FAST ON ROCKS AT HALIFAX; ALL HANDS SAFELY REMOVED TILL HUN BEATEN

Vessel Bearing 546 Canadian Wounded Sol- Whole Force of Revolution To diers Plunges On Boulders While Entering Port-Mine Sweeper Lands All Wounded.

Halifax, Aug. 2.-Attempts to save the steamer which yesterday stranded at the harbor mouth with 546 wounded soldiers on board were be-The ship had been coming dead slow since just after daylight. Shortly after ten she was picked up by one of the Halifax pilots. When the pilot went on the bridge, more speed was given to the ship. One of the ship's officers declares she was given full speed ahead. In about ten minutes, dead ahead through the dense fog was seen the glimmer of

Runs on Rocks. Instantly the "Stop!" order was telegraphed to the engine-room, folfowed by "Full speed astern!" but it was too late. The headway of the ship was so great that she plunged headlong, her bow resting not 50 yards from the scaly grass that covers the rocks. The bow of the steamer is resting on boulders which have penetrated her bottom Her stern is in 25 or 30 feet of water.

The Wounded Removed.

Wakefield, Montreal; Capt. G. R. Johnson, Regina, and Capt. J. S. Sutherland, Winnineg. The nursing sisters worked indefatigably in the work of removing the mine-sweepers. All the wounded were safely removed to the pier hospital here.

ALLIES ASSURED RUSSIANS STAND FIRM FOR FIGHT

Be Thrown Against Teutons.

Petrograd, Aug. 2.—Foreign Minister erestchenko has sent the following elegram to Russian diplomatists ac-redited to the Allied powers: credited to the Allied powers:
"At a moment when new and grave misfortunes are threatening Russia, we consider it our duty to give our Allies, who have shared with us the burden of trials in the past, a firm and definite explanation of our point of view regarding the conduct of the war. The greatness of the task of the Russian revolution corresponds to the magnitude lution corresponds to the magnitude which it caused in the life of the state. Reorganization in the face of the enemy

which it caused in the life of the state. Reorganization in the face of the enemy of the entire governmental system could not be effected without serious disorders. Nevertheless, Russia, convinced there is no other means of safety, has continued in accord with the Allies' common action on the front.

The New Offensive.

"Fully conscious of the difficulties of the task, Russia has taken up the burden of conducting active military operations during reconstitution of the army and the Government. The offensive of our armies, which was necessitated by a strategical situation, encountered insurmountable obstacles on both fronts, and in the interior of the country. The criminal propaganda of irresponsible elements was used by enemy agents and provoked revolution in Petrograd. At the same time part of the troops on the front were seduced by the same propaganda, forgot their duty to the country and facilitated the enemy piercing our front.

"A heavy incessant rain has fallen throughout the past forty-eight "In the neighborhood of the Ypres-Roulers Railway, where the enemy yesterday afternoon had succeeded at great cost in gaining a foothold in our advanced positions, our counter-attack launched late in the evening drove back the German infantry at all points, and completely re-established our former lines. On the remainder of the Ypres battlefront there was no change.

PERFECT CO-OPERATION

London, Aug. 2.-Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.-Reuter's correspondent at headquarters of the French army in Flanders telegraphs:
"British and French troops are today co-operating as they did on the Somme yesteryear, in what may be a conflict as eventful as that of the Somme. The battlefield is mainly a British battlefield. It is the old fighting ground between the Yser and the Lys, which has been drenched with so much British blood since 1914. French and British are fighting side by side as they did in the first battles of the Yser and Ypres, and French valor and French guns contributed their part to the first days' success. Today's battle proves as nothing yet has proved, during the war the absolute union of the armies of France and Britain.

The French sector was a strip of front running northwards from the neighborhood of Boesing. Artillery preparations of considerable length preceded the attack. Its intensity and violence exceeded anything hitherto experienced.

MUCH HARD FIGHTING. 

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Heat claimed the lives of 101 persons in Greater New York today, while hundreds of others were prostrated. The city's sweltering millions got only temporary relief from a brief thunderstorm that broke this afternoon, and the temperature, which, at 4 o'clock went down to 88 with the cooling rain, again started to climb with the reappearance of the sun.

The humidity also began to go higher and nightfall found the city's population facing another night of suffering.

More than 200 horses died in the streets of the city today.

BRITISH SHIPS LOST TO SUBS LESSENED AGAIN LAST WEEK

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Some falling off in the loss of British merchantmen by submarines is noted in the official summary issued this evening. Eighteen British vessels of more than 1.600 tons were sunk by submarlnes or mines last week. Three vessels under 1.606 tons were sunk, while no fishing vessels were lost.

According to the admiralty report of the previous week, the losses were 21 British vessels of more than 1,600 tons each, three of less than 1,600 tons each, and one fishing vessel. GERMAN EXPENDITURE IN QUARTER \$750,000,000






