



GERMANY MADE HELPLESS BY ANGLO-FRENCH AGREEMENT.

Secret Understanding Followby Which England France Unite to Maintain Peace—Other Nations are

PARIS, Dec. 24. — The Associated Press has obtained some interesting information regarding the progress of Anglo-French relations which led to the recent erroneous reports that the entente of 1901 has been supplemented by a military or naval convention. Mutual co-operation on sea and land in the face of an agressive move against either is regarded as assured both at the quai in the Orsay and in Downing street. The machinery of diplomacy has, however, been scrupulously avoided in the accomplishment of this result. No notes or drafts of conventions have been exchanged. Nothing has passed through the only channels recognized by Governments as qualified to bind countries which channels recognized by Governments as qualified to bind countries which would be challenged by Germany, so aimed at her isolation. Nevertheless in a subtler and quite effective fashion the combination against Germany so far as France and England are concerned en be considered a "fait accompli." The other ratifications of the diplomacy which is called in England the policy of 'binding Germany over to keep the peace," (which includes the Rusian-English entente, the cementing of closer relations between Spain and England, the weaning away of Italy of the Triplice), are also making progress.

It was regarded as preferable to lay the basis of mutual support primarily in abroad and deep friendship between the two peoples. The "Entente Cordiale" adjusting outstanding differences had no sooner been signed than the campaign of friendship was inaugurated.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN MORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. Any even numbered section of Dom-





THE FAILURE

OF STOLYPIN

Illegal Laws, Good and Bad, Made to Influence the Elections.

Little Gare for Future of the Country as Long as Present Elections

are Won.

LONDON, Det. 21—A despatch to the Daily Mail from St. Petersburg says:

M. Stolypin began his career at Premier with excellent intentions. He issued a manifesto which there is every reason to believe presented a genuine account of the reforms he desired to initiate. They were of the most sweeping character; the statement created considerable satisfaction, and no great complaint was made of his very reacomplaint was made of his very reasonable contention that order must be sonable contention that order must be restored in the country if progress was to be made. How has he succeeded? He has drenched the country in blood, and his promised reforms have degenerated to measures intended to subserve the electoral campaign of the friends of the Government. Moreover, they are entirely illegal. According to law, the Government may take such steps as are necessary for the well being of the country when the Duma is not sitting. It was legal for M. Stolypin to place the greater part of the country under martial law, because the measure was of a temporary character intended to meet temporary difficulties. But to issue a law, as he did, even while making very excellent regulations as to the hours of employment of shop assistants and others, is entirely illegal. It cannot be described as a temporary measure necessitated as a temporary measure necessitated by the special exigencies of the day; it is a notable reform which, according to law, the Duma alone can make. As a matter of fact, it is a mere election-


