Watch the ewes and aim to save all lambs that are given birth. Reember that the mothers require great care and judicious feeding just as much as the new arrivals. Give the mare light work and close attention. If you plan to raise healty steers or efficient dairy cows do not cut the calves off their natural milk supply for months. Calves raised on separator milk take second place in the feeding pens. The service animals come, into use in April. Last year the people voted on a proposition to strike the prohibitory clause out of the constitution and in fiercely contested election the prohibitionists won by a few hundred votes. Public men felt that it was necessary to do something, because the prohibitory law was not enforced. The election showed that in the twenty cities in Maine there was a majority of over twelve thousand votes against prohibition, but that majority was swamped by the vote in favor of prohibition in the Telephone 73 - 31 country districts. #### Permanent Earest Reserve Now

Rocky Mountains Reserve Set while by

Parliament, One of Larges Existtence, A Haunt of Game, Ade pade Appropriation Es entral to Administer it. Two years ago the Commission of Conservation began agitating for the establishment of the Rocky Mountains Forest Reserve. This involved the setting aside in perpetuit : of nearly IS,000 square mls. of forest territory on the Eastern slope of the Canadian Rockies. During the spring of 1911, this Reserve was formally established by Act of Parliament. It extends from the international boundary northward for 600 miles, and includes all lands on the Eastern slope above an altitude of 4,000 feet. It thus covers the headwaters of the Praine rivers which rise in the Rocky Mountains. Owing to the great altitude of much of the Reserve much of the timber is scrubby and of little commercial value. It, however makes excellent forest cover, and so is of the greatest value in preserving a relatively uniform flow across the prairies. If it were not for this regulating factor, the great wheat lands of Alberta and Sackat cnewan would be subject to alternate floods and drouth. A Game Preserve

Further, the Rocky Mountains Forest Reserve is one of the largest national parks in the world. It is annually growing in favor as a resort for tourists and hunters. It abounds in a great variety of game, which is being wisely protected Thousands of people visit the Reserve every year to enjoy the Mountain scenery the fishing and the hunting. It is not improbable that in a few years the Reserve will be provided with numerous STANDARD'S VICE PRESIDENT chalets such as are found in the Swiss Alps, for the convenience and safety of tourists.

Adequate Appropriation Needed It is obviously of great importance that the Reserve should be carefully protected from fire, and be otherwise administered so as to m intain the forest growth. With this end in view the Forestry Branch of the Department of the interior is organizing an effective administrative force. and is planning to cut trails and con struct telephone lines through the Reserve. The Forestry Branch, however, has been hampered by lack of funds. Mr R. H.
