The International Congress at DIVER'S TERRIBLE Washington Was Formally Opened Today, and Was Adjourned Till Saturday— Many Nations Represented

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—A remarkable education campaign formally was inaugurated here today. It was humanity against a most deadly foe, the white plague. A more distinguished gathering perhaps has never before eremony. Preliminary to the formal pening the diplomatic corps, the opening the diplomatic corps, the spokesmen of the various countries, the officers of the congress, the honorary presidents and the section presidents, met in the office of Dr. Henry G. Beyer, chairman of the committee of exhibits, in the Museum Building, shortly before 11 o'clock and accompanied by Drs. Beyer and John S. Fulton, the secretary general, proceeded to the stage in the great auditorium. There Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou, the presiding officer, and the personal representative of the President of the United States axtended the official welcome on behalf of the United States Government. A welcome to the United States Capital was then extended by District Commissioner McFarlane, followed by brief remarks by the representatives of about thirty foreign countries. The assembly hall was a prism of color, the flags of every nation being displayed. The national anthems of this and other countries were played by the marine band.

The greater part of the day's session was devoted to desponses by foreign delegates. At the conclusion of this feature of the programme Secretary cortelyou adjourned the meeting, the delegates dispersed and will not assembel in general session again until Saturday morning, Oct. 3rd.

GLOBE VINDICATED

Willison, Former Editor of Toronto Globe, Refutes Crow's Nest Charge

TORONTO, Sept. 27.—At a Conservative meeting last week Premier Roblin charged the Toronto Globe with forcing the Crows Nest Pass deal on the government and the people at the instigation and in the interests of its owners. The following day J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Globe, offered to resign if this were true, stating that he would accept the word of J. G. Willison, now editor of the News, who was editor of the Globe at the time of the Crows Nest business.

In the News Saturday evening Mr. Willison emphatically acquits the Globe of the charge of chloroforming public opinion in order to make millions for its owners. He says:

"The Crows Nest Railway policy of the Globe originated with the present editor of the News. When he was in British Columbia in 1895 he looked into the situation and saw the necessity for better railway connection with the mining country. He wrote a letter from the west in advocacy of this policy. On his return to Toronto, while the Conservatives were in power act of the Conservatives were in power at Ottawa he wrote various articles in favor of this particular railway project. No director of the Globe was consulted. No director or stockholder of the Globe so far as the editor knew had any interest in the Crows Nest country. Later he understands Senators Jeffray and Cox acquired interest in the Crows Nest coal fields and became purchasers of the British Columbia Southern Railway.

The then editor of the Globe did not

The then editor of the Globe did not know that the railway had been acquired by Senator Cox and his associates until certain charges were made by the World newspaper. He knows nothing of the negotiations with the Canadian Pacific Railway or with the government. He had no hand in any of these dealings, as he did not favor the grant of \$3,500,000 to the Canadian Pacific Company, and, if he remembers aright, refused to lend the Globe's support to a subsidy of that magnitude. He of course had no interest, direct or indirect, in the Crows Nest Pailway or any associate enterprise. 
