New York, Dec. 19.—Twelve per-sons were killed, two of them women, and thirty persons were injured in a double explosion of gas and dynamite in the new electric power house of the New York Central Railroad and Grand Central Station shortly after 8 o'clock this morning. The force of the explosion shattered hundreds of windows in the big ho-tels and apartment houses in the neighborhood of the great railroad terminal, causing great alarm among the guests. The dynamite blast pict-ed up a northbound trolley car, lifted it in the air and sent it crashing down upon an automobile which was pass-ing along the other side of the street.
