It is not often that heads of nations forget themselves, but when they do there is considerable trouble in the international family. Even diplomatists, who are supposed to know how to hold their tongues in several languages, make these mistakes sometimes. Considerable bitter feeling was caused between the United States and ourselves by an indiscretion of Lord Sackville, when British Ambassador at Washington—an indiscretion which cost him his official position. A Presidential election was then raging in the republic with its usual fury and Lord Sackville was led into giving his opinion to a correspondent, who asked his advice as to which candidate to vote for. Unfortunately, the seemingly innocent seeker of advice turned out to be a smart newspaper man, and the indiscretion of the ambassador received full publicity. The United States were very angry indeed; and Lord Salisbury was compelled to withdraw Lord Sackville.

No less a person than the late Mr. No less a person than the late Mr. Gladstone, in an after-dinner speech at Newcastle-on-Tyne, made an unfortunate reference "of which," as Lord Morley says in his biography of the great Liberal leader, "he was destined never to hear the last." Speaking on the great struggle between the Northern and Southern States of America, the Chancellor of the Exchequer—as he then was — remarked quer—as he then was — remarked that Mr. Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States, had "made a nation." The sensation caused was immediate and profound. The United immediate and profound. The United States Ambassador hinted at asking for his passports; and the English Foreign Secretary had to explain away his impulsive colleague's mistake. Mr. Gladstone in 1896, said: "My offence was indeed not only a misiake, but one of incredible gross-ness."

The sensation caused then, however, was nothing to that which followed Mr. Gladstone's declaration on a memorable occasion, that "it was impossible to place one's finger on any spot on the map and say 'There Austria did good'." This utterance of a British Prime Minister naturally

made Europe sit up and take notice; and eventually the Premier made a graceful apology to the offended Power.

When Sir Henry Lytton-Bulwer was Ambassador at Madrid he received a confidential despatch from his Home Government, which contained the words: "I have to instruct you earnestly to recommend to the Span-ish Government, if you have an op-portunity of doing so, the adoption of a legal and constitutional form of Government in Spain."

Government in Spain."

By some error of judgment, the ambassador so far exceeded his instructions as to communicate the terms of his despatch to some of the Opposition newspapers. The haughty Spaniards were simply furious, and practically expelled Sir Henry from Spain. Diplomatic relations between the two countries were broken on; and it was not until two years had elapsed that—owing to the mediation elapsed that—owing to the mediation of the King of the Belgians—another British Ambassador appeared in

The late Lord Salisbury was anoth-The late Lord Salisbury was another British statesman who grieviously offended the Dons by an incautious allusion, made at the end of the Spanish-American War, to "the dying nations." The Spaniards had their revenge during the dark days of the struggle in South Africa, when, after a saddening British reverse, an ironical telegram from Madrid to the British Premier read: "The dying nations salute you."

Death of Two Men Never Born. English lawyers recently celebrated the death by legal process of two men who never lived. They first appear on who never lived. They first appear on the stage of history in the reign of Edward III., called into existence by a clause in Magna Charta. They were the two witnesses demanded by law as testators to the truth of the evidence adduced. They throve so well upon the atmosphere of the couris that they were never to be seen or heard outside their precincts. They were the factitious litigants in innumerable writs of ejectment, for they functioned as the ghosts of possessor and ejector, and it was not till Oct. 24, 1852, that Parliament was able to "lay" those two ghostly litigants, John Doe, plaintiff, and Richard Roe, defendant.

The most ancient piece of English music in existence, "Summer is icumen in," is quite modern in comparison with a score of the "Orestes" of Euripides, dating from the fourth century B.C., which was exhibited at the international exhibition of music at Vienna some years ago. 

Such training in manual dexterty as may be given is incidental only to an understanding of the technical principles involved in the practice of a trade. The classes are carried on in the evening. Those in attendance are already at work in the day time. They go to the schools to learn those things which will help them to become more intelligent and more skilful workers.

"That these schools fill a very useful purpose is shown by the large number in attendance. The old-time master who gave personal attention to the instruction of his apprentices has no place in modern

tem is dead. The old-time master who gave personal attention to the instruction of his apprentices has no place in modern industry. The boy has to learn himself, and new means of enabling him to learn are provided to-day in Nova Scotia and all other advanced communities. The young man has better opportunities than he had a generation or less ago.

"Twenty-five years ago when a boy entered a workshop he literally had to steal his trade. He had to do all the drudgery of the shop, and the broom was more often in his hands than the tools of the trade he was supposed to be learning. For the first two years about the only opportunities he got to use tools were stolen ones. I learned a trade about that time and I know what I am talking about. Now the hoy can go to the nightschool where competent instructors teach him the things he wants to know about the why and wherefore of the operations he sees going on around him in the shop in which he works during the day.



Lord Cowdray, who probably is better recalled to most persons under his former name of Sir Weetman Pearson, has interests in Mexico so vast that it might be well worth his while to further the affairs of any Government in that country which seemed to have a good chance of survival. When Diax was president and Lord Cowdray was Sir Weetman Pearson they worked together mightly to improve Mexico. Both made much money out of it, but it is not to be denied that this extraordinary contractor and engineer helped to change the face of nature in Mexico and did some marvels of building

take in oil wells of unusual capacity, so that he is a rich man indeed from the work he has done in Mexico alone. And his Mexican achievements are not the complete tale of his activities.

It was some years ago that his firm, S. Pearson and Son, Limited, took and completed a \$5,000,000 contract for extensive harbor works in Vera Cruz. Later came the gigantic task of draining the Valley of Mexico with a canal which cost \$15,000,000. These tasks were done and well done, so that later when President Diaz contemplated the reconstruction and completion of the Tehuantepec Railroad it was not unnatural that the Pearson firm should get the job.

It was in 1902 that this work was started. A limit of fifty-one years was set for the task, involving the construction of the railroad and of proper terminal ports at the Atlantic and Pacific ends, so as to compete with the Panama Canal for transcontinental traffic and the trade to the Far East.

IN CHANCERY.

the Romance of a Much Misunderstood Institution.

For twenty-five years a lady called periodically at the offices of the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt, and presented a little claim for \$6,500,000, which, she said, was in Chancery. And many other people cherish a similar delusion with regard to the great legal institution which, unknown to them, touches their lives at many points. They suppose it to be merely a deposit for derelict gold.

There are millions — hundreds of millions—in Chancery; but the proportion of this vast sum that is unclaimed is comparatively small owneries accounts, the records relating to which do not go back farther than 1720, aggregate more than five million dollars, and are, for the most part, relatively small in value. While not one—and in all there are about \$1,000—is worth less than \$250, one-half do not exceed \$750 in value, and only about one-twentieth exceed \$5,000.

Substantial sums, however, are frequently recovered from Chancery in

St,000.
Substantial sums, however, are frequently recovered from Chancery, in some cases after the lapse of a very long period. In 1893 a claim was successfully made to a fund which had been in court since 1753. There was another curious case in 1909 when Chancery yielded up a fund it had held for 125 years. The amount \$2.8.50.00 represented the estate of -\$3,500-represented the estate of a lady who was married in 1784, and a lady who was married in 1784, and who disappeared on her wedding day. Equally singular, but for another reason, were the circumstances connected with a claim made a few years ago. After the estate of a certain lady had been in Chancery for a comparatively short time, a number of claimants came forward, and it was distributed among them.

Four years later, a solicitor advertised for the lady, in the belief that she was still alive, and his advertisement coming to the notice of some

ment coming to the notice of some of the deceased relatives who had not or the deceased relatives who had not participated in the distribution, they made inquiries, and, as a result, nat-urally wanted their share of the Several of the beneficiaries had spent the money they had received, and one of these was actually insolvent; so there was nothing to be got from them. But three other pers

two of them maiden ladies, had their two of them maiden ladies, had their windfalls still intact, and were obliged to deliver them up to the last cent, because they were nr's on near of kin to the deceased as the new claimants. Most of such claims are prosecuted by a peculiar class of workers on Tom Tiddler's ground. Known as "Chancery excavators," they apend much time in digging among the records of the court, and strange indeed are many of their "finds."

One of them some years back hit on a clue to the ownership of \$3,500 which had been lying in court for half a century, and, after numerous searches, worked out the whole history of the fund, which was ultimately paid to the executor of the man in whose name it stood.

In England it was the old practice to impeach for conduct out of office Private citizens could be impeached Dr. Sacheverell was impeached for Dr. Sacheverell was impeaced for preaching an unpopular sermon, the Duke of Richmond for proposing an adjournment of the House of Lords and Inigo Jones for tearing down a church. But in America impeachment has been restricted to men in office for conduct in office.

Greater Longevity of Women. The British Government's old age pension scheme is producing some remarkable figures, for the statistics of 1912 show that 603,380 women were in receipt of old age pensions, as compared with only :62,628 men.
