CELEBRATE 12TH AT NEWCASTLE

Northumberland and Westmorland Lodges Celebrate The Day.

With fine weather prevalent and things in general under systematic conduction, July 12th was fittingly observed by local and visiting Orangemen at Newcastle on Wednesday. The observance was a banner one probably the largest one held by the L. O. L. in Newcastle. The numerous visitors in town lent a holiday appearance.

Westmoreland and Northumberland lodges formed largely the delegates in attendance at the celebration. The parade in the afternoon in which three bands and several hundred members participated was the leading feature. County Master Adam Dickison was the marshal and others prominent in the order were also mounted. The parade assembled in the field on the corner of Jane and Mary streets and marched through all the principal streets.

The Loyal Protestant Band of Moncton headed the procession, while the Sackville Citizens Band and the Newcastle Orange Band were also in attendance.

After the parade addresses were delivered by J. W. Clarke, Junior Deputy Grand Master; H. J. Yadman, Grand Treasurer; Past County Master Dale, Blackville; Hon. D. Morrison, Past Grand Master Philip E. Heine, Rev. W. J. Deane and Grand Master, Rev. B. H. Thomas, Dorchester. J. W. S. Babbirk of Loggieville presided at the meeting.

Rev. B. H. Thomas moved, seconded by Past Grand Master, P. E. Heine, resolutions condemning the Ne Temere Decree, bi-lingualism and other subjects. The resolutions were along the lines previously adopted.

Mayor of Ottawa Won't Welcome Sir Wilfrid Laurier

Ottawa, July 12.—Mayor Hopewell, of Ottawa, declined to present tonight a civic address of welcome to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the incident is likely to lead to a clash in the city council. The mayor was asked by President McGrath, of the Ottawa Reform Association, to cooperate with the association and citizens generally in welcoming the Premier home from the imperial conference. He refused, however on the ground that in taking any such official action he would also have to officially welcome home Mr. R. L. Borden, the opposition leader. In reply to this it was pointed out by the Reform Association the two cases were dissimilar, Mr. Borden returning from a political tour and Sir Wilfrid from empire business, where he represented the whole of Canada.

Geo. W. Sherwood Died of Poisoning

Sussex, July 12.—The condition of Mr. George W. Sherwood, station master here who has been suffering from ptomaine poisoning, is regarded most critical and little hope is entertained for his recovery. In fact his death is looked for at any moment. The circumstances are very sad. On Saturday Mr. and Mrs. Sherwood and two daughters were attacked by poisoning and while Mrs. Sherwood and the girls are showing improvement, the fate of the father is regarded as sealed. All four partook of pudding made from gelatine brought from Boston by Miss Lena Sherwood. Physicians have been in constant attendance ever since the first symptoms but have been able to do but little.

A later despatch says Mr. Sherwood died at 1.30 o'clock, aged 65 years. He was one of the best known men on the Intercolonial and was station master for seventeen years.

Business Section of Jerome, Que., Laid in Waste by Fire

The most Disastrous Fire in the History of the Town Costs Loss of \$150,000.

St. Jerome, Que., July 12—The most disastrous fire in the history of this town occurred this afternoon, breaking out at 3 o'clock between two sheds, the property of Mr. Beaulieu. A strong breeze and the long spell of hot weather which has

rendered the wooden buildings, which form the greater part of the town, dry as tinder, rendered the blaze almost uncontrollable and before it was subdued it had ravaged the entire business section of the town, laying waste an area of over three acres. The damage is estimated at over \$150,000. Twenty-seven families have been rendered homeless. The firemen had great trouble in fighting the flames, owing to the failure of the emergency connection with the river intake to work after the hose had been laid. This necessitated the relaying of the hose directly to the river and during this delay the fire gained more headway. Shortly after five the flames were practically under control, but the firemen were busy long into the night stamping out smouldering embers in the damaged area and subduing incipient fires in outlying districts caused by sparks which were carried everywhere by the strong breeze. The cause of the outbreak has not yet been ascertained.
