Last winter many emigrants living in and about the city of Toronto, most of them outside the limits, were clothed, warmed and fed by the citizens of that city, thousands of dollars worth of material being donated for the purpose, the work of relief and distribution being carried on eadership. These people had absolutely no claim-except the claim of common humanity-upon Toronto. They were not and never had been fellow-citizens, and very few were even fellow-countrymen, This week two little children, daughters of citizens of London were lost, and because their parents were summering outside the city, the London police would render no assistance to the searching parties, which went out in all directions to hunt for them. When the search proved fruitless, and it was deemed advisable to drag the river, the friends and relatives were obliged to go out in boats and fish with rakes and spiked poles to recover the tiny bodies, because it was outside the limits. Truly, London has reason to pride itself on its humanity.







# FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

## **VEGETABLES WERE** STRONG FEATURE

Offered in Large Quantities, But the Demand Was Not as Brisk as Usual.

OATS ADVANCING

Sales Reported as High as \$1 50, But Some Sold as Low as \$1 32-Other Quotations.

Vegetables were the strongest feature on the market this morning, and they were offered in very large quantitles. The demand however, was not as brisk as usual, due probably to the very large sales of the past few days. Tomatoes were selling at 20 to 25 cents a basket, and had a very \_ood sale. Corn was somewhat lower in price, bringing 10 cents a dozen. Potatoes, of which there was a very considerable supply offered, sold at 90 cents to \$1. sacks. Gherkins appeared for the first time this morning, and opened at 20 to 30 per ton; shorts, \$23 to \$24, on track at lower; beev Toronto; Ontario bran, \$22; shorts, \$24, on \$4 to \$5 40; cents a hundred.
