# CAMBRIDGE BESTS FAST HARVARD EIGHT; CROSSES LINE TWO LENGTHS TO THE GOOD

The English University Crew Win Handily from American Rivals in Great Report at City Hall That Council Will Come to Terms International Race on Classic Thames Course.

Putney, Sept. 8 .- Cambridge University's eight today won against the fast Harvard crew, crossing the finishing line with a lead of two lengths. Cambridge's time was 19 minutes 18 seconds. The record for the course is 18 minutes and 47 seconds, made by Oxford in 1893.

By the decisive distance of two lengths Cambridge won the great international boat race today, stalling off by a steady, powerful stroke, all Harvard's desperate spurts. The Light Blues got away at the start and had the advantage of the choice of stations, which gave them at least length to the good, in consequence of the wind-sheltered water on the Surrey side of the river. They were enabled to maintain their lead and increase it as soon as they reached the wind driven water at Chiswick Eyot. It was a pretty race throughout.

There was a moment of intense expectancy as the two crews backed their eraft to the stakeboats and then leaned far forward, awaiting the supreme signal. The pistol shot broke the spell and both crews got away from the mark boat cleanly, amid a deafening roar from the multitude. The start was perfect, both crews taking the water at the same instant. Neither splashed, but with swift steady precision the Cambridge men drove the bow of their boat half length ahead within the first two boat lengths. As the English boat shot ahead a wild yell went up from the patriotic masses.

Cambridge went at a tremendous pace, 42 strokes to the minutes at the start, gradually reducing this rate, while the Harvard men hardly rowed above 35. The Light Blues gained stroke by stroke until by the time Craven Steps were reached daylight showed between the shells. #### London's Rapid Growth

The city of London will show an increase in population this year of about 1,500, and in assessment of between \$1,000,000 and \$1,100,000 for 1906.

This statement was made to The Advertiser this morning by Assessment Commissioner Grant.

"Every ward in the city now has a population sufficient to warrant it being incorporated separately as a city, if it so desired," Mr. Grant continued. "Each ward is now able to boast of more than 10,000 population, and this is all the law requires to

"Ward four is the banner ward of the city. In assessing the ward we came across a deluge of new houses. They are nearly all good houses, too.

"The population of this ward will show an increase of between 400 and 500 this year.

"The growth of the city, as a whole, is very creditable," the commissioner concluded. "In making the assessment, we have been very conservative as to population figures, and I am fully convinced that there are within the precincts of London today not less than 45,000.

"Of course, as our books will only show an increase of about 1,500 this year, the population will not likely be placed at over 44,500. But as I have said before, I believe there are fully 45,-000 people in the city now."

"It seems to me that the steady annual increase in assessment will enable incoming councils to strike the tax rate at not more than 19 mills, and then we shall have a pull with industries looking to locate in Canada.

"The low tax rate attracts the manufacturers and the workingman, and these are the men we want."



### MR. CHURCHILL'S LETTER.

Mr. Winston Churchill's letter, addressed to Mr. Hamar Greenwood, was Intended for public consumption in Canada. It purports to describe the attitude of the present-day British Liberalism toward Imperial problems, and is designed to clear up misconceptions which have been industriously fostered by the opponents of the Liberal party. It is quite true, as Mr. Churchill states, that "the symbols and apparatus of Imperial administration" have been peculiarly associated with the Conservative party in recent years. This is largely because that party has had almost a monopoly of office in the period in which the imperial idea has been growing, and taking definite shape. But the impartial student of history will not fall into the error of thinking that British Liberalism and Imperialism have been essentially in conflict. Mr.

Churchill states the case admirably: "And what, I should like to know, has the British Empire to fear from Liberal principles? It is one of the oddest things in modern history that there should be any question of this point. It is to Liberal social principles, carried in some ways to far more logical extremes than in this old country, that Canada and Australia and New Zealand ascribe no little share of their progress and prosperity. It is upon Liberal principles of tolerance and trust in racial matters, of freedem and an equality in religlous matters, that they built their

own internal peace. It is by Liberal imperial principles of colonial autonomy, of a lofty humanity, and, above all, of a peaceful foreign policy, tha the structural cohesion of the British Empire has alone been achieved and will alone be maintained."







#### MORMON TEMPLE IS NOW 72 YEARS OLD

FIRST STRUCTURE OF KIND EVER BUILT AT KIRTLAND, OHIO.

The first shrine of Mormonism is still standing at Kirtland, Ohio. If the occupants of the little cemetery near it could rise, says the Ohio Magazine, they would tell how many a fevered zealot gave his

called it, was begun in 1831, and by 1834 was completed. Its foundation was laid on seven small ridges, or hills, in imita-tion of the Rome of old. The dimensions were about 50 by 125 feet. The stone walls

At each end of the room a series of elevated thrones, one rising above the other, marks the position dring worship used by the dignitaries of Joseph Smith's reign. Rows of hooks in the ceiling show how the curtains which were once used were arranged to divide the floor into four



# HEALTH AND BEAUTY



ERTAIN rules for emergencies should be learned by heart by every woman living, for never in the world can she gauge when she will be called upon to act as doctor and hospital nurse, and respond to the wildest kind of a "hurry-up call."

And especially should nurses and mothers train themselves in such knowledge, for accidents will happen even more frequently among children than more frequently among children among their elders.

A set of simple, compact rules, mounted upon a card and hung up in the nursery, will be found a boon to the woman whose memory is so treacherous that she tries the treatment for burns upon some one in a fainting fit.

A small cupboard, or, at least, a shelf, should be set aside, where everything in the surgical line should be kept—well out of the reach of children and ignorant persons. Drastic treatment for choking is to

deliberately turn the child upside down, holding it firmly by the heels; and choknoting it irmit by the neels; and choking is what many a mother has grown to fear most of all the many nursery accidents. For buttons and marbles, and even those tiniest of all china dolls, are often put in their mouths by little children, with arrays corrections. are often put in their mouths by hitchidren, with grave consequences, un-

Quite simple burns have been turned into ugly sores by bandages that stuck and that tore skin and even bits of the burned flesh away when they were being removed.

Nosebleed is best stopped in the time-honored way of applying cold compresses or a bit of ice done up in a cloth at the back of the neck. At the same time insert a small wad of paper between upper lip and teeth, and press the lip firmly down over it. If the nose is extremely red, massage the temples and cheeks, using a brisk, vigorous movement. Often, it seems to have no connection with the stomach, and the sufferer will complacently inform you that "it's just her wretched nerves!" But if the stomach is in perfect order, it is a mighty exceptional case where nerves alone cause it.

At any rate, from whatever cause they come, getting the stomach right is the first step; getting the blood away from the head the second, and restperfect relaxation-is an absolute necesperfect relaxation—is an absolute necessity to effect a cure.

Often bicarbonate of soda—half a teaspoonful in a little water—will correct the acidity of the stomach. Aromatic spirits of ammonia is another good thing to take at such a time; and an occasional woman finds her greatest relief comes from mixing them.

Putting the feet in hot mustard water and keeping them there for full ten minutes is the quickest way to bring relief, and does it by drawing the blood, which seems to be all in the head, away from it. from it.
The best test as to whether or not the water is at just the right temperature is to try it with the back of your hand. If the skin, which is very sensitive there, can stand it, it is not too hot. For the woman who finds the hot water something of a shock, the best way is

"Shells" and "skins" are different terms, in this case, for the same thing. The article referred to is the thick, tough skin that surrounds the hard, woody shell of the black walnard, woody shell of the black wal-nut. It is this that contains the stain. You will have to use your own judg-ment as to where you can obtain the skins, though a druggist or chemist should be able to find them for you. However, the best way of all, and certainly the cheapest, is to go and gather them yourself; this will be possible in the course of a few weeks, when the nuts are ripe.

Please publish a hair tonic for me. My hair has been falling out for about ten years, and is very thin in front. I have used lots of patent medicines, but to no good. My hair is so very oily I wash it twice a week, and in these few days it gets very oily; it is almost necessary to wash my head every day.

I should be very thankful indeed if you would publish a good tonic to prevent the hair from falling out and make it grow again; also to help this very greasy hair of mine.

Potassium carbonate, 120 grams; ammonia water, 1 fluid dram; alcohol, 12 fluid drams; rosewater enough to make 16 fluid ounces. In using, moisten the hair, adjust it loosely, and it will curl upon drying.

For the hairs on your nose I should ecommend the use of a plaster stick. is a mechanical agent for removing the hairs, which I think safer than the nairs, which I think safer than chemicals for such a delicate organ as the nose. You can obtain the stick from a druggist or dealer in toilet articles, and if properly applied it will not be painful. not be painful.

You do not mention your age, so I cannot suggest in detail what to do to prevent wrinkles. There are various methods of keeping down this tend-ency, massage being one of those most frequently used.

Oil of sweet almonds, 4 ounces; white wax, 6 drams; spermaceti, 6 drams; borax, 2 drams; glycerine, 1½ ounces; orange-flower water, 2 ounces; oil of neroli, 15 drops; oil of bigarade (orange skin), 15 drops; oil of petit grain, 15 drops. Melt the first three ingredients, add the glycerine to the orange-flower water and dissole the borax in the mixture; then pour it slowly into the blended fats, stirring continuously.
