



Dr. Farris announced that he had written to Miss Hall, of Massachusetts an authority on the work, asking her sto visit St. John and help the association to increase its efficiency.

It was reported that moving from Carmarthen street had cost the society \$100 and a vote of thanks was passed to Miss Helen Smith for the business-like way in which arrangements had been made.

The nurses' report showed, clinics held 10 for adults and 5 for children; patients attending clinics: Adults 48; children 22; prescriptions filled 26; patients under observation 183; transferred to County Hospital 2; died 1; discharged 73; referred to board of health 2; received milk 3; visits made by nurses 186.

Dr. Ferris reported: Patients examined 22; advised to River Glade 1; sent to General Public Hospital 2.

Dr. Logie stated that he had examined 42 patients during May including 15 new and 27 old patients. He had 35 under observation; four were not tubercular he had advised one to go to the County Hospital, and two to River Glade.

Bureau of information

With a view to keeping Canada busy, Mrs. J. C. Sears, of Ottawa, presented to the delegates of the National Council of Women a scheme for the formation of a woman's uarticonal bureau of information. In order to carry out her plan, Mrs. Sears, suggests that the women encourage buying of Canadian made goods, and ask that the Canadian manufacturers bring the same up to standard of excellence. All goods to be trade-marked. Goods to be placed on market, at a price not greater than that charged for United States products.

The plan proposes that this method can be put into effect through a federal board at Ottawa with a provincial board in each province. These boards could communicate with every woman's organization and society ask ing co-operation of the members in buying and boosting "Canadian-made Ecods." In turn, the societies would be asked to inform these boards of any manufacturer who is not keeping up to standard or whose products are too high priced.


