It passing in its route through the County will necessitate, however, a new election of Victoria and the rear of the County of Peterboro; thus opening up and preparing an outlet to the Capital of Ontario for vast resources in timber and minerals of a large extent of new and undeveloped back country. The Kings ton and Pembroke railway will no doubt be vigorously pushed along the line already marked out; while further ex tensions or improvements on existing lines will furnish a quota to the sun total of railway construction in Ontario and these together may be expected to furnish occupation to many hundred
