**An Epidemic of Atrocious Murders in Eastern States.**

**Death of Late Prof. S. Risteen, Last Member of a Fredericton Family—Local, Personal and Market Reports.**

**BOSTON, March 11.**—An epidemic of atrocious murders has passed over the eastern states during the past week. At least two of the victims in these states being policemen. Since the appearance of grip this season the number of suicides has been much larger than usual. In many cases it is claimed, the desire to destroy one's self is the direct outcome of this disease.

The Canadian Club at a smoke talk Friday night adopted suitable resolutions on the death of its late member, Hon. Frederic S. Risteen, a native of Fredericton. A. A. McLean, a Charlestown lawyer, addressed the club and extended the greetings of Prince Edward Island. An effort is being made by Thomas F. Anderson, historian of the club, and other members to have the maritime provinces set the "old home week" plan, first copy on foot by ex-Gov. Frank Rollins of New Hampshire. In some localities this idea has proved to be a humbug, and it is open to question whether it would prove a success more than once in the provinces. In large communities it is said the idea might prove practical, but for the smaller places the distance between them and this city is against the plan.

Willard A. Lockhart, a young man of Sterling, who was arrested for murdering Miss Mabel E. Brown of that place without the consent of her parents last week, came to this state from New Brunswick. He worked some time as a farm hand for the girl's father, and later worked in the mercantile business. Mrs. Lockhart, who is not yet 16, is still at the home of her parents, whether she was taken by her father as soon as he learned that she had been married to Lockhart. It was claimed that the girl was virtually a prisoner in her father's home for several days after the marriage, but she declares that he will yet have his wife. He was fined \$300 for abduction, but appealed the case.

The maiden pledge do not expect to take any action in the separation of Mrs. Josephine Atwood from her husband, J. C. Atwood of this city. Mrs. Atwood, who left home on three previous occasions, is said to have gone to the home of her father, William Connors of Sussex. Her three-year-old daughter, Hazel, is with her. Atwood was again notified of the police of his wife's disappearance, but they did not appear to help him out of the difficulty on that occasion.

Mulhall, aged 40 years, native of Nova Scotia; in Roxbury, March 3, Mrs. Jane Gagey, widow of Henry Gagey, aged 78, formerly of St. John; in this city, March 3, Charles P. Miller, aged 66, formerly of Halifax.

**PARLIAMENT.**

**Third Session of Ninth General Assembly of Canada.**

**Speech from the Throne of the Usual Order, Yet Touching Some Important Matters.**

**Gathering in the Senate Chamber was a Very Brilliant One—Valedictory of the Ladies Rich and Fetching—Gaiety from the Commons.**

**OTTAWA, March 12.**—The third session of the ninth parliament opened with unusual eclat. Great local interest centred in the event, owing to the importance of the business about to be transacted, and the gentlemanly character of the black rod was unable to touch the demand for tickets for the senate chamber. Hundreds had to be content to witness the less imposing ceremonies outside the buildings.

In the senate the govins won by the ladies were unusually handsome. The galleries were also lined with beautifully appointed society leaders. Lady Minto wore her coronation gown, and the cynosure of the gathering. Many prominent personages were present, including General Parsons, Col. Foster, military attaché at Washington, the consul general resident in Canada, and Monsiegnur Sbaratti, the apostolic delegate.

His excellency the governor general was accompanied from Government House by an escort of the Princess Louise Dragoon Guards, and was received at the parliament buildings by a guard of honor from the Governor General's Foot Guards. The band of the music, Lord Minto and supplied the music. Lord Minto proceeded to the senate chamber and delivered the following speech from the throne:

**AN UNLUCKY ROOSTER.**

In Bavaria some very odd superstitions still survive, as the following incident shows. A rooster belonging to a neighbor flew into a farmyard the other day, and after scurrying in the straw a few minutes he hopped onto the back of a cow that was lying down and he began to crow. At that moment the farmer's wife entered the yard and saw the sight of the bird on the cow's back and exclaimed: "Now I know what has caused everything to go wrong with me for the last month. My children have been sick, my husband has been very cross, the cows have given hardly any milk, one of the horses has died and all the trouble has been caused by this wretched rooster, which is nothing else but a witch in disguise. However, I'll fix it."

With these words she summoned the farm servants and told them to catch the rooster which they finally did after a good deal of work. Then she said that there was only one punishment reserved for a witch which she assumed the form of a bird, and that was that she should be burned alive. The servants agreed with her and the result was that the unfortunate rooster was taken into the kitchen and shoved into a cauldron of boiling water. That evening the owner of the rooster heard of his fate, and at once began suit against the farmer's wife. In this way it became known that many persons in Bavaria still firmly believe in the existence of witches, wizards and evil spirits.

The Mullah, it added, is maintaining his authority with ruthless severity, cutting the throats of male and female Moslems and mutilating women and children.

**KILLED BY TROLLEY WIRE.**

**NEW YORK, March 12.**—An overhead trolley wire in the Bronx broke tonight, falling on a motorcar, who was instantly killed by the current and fell over the dashboard of the car, which passed over his body. The car was enveloped in a sheet of blue flame, which was extinguished by the driver, but the motorcar was so badly damaged that it could not be extricated from beneath the car until the current was shut off at the power house.

**ST. STEPHEN, March 11.**—Engineer Delhi Robinson of the Washington County railroad sustained severe injuries today. He had some chestnuts of potato lozenges in his vest pocket, while driving his engine towards Calais was thrown towards the side of his car so that his pocket struck against the driver's seat. The lozenges exploded and inflicted a severe burn, which penetrated to the bone. He was carried into the hospital, where medical aid was procured.

**OTTAWA, March 11.**—One of the most difficult tasks which the ministers have had to perform occupied their attention today, and the work is not yet completed. 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CABINET MINISTERS

As the Directors of Companies in Canada.

With the last few days the British government narrowly escaped defeat on a motion concerning the practice of cabinet ministers serving at the same time in the capacity of directors of limited companies.

Opposition was based on two grounds. One is that a cabinet minister cannot serve two masters and the other is, the system tends to the deepening of the public.

At the motion was an attack upon the government. It was, of course, resisted by the premier. His defence of the government was, however, significant for the admissions it contained.

Neither of these, Mr. Balfour contended, could be urged against any member of his government. Very strong and emphatic was his judgment in a certain class of cases.

Some celebrated cases. Lord Rosebery may be considered the pioneer of the movement against ministers holding directorships.

Another celebrated case was that of Sir James Ferguson, while under secretary for foreign affairs in Lord Salisbury's government he became a director in a group of companies.

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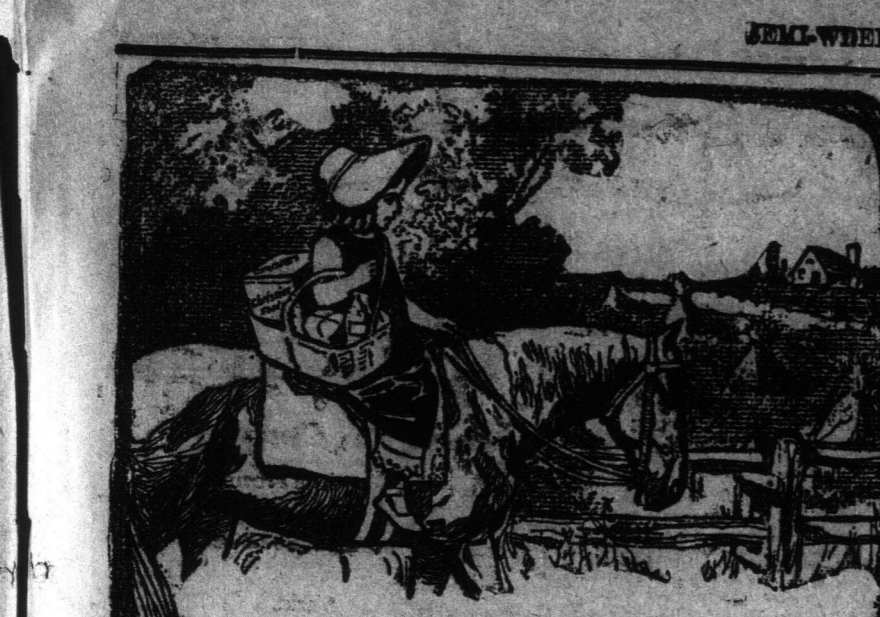
