NEWCASTLE, N. B

A Bye-Law relating to riding Bicycles on the Sidewalks.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Newcastle: 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride a Bicycle on any of the sidewalks within that part of the limits of the town of Newcastle contained between James Falconer's upper line and a prolonga-tion thereof to the Miramichi River and the lower line of land in the occupation of J. R. Lawlor and a prolong-ation thereof to the said River, the Intercolonial Railway Track on the north and the said Miramichi River on the

2. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride a Bicycle within the limits of the Town of Newcastle unless provided with a bell to be rung when-ever meeting or overtaking any person or teams; and it shall be unlawful to ride at night without a lighted lamp

on the front of the Bicycle. 3. That any person or persons riding a Bicycle in contravention of this Bye-Law shall be liable to a penalty of two dollars for the first offence and four dollars for any subsequent offence.

A Bye-Law for the preservation of the Public Squares. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of

Newcastle:

1. That whosoever shall wilfully deface, damage, cut, break, peel or pull down or otherwise injure any of the trees, shrubs or flowers or any other ornaments in or around any of the public squares or sidewalks or shall wilfully deface, cut mark, break or in any way damage or cause to be de damaged any of the fences, gates, benches, walks, fountains, tanks or ponds of water in or about the said squares, streets or sidewalks shall be liable for each offence to a fine of four dollars besides the expense of repairing such damage or loss.

2. That whoever shall commit any trespass upon any part of the said squares or travel on any part there-

any part of the said squares or travel on any part there-of other than the walks laid out thereon shall be subject

to a penalty of one dollar.

3. That no person shall ride, lead or drive any hor coner than spimal along or upon any path or walk in eny such animal upon any public square or make fast any such any path, walk or sidewalk nor to any any public square under a penalty of two fence or tree of

A Bye-Law to regulate Peddling and sale of Bankrupt Stock.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Newcastle:

1. That no person shall be allowed to peddle or offer for ale on any of the streets, lanes or squares or va-cant lots or from house to house or other places within the Town of Newcastle any goods, wares or merchandise of any description, except the products of the farm, dairy or rivers or sea, unless he or she shall first obtain a license from the Town Clerk and Treasurer which license shall be paid for at the following rates :-One day, \$1.00; one week, \$4.00; one month, \$8.00; six months, \$15; one year, \$25.00.

2. That no person, unless he or she be a rate-payer and whose name is on the assessment list, and who shall have paid his or her taxes the previous year in the Town of Newcastle, shall be allowed to canvass at retail from house to house or on any of the streets, squares or vacant lots for orders for clothing, pianofortes, organs sewing machines, carriages, bicycles, or other vehicles, jurniture, house furnishings, or other articles with or without samples or photographs, or take orders for the enlargements of portraits or other pictures unless he shall first obtain from the Town Clerk and Treasurer a license so to do, which license shall be paid for at the following rates:—One day, \$2.00; one week, \$8.00; one month, \$15.00; one year, \$50.00.

3. That no person or persons shall offer for sale or dispose of at retail within the Town of Newcastle, by auction or otherwise, any Bankrupt Stock or other stock of goods or merchandise brought into the town for sale by a non-resident of the town or person or persons who have not become permanent residents of the town without having first obtained a license duly issued to him by the Town Clerk and Treasurer, which license shall be paid for at or before the time it is granted at the following rates for the periods named :- One week, \$15.00; two weeks, \$25.00; one month, \$50.00; three months, \$60.00; six months, \$80.00, one year, \$100.00. Provided. however, that any person who has taxes imposed on him or them by the Town of Newcastle for the previous

year and who has paid the same, shall be considered a permanent resident for the purposes of this Bye-law.

4. That no person shall peddle or offer for sale on the streets of the Town of Newcastle or from house to house within the said Town any beef, veal, pork, mutton, or lamb, unless he or she shall first obtain from the Town Clerk and Treasurer a license so to sell, said license to be paid for at the following rates:—One mocth, \$2.00; six monts, \$8.00; one year, \$10.00. Provided, always, that this Bye-law shall not apply to residents of the County of Northumberland selling beef, veal, pork, mutton or

lamb wholesale, by the quarters, or in larger quantities.

5. That any person violating any part of Sections
1 and 2 of this Bye-law shall be subject to a fine of five dollars for the first offence and a fine of ten dollars for each subsequent offence.

6. That any person violating any part of Section 3 of this Bye-law shall be subject to a penalty of fifteen dollars for the first offence and a fine of twenty five dollars for each subsequent offence.

7. That any person violating any part of Section 4 of this bye-law shall be subject to a penalty of one dollar for a first offence and a fine of two dollars for each subsequent offence and not more than one penalty is to to be imposed for any number of offences committed during any one day.

A Bye-Law relating to the going at large of Cattle and Fowl. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of

1. That no horse, mare, gelding, colt, bull, ox, cow, or any neat cattle, sheep, ram. ridgling, or goat, hog or swine, goose or gander shall be allowed or suffered to

go at large or to graze on any of the roads, streets, highways, alleys, public squares or vacant or unfeuced lots at any season of the year in that part of the town of Newcastle lying between James Falconer's upper line and the line at the lower side of lands occupied by J. Rogers Lawlor, the southerly side of the Intercolonial Railway Track and the northern shore of the Miramichi River.

2. That it shall be the duty of all Pound-keepers, Contables Marshalls and Policemen as well as Hogerstein.

Constables, Marshalls and Policemen, as well as Hogreeves, to take up and impound any of the above-mentioned animals or fowl going at large or otherwise offendagainst this bye-law.
3. That the following fees or sums shall be de-

manded and paid under the foregoing sections :-To a Hog-reeve or other person taking up and delivering to the Pound-keeper.

To a pound-keeper for impounding each animal or fowl the same fees as above and for feeding each horse and other animal or fowl, in addition to the cost of food,

4. That it shall be the duty of the Pound-keeper to feed and water any and all animals so impounded under a penalty of Four Dollars for each neglect to do so.

5. That the owner of every animal found going at large contrary to the provisions of this bye-law shall pay as is hereinafter mentioned and when prosecuted for the

same the costs of prosecution.

6. That the Poundkeeper shall, within twenty-four hours after the impounding of any animal or fowl, post up in three or more conspicuous places in the said Town, notices proclaiming the fact, and should the animals not be liberated within three days after such notice the Pound-keeper shall sell the same at Public auction or so many of them as may be necessary to defray the fees, damages, costs and charges after giving three days notice of the time and place of such sale; and the overplus (if any) shall be paid to the owner or owners thereof, and if the owners do not appear within thirty days to claim the same then it shall be paid over to the Town Clerk and Treasurer. A Bye-Law prescribing the manner of recovering and appropriating Penalties.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of

Newcastle;—

1. That the mode of proceeding for the recovery of all fines and pena'ties imposed by any Bye-law of this Town now or hereafter ordained, where no provisions are already prescribed for the recovery thereof, shall be regulated by any law now or hereafter in force relating to summary convictions before Justices of the Peace.

2. That all fines and penalties when not specially

2. That all fines and penalties when not specially applied by any law or bye-law imposing the same shall be paid to the Town Clerk and Treasurer for the use of

A Bye-law relating to dogs & dog Taxes
Be it ordained by the Town Council of Newcistle 1. That there shall be imposed on the owner, keep-

er, or harborer of each dog in the Town of Newcastle an

2. That the owner, keeper, or harborer of any dog or dogs in the Town of Newcastle shall, between the first day of February and May in each year, register his or her name in full with the name of the street on which they reside, or cause the same to be so registered, in a book to be kept for that purpose at the office of the Town Clerk and Treasurer in the Town, and shall piace or cause to be placed the number of dogs he or she owns, keeps or harbors. Any person who shall be guilty of a breach of any of the provisions of this section shall for every offence, be liable to a penalty of two dollars, and on default of the payment of any such fine the said dog shall be killed by order of the Police Magistrate.

3. That the collector of dog tax for the said town shall use every dilligence to collect the above tax from the owner or harborer of each and every dog or bitch owned or harbored in the said town, and the said collector shall, on being informed of any breach of the foregoing section, prosecute every person who has committed such breach, and the omission of such collector to so prosecute within ten days of such knowledge or information shall subject him to a fine of two dollars which amount shall be deducted from said collector's commissions.

4. That the owner, harborer or keeper of any bitch who shall allow or permit such bitch when in season to go at large in the Town of Newcastle, shall be subject to a penalty of five dollars, and on default of payment hereof the said bitch shall be killed by direction of the Police

5. That all fines and penalties recorded under any of the foregoing sections shall be paid over to the Town Clerk and Treasurer by the Police Magistrate; and the said Police Magistrate shall keep a record of all such fines and penalties and eater them in a book of records. 6. That it shall be the duty of the collector, on or

before the first day of March in each year, to proceed to the collection of the aforesaid tax, and in case the same be not paid to the said collector within fifteen days after demand, then such collector shall and may and he is hereby required to sue for and revover the same, and when collected, the same shall be forthwith paid into the hands of the Town Clerk and Treasurer, the collector retaining in his hands twenty per cent for his services on all sums actually collected and paid over by him; and such collector shall render an account quarterly of all sums collected by him such account to be rendered to the Town Council at their meeting in each January, April, July and September.

7. That the owners and keepers of all dogs and bitches found going at large in the Town of Newcastle without a collar on its neck having a plate of brass or other metal attached thereto, shall be subject to fine of two dollars; which plate shall be procured from the dog tax collector by each party on payment of his or her tax or taxes on his or her dog or dogs, said plate will contain a number stamped thereon, the number of which plate shall be recorded in a book in the Town Clerk and Treas-

urer's office opposite the name of the owner of the dog.
8. That the owner, keeper or harborer of any fercious dog or dogs accustomen to bite, shall allow or suffer any such dog to run at large within the town without being muzzled in such manner as to keep such dog from injuring any person or animal, every such person shall be liable to a penalty of four dollars for each and every day such dog shall run at large without a muzzle.

9. That any person who shall be convicted of keeping any dog which may have injured any person by biting shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding ten dol-lars, and the Police Magistrate may order any constable

10. That any person who owns, keeps or harbors a dog which is in the habit of running after, barking at or molesting any foot passenger, horse cow, or any vehicle on the public highway, road or street or public square shall, on complaint of any person before the Police Magistrate, forfeit a sum of one dollar for each and every

11. That should any case of hydrophobia or canine madness occur in town, any Alderman or town officer under whose notice such case may come, or who may receive information of same, shall post a notice or notices in at least three places in the town prohibiting all dogs

from running at large within the said town for the length of time in such notices specified, and any unmuzzled dog found at large while such notice is in force shall be put to death by any person, and the owner, keeper or harber of such dog shall be liable to a penalty of ten

12. That the above bye-law apply only to the part of the Town lying between Lawlor's lane and prolongation thereof to the River on the East and weeneys lane and a prolongation thereof to the River on the West lane and a prolongation thereof to the Riche North.

Two or three horses are neces sary to the outfit. This yacht of the veldt also requires a crew, One good handy man who knows how to drive, take care of horses, cook and put up a tent usually comprises the crew.
