How the Canadian Consumer Is Pinched—The Canadian Product Can Be Shipped to England and Back to Canada and Sold Lower Than the Canadian Prices.

If you wish to buy a Canadian smoked ham weighing about 11 pounds in this city, you must pay 19 cents per pound for it. This is the price at Davies' retail store. Bought by the pound the price of the best ham at this store runs up to 25 cents.

Now, supposing one of these anti-reciprocity magnates, in his anxiety to do good to the workingman, proposed to import Canadian hams from Liverpool and sell them at a fair profit in this city, would he be thought

Supposing, furthermore, he insisted on having them packed in the best possible way, each ham sewn carefully in canvas with a couple of handfuls of oathusks thrown on the back of the ham-and on the bone-making it a sort of cushion, almost impossible to damage. Medical experts would be called, and much would be said about "brainstorms." But let the workingman go over these figures.

Our hero (and he need not necessarily be a hero, there is money in it) can buy wholesale hams in Liverpool averaging 11 pounds each from the Davies Company at never more than 68 shillings (about \$17) per cwt. (of 112 pounds) and more often than not at nearer 50 shillings than 68 shillings. His hams will cost him further, 2 pence (4 cents) each to smoke, and thus he can get (say) 240 hams weighing in all 2,600 pounds, costing him as near as possible 70 shillings (about \$17 50) per cwt., smoked. Any export ham packer in England will pack them for him, charging him as under:

If he can sell all this at 181/2 cents per pound within two months, he makes 16 1-3 per cent, per annum, which is a fair profit on an investment, even if he has to deduct a commission. Remember, the above are all outside topmost prices.

Now, in addition to this he has about 1,600 pounds of best dairy salt, and each of his hams is sewn in canvas. His stock will keep indefinitely. Do not these figures make one think furiously? They are not juggled. Hundreds of thousands of hams are packed in this way every month at this cost, and exported to points all over the world, from England. The competition of American, Danish and Old Country ham forces the Canadian packers to be content with a reasonable profit on the British

In other words, Canadian ham is not only shipped to England and sold cheaper there than in Canada, but it can be shipped to England, shipped back to Canada, and sold profitably at a lower price than is now charged the Canadian people.

And the workingman of Canada is asked to vote that the Canadian packers be protected from competition, i.e., that the packers shall have no hindrance from putting up the prices of the necessaries of life as high as the tariff permits them.

The Canadian packers are opposing reciprocity because it lowers the duties on meat, and will force them to cut down their exorbitant profits.

#### **CHINESE TROOPS** FOR PROTECTORS

Rev. F. A. Steven Does No Feel Any Anxiety for the Safety of Missionaries.

#### CUSTOMS OVERRIDDEN

This Is the Reason Why the Chinese Are in Rebellion in Affected District.

The Missionaries.

The southwest of the province of Sz-Chuan is the territory of the American Baptists, and the Church Missionary Society is active in the northwest. In the centre of the province, where the city of Chengtu is situated all the extension work is left to the Canadian Methodist Church. A Sturdy Class.

A Sturdy Class.

"The people of Sz-Chuan are a pecularly, sturdy and independent class," said R.v. Mr. Steven to The Advertiser, "They have a heavy population, some 67,000,600, and they very eften strongly resent the interference of officials from other parts of the country. It is the policy of the Chinese Government to move officials about, and a man is never appointed to a high office in his own province. Hence the people naturally resist the heavy taxation which is levied by these officials either at the command of the Emperor or for their own purposes. The building of the railroad from Hankow to Chengtu is perhaps the chief cause of the present rebellion. About 190 miles of rapids will be avoided above the city of Hankow, which rapids make it impossible for large steamers to proceed farther up the rive."

Increased Taxes.

Increased Taxes. "The building of the road will en-tail largely increased taxes, and, furthermore, it is an overriding of old customs. The Chinese also fear that furthermore, it is an overriding of old customs. The Chinese also fear that it will increase the cost of transportation, and that it will turn out of employment thousands of boatmen now employed on the river. Then, tee, a foreign loan has been negotiated for the railway, and naturally allows to the foreign countries involved a certain measure of control in the operation of the road. This is in direct opposition to the cry of "China for the Chinese."

"It is a long time," Mr. Steven stated, "since there has been a serious rising in Sz-Chuan. There was no trouble here at the time of the Boxer uprising. It is just probable that the missionaries who were under escort to the Yangtse, to take refuse in the city of Chungking, have been

intercepted with the report of that Legislature, and serving one term, retrouble is all over and have returned turned to his editorial desk.

"I spent the winter of 1883-84 in Chungking, and it is a very large and important city," said Mr. Steven.

Element of Unrest.

"There is always an element of unrest among the people. They are heavily taxed, and although in Sz-Chuan there is no famine, yet they are affected by reports of famine and flood in other provinces. The flooding of the Yangtse Valley will result in a famine which will last until next May. This is the second famine in one year.

"However, I think the missionaries in Sz-Chuan will be safe enough. Tuan Fang, who has been appointed commissioner for the building of the new railroad, is an extremely enlightened and able official, and he is very friendly to the foreigners. He was formerly a viceroy, and at the time of the Boxer troubles saved the lives of a great many missionaries."


