THE WEB AROUND ANOTHER MINISTER.

The absolute refusal of Sir John Thomp son and his followers to investigate the serious charges made against Postmaster-General Haggart is commented on in unmistakable language by the principal British newspapers. "No honest man can read the testimony," says the Conservative (London) Standard, "without feeling that corruption has saturated departmental and parliamentary life and indeed the whole political atmosphere." The Pall Mall Gazette says it is a pity Mr. Haggart and his colleagues did not welcome an inquiry into the charges leveled against him. Publie men in Canada just now, it argues, can-not treat charges of this kind or of any kind quite as they might have done before public confidence had been utterly shattered by the boodle disclosures. These are strong terms, but they are war-

ranted by the action of the Conservative leaders in calling upon their followers to vote for the vindication of Sir Hector Langevin as well as by the shameful attempts to prevent the full exposure of Minister Chapleau's responsibility for the wholesale robbery of the country by the agency of the Printing Bureau. The London Standard's accusation certainly holds good of the Secretary of State. Senecal stole \$50,000 commissions while he held office under Mr. Chapleau. The Minister has all along strenuously denied that either he or the Government knew anything about the peculations that were continued for the past three years, yet the Queen's printer (Col. Chamberlain) went before the Public Accounts Committee yesterday and swore that he had been informed of Senecal's doings and that he long ago reported them to Mr. Chapleau. Next we have the evidence of the president of the Ottawa Conservative Association, who swears he informed Sir John Macdonald of the rascalities. But even stronger testimony was given by Mr. Barber, a paper manufacturer, who, outh has testified that he com plained of Senecal's embezzlement to Mr. Bowell, Minister of Customs, many months since. Mr. Bowell eased his conscience by suggesting that Mr. Barber should tell it to Chapleau. Barber's confession on this point is significant. He deposed:

"I replied that I did not know how strong Senecal was, and I was afraid the only result would be that I should lose our business with the Government."

That is to say, Mr. Barber was like a good many other contractors, he had good taught to understand that bribery is a sin, reason for believing that if he hit the Man and make it, in every case, a punishable he hit the Master, and that meant a perpetual boycott. His Visit to London—Impressive Sermon Before a Large Congregation.

Betere a Large Congregation.

The Striking Windsor Tailors Acquitted on the Charge of Conspiracy.

At Sandwich on Thursday the seven tailors charged with conspiracy and assaulting a non-union man named McBain came up for trial. When the prosecution had closed their case, Judge McMahon asked them if this was all they had, and, receiving an affirmative reply, he immediately took the case away from the jury and entered a verdict of not guilty. He said also that none of the prisoners, with possibly the exception of Bray and Temple, were in a position to assault McBain. The defense then asked the judge to classify the complaint as one of assault. The judge acquisced, and Bray took the stand, denying that he ever committed the assault or knew who did.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The Times' Paris correspondent says it has become known here that the governors of the Chinese provinces in which the riots occurred have definitely declined to be held responsible therefor, and have declared it impossible to furnish indemnity. The inference is that the Chinese circular to the powers aims simply at delay in order to shirk indemnity, and therefore not be held to account by Europe.
