners of prizes in gymnastics shall be debarred.

Open only to members who have not prior to October 1st, 1884, taken part in gymnastic classes.

#### RULES.

- 1. Only those members who have attended at least twenty-five (25) regular classes after November 15, shall be entitled to compete.
- 2. Competitions in all three classes will be conducted simultaneously; each competitor will be allowed 2 trials. Rotation to be decided by lot.
- 3. The competitions shall comprise exercises on the following apparatus. Indian clubs, dumb bells, jumping, vaulting horse, peg pole, rope, spring-board, parallel bars, horizontal bar, horizontal ladder, inclined ladder, rings.
- 4. The leads shall be selected by the judges at their discretion on the night of the competition, from a list to be supplied by the instructor of those exercises in regular use, and if necessary, he shall be requested to perform the feat himself.
- 5. In addition to these class exercises, competitors shall be allowed two leads each on any apparatus, including feats of strength and agility. Leads to be named and described, and may be refused at the discretion of the judges. Marks will be given for each exercise in proportion to its value, due weight being given to style, finish, etc., the competitor winning the highest number of marks to take the prize in one class only.
- 6. Two (2) judges shall have entire control of the competition and decide all questions. In the event of a difference between them the chairman of the department shall act as referee. The decision of the judges shall be final.

DEAR SIR,—I have the honor of submitting to you the following report of the examinations recently held for the prize offered to the class who have been following the method of Physical Development, as recommended by Dr. Sargent of Harvard University.

Mr. Harry Harries took first place with twenty points, Mr. J. T. Dwyer second with eighteen points. Both these gentlemen have made highly satisfactory general improvement as shewn by increase in weights, measurements, and strength.

For the benefit of those who may wish it, I may state briefly the special features of Dr. Sargent's system.

Each individual's heart and lungs are first medically examined, next, measurements of height, weight, size and strength of limbs, capacity of chest, etc., etc., are taken. The family and personal history is inquired into, to find out if there be a tendency to any weakness. After these points have been considered, exercises principally upon Dr. Sargent's Special Pulley Weight Apparatus are then prescribed to suit each case.

To the President and Directors of the M. A. A. Association. Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in presenting a report of the Billiard Room Committee for the past year.

Last summer extensive alterations were made in this department, the room being enlarged by the removal of the partition at the entrance; the old seats were taken away, and a wainscot with seat attached was put all around the room, the whole being painted and varnished, the walls tinted, and the ceiling white-washed.

Pictures have been tastefully arranged on the walls, and several minor decorations add much to the appearance of the room.

Three new tables were purchased, and three old ones have had new cushions and cloths put on, one carom table was made into an American pocket table, and the English table was recovered, and repaired generally. With these additions and alterations, we have now eight tables in first class order, viz:  $3-4\frac{1}{2} \times 9$  carom,  $3-5 \times 10$  carom,  $1-5 \times 10$  American pool, and  $1-6 \times 12$  English pocket table.

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Although the out-door attractions during the winter have been very great, the interest taken in this department has not diminished, the attendance being far larger than in previous years, and notwithstanding our increased facilities, the demand for tables has been greater than we can accommodate.

In January last the collector of Inland Revenue took action against us for having billiard tables in use, without procuring a license from the Provincial Government, the matter was contested on the ground that the tax was intended to apply to those who kept tables as a means of deriving a profit, and therefore, did not apply to institutions such as ours, who kept the tables merely as a source of recreation for their members. But, notwithstanding the able manner in which our honorary solicitor conducted the case, judgment was rendered against us.

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To the Directors of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association.

GENTLEMEN;

In presenting its Annual Report, the Out-Door Sports Committee cannot congratulate the Association on the very active interest taken by the members in the different features which characterized its work during the past year.

On Saturday, June 7th, 1884, the Annual Spring Handicap Games took place on the Lacrosse Grounds. Out of an entry list of 68 there were but 23 of our members. The programme comprised fifteen events, of which our men won seven first and seven second prizes.

On Saturday afternoon, 16th August, 1884, the Associaion Championship competition for the best "all round" athlete took place. Mr. Wm. Kerr won first place, with 22 out of a possible 30 points. The summary of this competition will be found under its proper head.

On Saturday afternoon, October 4th, 1884, the Annual Fall Games took place on the Club grounds. By the organization of the Amateur Athletic Association of Canada, the honor of presenting the championship programme has departed from us, but we take pleasure in stating that past championship meetings, held under our auspices, received the hearty endorsement of the new Association at its inaugural meeting. Owing to the fact that athletic games were being held in New York on the same day, we were minus the presence of our American cousins. Out of 13 events, our members won 4 first and 3 second prizes. The summary is appended.

On Saturday afternoon, 25th October, 1884, a Cross Country Steeple-Chase to the Back River took place, to determine our representatives in the American Championship Cross Country Steeple Chase to be held in New York on 4th November. There were 9 competitors, and the race was won by D. D. McTaggart in 45 min. 52½ sec.; with Wm. Kerr second, in 46 min., 56¾ sec. Your Committee has much pleasure in stating that the former of these gentlemen won the American Cross Country Championship, and the latter, third place.

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On Saturday afternoon, 7th March, 1885, gold medals were offered for a Cross Country team race on snow shoes, teams to consist of not less than four men. Invitations were sent to all the Snow Shoe Clubs in the country, but only the following accepted the same:—St. George, Le Trappeur, Argyle and Montreal Snow Shoe Clubs. At the last moment the "Argyle" withdrew, two of their team failing to fyle an appearance. The race was won by the "Montreal," with five out of the six leading men.

Your Committee would again urge upon the Directors the necessity of providing such hurdles as will do the Association credit; this matter was suggested by your Committee in a former Report, and samples of hurdles presented, but their purchase was deferred for want of sufficient funds. Now that the Association is in such a prosperous condition this want should be immediately supplied, so that at our Spring Meeting the critical eye of our patrons, or the symmetrical limbs of our athletes, may run no risk of disjointure by a glimpse at or a fall over the present uncouth apology for hurdles. Patterns might be taken from the English style of hurdle, which is made from osiers or rushes. Either of these would make a light, handy article, and be less dangerous than any other style. We trust the incoming Committee will take up this matter thoroughly.

#### GENTLEMEN:

This is the fourth occasion on which I have had the pleasure of presenting the Report of your Committee to the Annual Meeting of the Club,

At the Annual Convention of the National Amateur Lacrosse Association, held last April, Mr. Angus Grant, of ours, was elected President.

Desired changes in method of deciding the Championship by a series of matches, and of deciding matches by a majority of games won in a given time, were not carried at the convention; and owing to the protracted session, a proposition to allow 2nd Twelves of 1st class clubs to compete for Intermediate and Local Championships was not brought up.

At a meeting of players and Committee on 16th April, Messrs. F. C. A. McIndoe and W. Cairns were appointed Field Captains; the latter, however, declined to act; and at another meeting held 14th May, Mr. R. B. Ross was elected in his stead.

After considerable correspondence an arrangement was made with the Toronto Club to fix a maximum 18250.00 for the expenses

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of each club when visiting the other; this was done with a view to encourage a reduction in the travelling expenses; as all over the \$250.00 must be borne by the visiting club. It was intended to have a display of fireworks on the evening of the Queen's Birthday, but the weather was so unfavourable we had to postpone till the following Monday, which, no doubt, contributed to the non-success (financially) of the event.

The first match of the season was played on our grounds on the 17th May with the Caughnawaga Indians, whom we defeated by 4 games to 1. The following members formed the white team:—F. C. A. McIndoe, captain, W. J. Cleghorn, goal-keeper, R. A. Elliot, point, W. D. Aird, cover-point, T. F. Trihey and A. G. Gardner, defence field, D. Paterson, centre, W. Griffin, R. Whyte, N. J. #### GENTLEMEN:

It is with extreme gratification that your committee present to you their Annual Report, being the Forty-third Annual Report of the Club's doings.

The past season stands unrivalled in the Annals of the Club. Never before has such an interest been taken in this most enjoyable pastime.

Little did the "twelve" who in 1840 tramped once a week five or six miles out of town and then back to that famous Café on St. James Street, near St. Peter, kept by L. Tetu, dream that they were founding a Club which now consists of 886 paying, 86 life members, in all 972, and ranks as one of the greatest institutions in the city, but such was really the case, and to these gentlemen of a bygone age we tender our most sincere thanks.

Our first tramp took place on the 19th November, when 197 members walked out to Lumpkin's by the Cote des Neiges road, and were there entertained to the usual supper by the President and the Vice-Presidents.

Our first tramp on shoes took place on Wednesday evening, the 17th of December, 92 members tramping over the mountain.

During the season we took 17 Wednesday evening tramps, with an average attendance of 174, and the largest muster at any tramp was 532 on the night of the Carnival Torchlight Procession. Our first Saturday afternoon tramp was taken on the 20th of December. At 3.45 Laurent tination of 86, al Ben. To

At 3.45 p.m. 62 members left the gymnasium and tramped to St. Laurent, where they met 24 others who had arrived at the same destination by some means unknown to snow-shoers, making a muster of 86, all of whom were entertained to an old-fashioned dinner by Mr.

During the winter we took 8 Saturday afternoon tramps, with an average attendance of 55. The average number of trampers was 34, and largest muster 130, on Saturday the 28th of February, when the members were entertained to dinner by Mr. Haig Sims at Peloquin's, Sault-au-Recollet. During the season the following places were visited, viz:-Sault-au-Recollet three times, St. Laurent twice, Lachine, Longue Pointe and St. Johns once.

On Wednesday evening, the 21st of January, the Annual Green Steeplechase was run. Nine competitors started, the race being won by Mr. W. Kerr in 21 m. 441/2 s.

This race was started from the Club House, instead of the old place.

On Tuesday afternoon, the 27th of January, the Carnival Steeplechase over the mountain took place with the following result,

Owing to the watch of one of the timekeepers stopping the time made in this race could not be accurately obtained.

On Wednesday evening the 28th of January the Carnival Torchlight Procession took place.

The following Clubs took part, viz :- St. George, Athletic, Maple Leaf, Argyle, Wolseley, Emerald, Le Canadien, Cowansville, Frontier (Rouse's Point,) and Montreal (Whipping in,) in all about 1500 snowshoers, of which 532 were members of the Tuque Bleue. On the return of the procession from the mountain, the members of the Tuque Bleue marched to the Queen's Hall, and gave a very successful concert in imitation of an evening at Lumpkin's. Although the

concert did not commence till 10.30 p.m., the hall was filled with a very appreciative audience. The following remark being made by the Montreal *Herald* about the appearance of the members upon the stage:—

"The reclining position of the members of this vigorous organization on the stage was really picturesque and attractive to a degree that must be witnessed, as no pen description would do it justice."

On Thursday afternoon, the 29th of January, the Carnival Drive took place, the M. S. S. C. having a very tastefully decorated sleigh, emblematic of snowshoeing, drawn by six horses.

In the evening 102 members mustered at the Club House and marched to the Champ de Mars, where they assisted in the inauguration of the Condora, after which they proceeded to the Drill Hall and took part in the Snowshoers' Concert got up by the East End Carnival Committee.

On Saturday, the 31st of January, the Carnival Snow Shoe Races took place on the Shamrock L. C. Grounds. There were eight open events, of which the Montreal won 4, St. George 2 and Emerald 2.

On Wednesday evening, the 4th of February, the Annual Club Steeple-chase was run. Five competitors started, the race being won by Mr. J. Baird in 21 minutes 20 seconds.

On Wednesday evening, the 11th of February, the members entertained their lady friends at Lumpkin's, when a very enjoyable evening was spent. There were about 150 ladies present, a large number of whom tramped over the mountain.

On Saturday, the 14th of February, our Annual Races took place on the Lacrosse Grounds.

The weather was beautiful and the track in excellent condition, but the number of spectators was very small.

Wednesday evening, the 18th of February, was a gala night with the members, it being the occasion on which the life-members had a grand re-union. Amongst those present were Romeo Stephens, Wm. G. and H. E. Murray, Wm. Stanley. Col. Hutton, W. H. Rintoul, Fred. Matthews, H. Baby, H. R. Ives, C. Selby, A. Cassils, Lt.-Col. Whitehead, and a large number of others. Later in the evening we had a visit from Messrs. S. L. Clemens (Mark Twain) and G. W. Cable, who, after being introduced to the members, were seized by half-a-dozen of the most herculean, and initiated by being sent up to explore the smoky regions at the top of the hall. The retiring officers have much pleasure in presenting the usual rearly report, for the season of 1884, to the 7th Annual Business Meeting of the Montreal Bicycle Club.

The opening meet of this season was held Saturday, 26th April, when 32 men rode out to Blue Bonnets. The roads were in good condition and it is to be hoped that the same state of affairs may exist this year at the same date. The closing meet was held Saturday, 11th October, when 6 of our riders wheeled out to Lachine.

Between these dates the Club turned out 71 times—25 fixtures having been cancelled owing to unfavorable weather.

The mileage for the season was 829 miles, and the rides were attended by a total of 784—making an average of, say, 11.

The great interest taken in the affairs of the Club is well evidenced by the fact that there was a total attendance of 552 members at our 26 weekly business meetings of the Club held during the past season, making an average of over 21.

Racing continues to be in favor with our active riders, new men appearing on the track from time to time, but the want of a suitable and convenient track, puts an effectual extinguisher on any hope of this branch of our sport becoming as general as it otherwise would, if we had at our command a track fit to ride on. We have only to hope (and work) that before long we may have a race course second to none in Canada. Until such a track is ours, we need not think to induce outside riders to take part in our Race Meetings.

The large number of events that came off in 1884, would render a complete list of them too bulky for this report, suffice it then for us to mention only the chief events.

At the head of the list stands, of course, our Spring Meeting held Saturday, June 21, at the Montreal Driving Park.

It might be mentioned here that the object of your Committee in holding the meeting at this place was in order to get a track more suitable for cycling than the one on the Lacrosse grounds. This expectation was fulfilled—only in part, while the attendance was not such as to encourage another venture at the same place, at least for the present.

A principal feature of this meeting, and one not very creditable to us, was the fact that out of 10 first prizes, outsiders carried away six.

A new feature of this event was the throwing open of all the events on the programme, that is, having no strictly club races.

This, we believe, is the first time any club in Canada has done such a thing and although the result turned out somewhat unsatisfactorily, yet we would recommend to the incoming Committee that the same course should be adopted during the coming season, should any race meeting be held.

The exhibition of fancy riding given by Master Georgie Nash at this event was a great treat to the spectators, and must have opened the eyes of the "Outer Barbarians" to the capabilities of the Bicycle. The field officers for the afternoon were as follows:

GENTLEMEN,-

In presenting this the Second Annual Report of the Tuque Bleue Toboggan Club, your Committee have to report the affiliation of the Club with the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association, which was completed last November, a move which has been productive of the most beneficial results to our Club, as well as to the Association; not only has our Club been better patronized, but the interest in it has been greater than last year. The Club had a membership at the close of season 1883–4 of 532, and the past season 465, outside of the M. A. A. A, which has 842 members; therefore we have 1,307 members who are entitled to the use of our slides. The work of the season began in December, when the slides were erected, one extra chute being added, making in all five. The accommodation in the previous season was inadequate to the demand; and even last year, with our increased facilities, on several occasions—notably in Carnival week—we could have kept one or two more slides fully occupied.

The first Toboggan Races ever given by any Club were held under our auspices, on January 17th, at our slide, and although the weather was very bad, snow falling in clouds, the public turned out in great numbers, and proved by the pleasure they took in the proceedings that our Club had in it the elements of a successful drawing interest.

We are pleased to state that the Club had three weeks sliding immediately after the wet period, before any other Club.

We have also to thank the gentlemen members for services rendered, especially during Carnival week.

#### GENTLEMEN:

The 14th Annual General Meeting of the Montreal Football Club was held in the Montreal Gymnasium, Monday, March 30th, Mr. R. Esdaile in the chair.

Never has the Club had such a successful season as that of 1884. The practices have been well attended; the membership has increased; and as nearly all the new members have been playing members it has had the effect of making the Club very strong in every way.

For the last two seasons, 1883 and 1884, not a single match has been lost.

During the season 1884 the Quebec Rugby Union was formed, and ties were arranged for Clubs in the Province of Quebec. In Ontario they also formed an Ontario Rugby Union.

We won all our Quebec matches, thus winning the championship of Lower Canada.

On November 6th, Thanksgiving Day, we went up to Toronto, to dispute with the Toronto Football Club the title of Champions of Canada. We won the match by 30 points to nothing, thus holding the right of calling ourselves "Champions of Canada."

In January, 1885, the Committee decided to lay the question of affiliating with the M. A. A. Association before the Club, and at a special meeting held on Thursday, March 28, 1885, it was unanimously resolved to affiliate.

GENTLEMEN,-

I have much pleasure in presenting the Report of your Committee on the first season's work.

A meeting of members of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association was held at the Club House on Friday evening, 28th November, 1884; Mr. T. L. Paton took the chair, and explained that the meeting was called with a view of forming a Hockey Club in connection with the said Association; and it being the unanimous opinion of the members present that such a Club was advisable, the meeting proceeded to form a Constitution and Code of By-Laws, and to elect Officers for the year; which resulted as follows:—Mr. Thos. Fraser, President, Mr. W. D. Aird, Vice-President, Mr. F. W. Barlow, Hon. Sec. and Treasurer, with Messrs. J. G. Ross, F. M. Larmonth, Wm. Hodgson A. E. McNaughton and T. L. Paton as Committee.

The membership of the Club is only 19—a small number—but I trust it will be largely increased next season.

The first season of the Club has been a very successful one, and notwithstanding all the trouble and inconvenience the Club had to contend with—in the way of getting ice to practice on—I think we can show a very good record.

The season commenced with the Victoria Rink Tournament, and it fell to the lot of our team to play against the McGill Club on

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the Victoria Rink ice, on Tuesday evening, 20th January—play for two half hours,—which resulted in our favor by two goals to none.

The following composed the team — T. L. Paton, F. M. Larmonth, W. D. Aird, Wm. Hodgson, D. McIntyre, R. A. Smith, and F. W. Barlow.

It was decided by the Carnival Out-Door Sports Committee to have a Carnival Hockey Club for a silver cup, to be presented to the Club winning the greatest number of games; and our Club entered a team to compete with the others. And on Wednesday, 28th January, our team played their first game in the Tournament with the Montreal Foot Ball Club, and gained a victory by 6 goals to 1.

The team was the same as played with McGill on the 20th January.

On Friday morning our same team played their second game in the Carnival Tournament with the Ottawa Club. Play two half hours, resulting in a draw of one goal each; play was resumed for an additional half-hour, which also resulted in another draw of one goal each: making two goals each in the hour-and-half; it was then decided that play should be stopped, and that the Carnival Committee should decide when the match should be played off. The Cha.rman of the Carnival Out-Door Sports Committee decided that the game should be played off on Saturday morning, at 8.30, and at about 9 o'clock the two teams faced each other again. Play to be two-half-hours; and at the end of the two-half-hours neither side had obtained any advantage of the other, and after a few minutes rest the teams were again called out to play an additional halfhour; and after twenty-eight minutes play, Aird put the puck through the Ottawa goals, and scored again for our team. The game was again started, and on time being called, no more games had been taken; thus our team won after a very hard fight.

On Saturday afternoon, by order of the Carnival Committee, our same team played the final game with the McGill Club. Play was for two-half-hours; and was won by us by one goal to none, thus winning the Carnival Cup with the same team as played in the morning.

On Friday evening, 6th February, our team played the final

game in the Victoria Rink Tournament with the Victoria Club. Play two-half hours; and was won by our team by one goal to none. The team was the same as played all along, in fact, the team was not changed during the season. After the above game both teams were entertained by the Directors of the Rink in their rooms; the mugs were presented to our team, viz: one to each player.

I trust the good record of the Club for last season will increase the membership for next season, and induce some new players to come out. The greatest drawback last year to the team was getting the necessary practice with so limited a membership.
