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Anibersity of Trinity College.

THE UNIVERSITY OF TRINITY COLLEGE was constituted by a Royal Charter, bearing date 16th July, 1852, and empowered to confer Degrees in Divinity, Arts, Law, and Medicine.

THE CONVOCATION of the University consists of the Chancellor, the Provost and Professors of Trinity College, and all persons admitted 10 the Degree of Master of Arts, or to any Degree in Divinity, Law, or Medicine, in the University.

No Degree can be granted by the University, unless a Supplicat for that Degree shall have passed the Convocation, having been previously approved by the Caput.

THE CAPUT consists of the Vice-Chancellor, and four Members of Convocation, to be elected annually by Convocation at the first meeting in the Michaelmas Term.

The University confers no Degree whatever unless the candidate has previously taken the oaths of allegiance and supremacy, and subscribed the following declaration :---

"I, A. B., do willingly and heartily declare that I am truly and sincerely a member of the United Church of England and Ireland."*

* For any Degree in Divinity, subscription to the Three Articles of the XXXVIth Canon is also required.

PROCEEDINGS IN ARTS.

All Candidates for the Degree of B.A. must be Matriculated Students of Trinity College, and have kept nine complete Terms. They will be required by the University to pass two Examinations.

I. THE PREVIOUS EXAMINATION, which will take place at the end of the Lent Term in the second year.

The subjects of this Examination will be :

One of the Historical Books of the New Testament. Paley's Evidences of Christianity. The Church Catechism. One Greek and one Latin Author. Latin 1 Euclid Algebr Trigon

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The end of Latin Prose Composition. Euclid—Bks. I., II., III., IV., VI. Algebra to the end of the Binomial Theorem. Trigonometry to the end of the solution of Triangles.

The particular Latin and Greek authors will be fixed at the beginning of the Lent Term in the year preceding. The names of those who pass this Examination will be arranged in two classes, in alphabetical order—the first class consisting of those who shall pass with credit; the second of those to whom the Examiners shall only not refuse their certificate of approval.

Any one who shall absent himself from the proper Examination of his year, without the written approval of the Vice-Chancellor, will not be allowed the Lent Term of that year.

Those who fail to satisfy the Examiners must present themselves at the Examination in the following year.

II. THE EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHE-LOR OF ARTS, which will take place at the beginning of the tenth term from Matriculation.

The subjects for this Examination will be :

Old and New Testament History. One of The Historical Books of the New Testament. The Articles of the Church of England. Two Greek and two Latin Authors. Greek and Roman History. Latin Prose Composition. Euclid. Algebra to the end of the Binomial Theorem. Trigonometry to the end of Solution of Triangles. Mechanics.

Hydrostatics.

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The particular authors will be fixed before the end of the Easter Term of the second year.

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Those who shall have been approved at this Examination may present themselves for further Examination for Honors in Classics or Mathematics.

The Honor Examination will take place shortly after the Examination for the ordinary degree of B.A. The result of each Honor Examination will be published in three classes, in order of merit.

In addition to the Mathematical Lectures on the subjects mentioned for the Degree of B.A., students of the second and third years are required to attend a course of Lectures on Optics, Astronomy, Sound, and the Theory of Light treated popularly. The course will extend over two years, and the Lectures will be given in the Michaelmas and Lent Terms. Students of the third year will also be required to attend during the Easter Term a course of Lectures on Fortification.

Questions on all these subjects will be introduced into the Examination for B.A.

Students of the second year will be required to attend a course of Lectures on Surveying during the Easter Term, and questions on the subject will be introduced into their Examination at the end of the term.

N.B.—The Lectures in the Arts Course commence in the Michaelmas Term; and as the Annual Examination in the following June, and the Final Examination for the Degree of B.A., embrace the subjects of the Lectures delivered in that Term, a Student entering at any other time does so under a great disadvantage.

PROVISION FOR ADMITTING CANDIDATES TO DEGREES IN ARTS, BY EXAMINATION, WITHOUT RESIDENCE.

In consideration of the small opportunity which the inhabitants of the Province have hitherto possessed of availing themselves of a University Education, the Corporation have resolved to admit Candidates residen *five yea* followin 1. All

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which to posy Edut Candidates to Degrees in Arts, by Examination, without residence or attendance at Lectures, for the space of five years, beginning from October, 1860, under the following regulations:

- 1. All Candidates shall be members of the United Church of England and Ireland.
- 2. They shall produce Testimonials of good conduct and of attainment, signed by at least one parochial Clergyman, and two Laymen of respectability.
- 3. They shall also satisfy the Corporation that professional duties preclude the possibility of their passing through a regular College Course.
- 4. No Candidate shall be less than 25 years of age.
- 5. These regulations shall in no way affect the regulations already made respecting Students in Divinity.
- 6. Candidates shall pass the several University Examinations, that is to say, the Examination for Matriculation, the previous Examination, and the Examination for the Degree of B.A., at the usual intervals.

N.B.—Under this Statute Candidates may be admitted to the Matriculation Examination for the first time in October, 1860, and for the last time in October, 1864.

PROFESSOR HIND'S LECTURES.

First Year. { General and Organic Chemistry, Experimental Philosophy.

Second Year.—Practical Chemistry, Geology. Third Year.—Applied Chemistry, Geology.

The Lectures on General and Organic Chemistry, have particular reference to Agricultural Chemistry; those on Experimental Philosophy to Heat, Electricity, Light in its relation to Chemistry, and Photography. The text books used are Fowne's Chemistry, Noad's Chemical Analysis, Lyell's Manual of Elementary Geology.

An Annual Examination is held in these subjects, and prizes are awarded.

PROFESSOR BOVELL'S LECTURES.

The subject of these Lectures is Physiology in its relation to Natural Theology. Attendance on these lectures is required of Students of the third year, and the subject is added to the subjects in the Annual Examination of that year.

PROCEEDINGS IN DIVINITY.

THEOLOGICAL CLASS.

THE THEOLOGICAL COURSE extends over two years. Any person is eligible for admission to it who has taken the Degree of B.A., or who, having attained the age of twenty-one, has passed one year in the Arts Course.

BACHELOR OF DIVINITY.

Candidates for this Degree must be Masters of Arts of at least seven years' standing. The requisite exercises are :---

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A Latin and an English Thesis; one on some point of doctrine connected with the Thirty-nine Articles, and the other on some Scriptural subject, to be appointed by the Examiners.

An Examination must also be passed in some Latin or Greek Treatise or Treatises chosen by the Examiners.

An English Sermon must be preached before the University.

DOCTOR OF DIVINITY.

Candidates for this Degree must be Bachelors of Divinity of five years' standing. They will be required to write an English and Latin Thesis, as in the case of B.D., and to preach an English sermon before the University.

The Examiners in Divinity shall be the Professor of Divinity and two Graduates in that Faculty, to be appointed by the Council.

EXAMINATION IN MORAL SCIENCES.

AN EXAMINATION IN MORAL SCIENCES will take place at the end of the Lent Term in each year, open to Bachelors of Arts. There will be a course of lectures on the History of Philosophy, and on portions of the works of standard ancient and modern Philosophers.

The particular subjects for Examination will be fixed in the Lent Term of the preceding year.

Candidates will be arranged in order of merit.

Trinity College.

TRINITY COLLEGE was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Canada, passed in the year of our Lord, 1851, constituted a body corporate, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, (or in case of the division of the Diocese of Toronto, of the Bishops of the several Dioceses into which the Diocese of Toronto shall be divided), the Trustees of the College, and the College Council.

On the first of January, 1850, an Act of the Provincial Legislature came into operation, constituting the University of Toronto; and under the provisions of this Act the Faculty of Divinity was suppressed, and the use of the ritual of the English Church forbidden in King's College, now known as University College.

This important change in the constitution of a foundation, which owed its origin mainly to the longcontinued and persevering efforts of the Bishop of Toronto, appeared to his Lordship, and to the great body of the Churchmen of the Province, to render indispensable the erection of a College for the instruction of members of the Church of England.

The Bishop, consequently, on the 7th of February, 1850, issued a Pastoral Letter to the Clergy and Laity of the] work. about lands. In th land, v carryi Propag vote of of fou seven of the upwar for P thousa hundr excee On stone 15th and fi comm In Arch in E McM made solici met e the n book of the Diocese, inviting their co-operation in the good work. This appeal was nobly responded to, and about $\pounds 25,000$ currency was subscribed, in money, lands, and stock in building societies.

In the same year his Lordship proceeded to England, where he received very liberal assistance in carrying out his great design. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts made a vote of two thousand pounds, payable by instalments of four hundred pounds per annum, and also gave seven acres and a-half of land, within the precincts of the city of Toronto, which has since realized upwards of nine thousand pounds. The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge granted three thousand pounds. The subscriptions of individuals exceeded four thousand pounds.

On Wednesday, April 30th, 1851, the foundation stone of the College was laid; and on Thursday, the 15th of January, 1852, the Inauguration took place, and from this day the regular course of instruction commenced.

In the year 1852 the Ven. A. N. Bethune, D.D., Archdeacon of York, raised further subsciptions in England; and, in 1852-3, the Rev. William McMurray, D.D., by the appointment of the Bishop, made a tour in the United States, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions on behalf of the College. He met every where with a most cordial reception from the members of the sister Church, and obtained, in books and money, a sum little short of 10,000 dollars.

B. Fuller, D.D., and by the Rev. Saltern Givins,—the former, by the Bishop's appointment, undertaking the canvass of the western, the latter that of the eastern section of the Diocese.

In April, 1853, Dr. Burnside placed at the disposal of the College the munificent sum of £6,000, in lands and money,—a portion of which has been devoted to the foundation of two Burnside Scholarships for Students in Arts, in/order permanently to associate with the College the name of this noble benefactor.

Since Dr. Burnside's death, his executors have given to the College the sum of $\pounds 5,000$, to be appropriated to the completion of the building.

Other benefactions to the College will be found mentioned in connexion with the Library, or under the head of Scholarships.

LIBRARY.

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The College Library contains about 3,500 volumes, 600 of which are a gift from the Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge. About the same number were sent from England by private benefactors before the College was opened. Valuable additions have been made to the Library by the Government of the State of New York, from the Smithsonian Institute, and from Columbia College. The Bishop of Toronto has also presented upwards of 300 volumes, including many valuable works in Theological, Classical, and general Literature. The University of Oxford has recently made a munificent grant of books, published at the University press, of the value of £150 sterling; and Trinity College, Dublin, has kindly presented copies of the works published by the University, amounting to upwards of 80 volumes.

All fees for Matriculation and Degrees are appropriated to the Library Fund. Members of Convocation are, under certain regulations, entitled to the use of the Library.

MUSEUM.

A part of the present building bas been fitted up for the temporary reception of a Museum of Natural History, towards which many Mineralogical, Geological, and other specimens have been already contributed.
