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

Historical Tripos—In 1886 Miss Rolleson (daughter of the late Oxford Professor of Zoology) was bracketed senior, and in 1887 Zoology) was bracketed senior, and in 1887
Miss Blanche Paull was similarly placed.
Mediaval and Modern Languages Tripos
—Here there have been four lady seniors.
