BATTLE AT WEYMOUTH.

Serious Collision Between Civilians and Soldiers.

LONDON, Jan. 27.—Sunday evening a number of artillerymen at Weymouth be-came involved in a fight with civilians. The

numer of artherymen at veynment accame involved in a fight with civilians. The disturbance attracted a crowd of citizens, and also brought reinforcements to the soldiers. Finally the fight became general, and the soldiers, to the number of 70 or 80, drew their sword bayonets and charged through the crowd and down the street, slashing or prodding anybody in their way. The civilians, panic-stricken, fled in all directions, leaving a number of wounded upon the ground.

When the news of the distubance reached the officers in charge of the artillery barracks they ordered the buglers to call the men to quarters. Though the riotous artillerymen heard the commands they refused to obey, and for hours spread terror through Weymouth. Eventually the soldiers sobered down and straggled back to their quarters, where they were arrested. All the rioters are to be court-martialed, and may also have to answer to the civil authorities.

DYNAMITE SCARE

The British Authorities Increasing Their Vigilance—Detectives Swarming in the Principal Ports.

London, Jan. 26.—There is another dynamite scare among the authorities, who have received information from their agents in America that the dynamite section is actively preparing to resume operations. The headquarters are said to be in Philadelphia and Kansas City. The authorities are increasing their vigilance and detectives swarm at Queenstown, Liverpool, Southampton and other ports. The police guards have been increased around the public buildings, and the authorities are considering the advisability of issuing orders for a closer inspection of the baggage of passengers arriving from the United States, which was stopped a few months ago.

Berlin, Jan. 27.—Prof. Schnibler yester-day exhibited at Vienna a patient suffering from tuberculosis of the larynx who had been treated with Koch's lymph. The patient's condition improved under the treatment, but tubercular swellings de-

reloped on his nose which reached an un-precedented size. precedented size.

Rursed in Snow.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 26.—Terrific snow storms have prevailed throughout the southeastern portion of Russia, and whole villages and numbers of isolated houses have been almost buried in snow. The railroad tracks are entirely useless from the piles of snow resting upon them, and the only means of communication between the villages and town is by sleighs. Numbers of people are already known to have been frozen to death, and it is feared that as the snow disappears there will be further loss of frozen to death, and it is feared that as the snow disappears there will be further loss of life revealed. The city of Charkow (or Kharkow), the capital of the Government of Kharkow, on the Kharkox, is so completely isolated by snow that the only way of communicating with its inhabitants is by telegraph. Charkow is a city of about 200,000 inhabitants, and should its isolation continue for any length of time there will be terrible suffering, owing to the scarcity of provisions among its poorer classes.

The Lymph.

Berlin, Jan. 26.—An English bacteriologist, who is notable as the discoverer of tox albumens, and who is now studying the Kooh method at the hygienic institute, an pounces that he has discovered a remedy for anthrax. Prof. Bollinger, of Munich, reports the result of his experiments with the lymph on tuberculosis cows. He states that in cases where large injections were used a reaction similar to that noticed in human beings was seen. Two sound bulls treated with the fluid showed no reaction, and on being killed their tissues were found to be in a normal condition. Prof. Bollinger concludes that the highest value of the lymph is to be found in the diagnosis of cattle suspected of having tuberculous diseases.

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 26.—Judges MacMahon and Ferguson gave judgment on the
reserved point in the Hamilton election
trial this morning at Osgoode Hall. The

sufficient evidence of the prevalence of corruption to vitiate the election. From
the evidence regarding Goering and
other agents of the Tory candidate,
the judges reached the conclusion that corruption was generally prevalent. Stinson
was therefore unseated.

Whether or not an appeal to the electors will be made before another session is held is, we believe, a matter which the Governmenhas not considered, but in respect of which a decision must necessarily be shortly made known. There are ample precedents beth in England and Canada for a dissolution of the Commons before the natural expiration of the Parliamentary term. The popular idea has been that the present Parliament would run until after the taking of the census in April in order that a redistribution of seats might be made before another election occurs; but we may explain that, contrary to a wide-spread belief, there is no need of a second election after the census, should one be determined upon now. It is not difficult to imagine circumstances which would make delay in giving increased representation to the Provinces entitled to it a grave injustice, but unless such a one should arise there is nothing to prevent a Parliament elected a few months hence running out its term before the redistribution of soats occurs. Meanwhile, we repeat that no decision as to immediate dissolution has been arrived at.

THE BALL SET ROLLING. Prohibitory Petition to Come Before Parliament.

nteresting Meeting in Victoria Hall-Rejoicing Over the Recent Victory -Appeals Made for Signatures.

At 4:15 p.m. Sunday, the time announced for the commencement of the mass meeting in the cause of national prohibition, every available scat in the auditorium and gallery of Victoria Hail was occupied, benches and chairs being freely brought into requisition to accommodate the large growd.

into requisition to accommodate the large crowd.

The proceedings were of an interesting nature, combining a general thanksgiving over the recent success of the license reduction bylaw and a presentation of the object in view—that of aiding the prohibitory petition to be laid before the Dominion Parliament. St. Andrew's choir was present in full force, and, assisted by others, rendered the musical portion an agreeable one, the audience joining in heartly. Mr. Charles Wheeler presided at the piano. Among those on the platform were Rev. Messrs. Boyd, Speller, Clark, Carr and Siple, Mr. John Cameron and others.

Rev. Geo. Boyd presided, and after prayer and a Scriptural reading by Rev. G. Trotter Carr, delivered a brief address. "We are here," said he in opening, "not so much for the purpose of glorying in our victory as to give thanks to God in answering our prayers and aiding our efforts. He has brought this city so far into line with his teachings and his care upon this subject. I take it that what we want more than ever is to keep God before us in this great matter; to recognize that all the strong and opposing influences can go and shall go be-

ever is to keep God before us in this great matter; to recognize that all the strong and opposing influences can go and shall go before the mighty power of the God of Jacob. We are glad to be here to-day because the recent election has brought out the union of all the churches in the city on this question as never before; for I am led to believe an good substitution that there is not question as never before; for I am led to believe on good authority that there is not a church in London that had not some part in the success over which we to-day rejoice." The speaker referred to the purpose of procuring 1,000,000 names to be attached to a petition for presentation to the Government, asking a prohibitory statute, in the furtherance of which documents had been circulated throughout the ments had been circulated throughout the various churches, to which he urged his hearers to attach their signatures. "I have referred to the work which has been done by the city churches," concluded the reverend gentleman, "but it seems right to recognize specially the efforts of our sisters associated with the W. C. T. U. who so heroically, persistently and successfully carried out that which they undertook in connection with the present vete."

Rev. H. C. Speller followed with a few vigorous remarks. The position of the Baptist Church on this matter, he said, had been sometimes misunderstood. He would point out that the late convention, held in Woodstock, by a unanimous vote pledged itself to support any effort in the line of prohibition. He cited the expenditure in the liquor traffic, and dwelt graphically upon the results from it accruing. "The enormous amount of \$30,000,000 is annually wasted in this business in Canada. It causes 90 per cent. of the crime of ada. It causes 90 per cent. of the crime of the country, and 8,000 people are sent to their graves through it every year—and what death-deds! It creates widows and orphans; it brings a large proportion of your land into the most beggarly condition; it increases the suicides, murders, and every crime upon the calendar that you can possibly conceive of. This condition of thing is the result of the expenditure of the \$30,000,000 of your money from year to year. I have only given you a faint conception of this great evil in fair Canada; yet we are in a sense personally responsible for this condition of affairs. God is patient and long suffering, but there is a time in his dealings with man that he lays the axe to the root of the tree and says, 'Thus far shalt thou go and no farther.' It is wonderful what women can do when they put their heads together, they have so much capacity for self-sacrifice, and the carrying of the bylaw was no doubt largely due to their earnest, persistent and faithful work. Another element, I believe, was the moderation of spirit and expression in the speeches that were made in our previous meetings. I am glad and thankful, also, that one of our city journals has placed itself strongly on the right side on this question. We preachers only have a chance to talk to people twice or thrice a week, but a daily paper, to use a college phrase, can 'Whack away at it every day!' and I am very thankful to that journal for the stand it took. However, we must not despise those who voted against that bylaw; they have their opinions as well as we. I may roughly divide these people into three classes. There are those, I am sorry to say, who delibertely act with an impulse born of the devil. They deliberately rejoice in iniquity. To take hold of a young man and ruin him body and soul is certainly a work which may be ascribed to the prince of evil. There is another class—a large one—who condemn as heartily as anyone the evils of the liquor traffic, while at the same time they are not ready for prohibition. They say that we are going too fast. They believe a man may take a glass without doing himself any harm—perhaps they think it will do him good. They say you have no right to take away his liberty. The only way is to make them see, as did St. Paul, that if they permit their example to be a sumbility-step in the way of any persons weaker than themselves they are not practicing that self-denial which is often a Christian duty. The most God-like attribute is that which is ready to sacrifice self for the good of another. To this last class I will say this: That the work is God's, and therefore s

A dissolution of Parliament seemed more imminent a few months ago than it now is, and particularly when the Premier and a number of his colleagues took to the holding of public meetings in various parts of the country. But although they are giving no outward sign now there is no assurance of dissolution being abandoned. The trade cination to the lessening of the morquestion is growing more awkward and nnwieldable to the Government every day of its existence, for no one can doubt that converts to unrestricted trade with the United States are being made every day. Farmers are not alone in the desire to strike off the N. P. shackles. Merchants, manufacturers, workingmen and the great body of consumers generally are demanding continental free trade. This is the case in Ontario, where Sir Richard Cartwright and Mr. Charlton have been holding a series of essful meetings. It is the case in the Maritime Provinces, where Mr Laurier has recently completed a tour. It is the case in Quebec, where men of every occupation are witnessing the disastrous operation of the McKinley tariff. And, needless to say, it is the case in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, where the people are a unit for free buying and selling with their

But Sir John Macdonald and his colleagues are also impressed with the progress which the movement is making in the United States, where men of the highest positions in the Government and in Congress have declared themselves in favor of reci-procity with Canada. They have also read the signs of the times as revealed in the fall elections, in which the McKinley tariff was the chief issue, and naturally enough they dread a like revulsion against high tariff in Canada when the first opportunity comes to the people to pronounce upon it. Added to all these circumstances is the confession of the Conservative press that an offer for enlarged trade has come to the Government of Canada from the Government of the United States, and the rumor that the Imperial Government is urging the settlement of all complications between the two countries on the basis of reciprocity. FLETCHER, Jan. 27.—The mass meeting keld by the colored citizens of the county of Kent in Victoria Hall at Chatham on Friday was fairly attended considering the short notice given. About 100 persons were present, representing the towns of Chatham and Dreaden, and the townships of Dover, Chatham, Raleigh and Tilbury East.

Mr. J. C. Richards (chairman of the Committee on Calls, appointed by the Literary Association of Chatham) called the meeting to order and briefly stated the object of the meeting as follows: "To consider a course to be adopted for the uniting of the colored people of the county of Kent into a league for their mutual protection and advancement."

After all the members of the committee had spoken, they left the matter in the hands of the meeting. Mr. A. V. Thompson was called to the chair, and Mr. R. W. S. Johnson was elected temporary secretary. In a few moments the house was in wild confusion. Men stood on the floor shouting at the top of their voices to the chairman, each trying to got his attention. The chairman got confused and said that he was at sea, amid loud laughter and cheers. Order was finally restored and the meeting settled down to business.


