Rioting Occurs At Londonderry Demonstration of Nationalists

BOLSHEVIKI SUFFER HEAVY LOSSES IN THE LUGA RIVER FIGHTING

BACK TO BUSINESS

Soviet Army Southwest of Petrograd Loses Heavily in Men, Guns and Ammunition—Russian Reds Near Podsevy Desert To Esthonians.

London, Aug. 16.—Several battalions of Bolshevik troops have been wiped out in the new counter-offensive of the Northwestern Russian army along the River Luga, southwest of Petrograd, according to dispatches from Helsingfors dated Wednesday. The soviet forces also lost large numbers of prisoners, machine guns and ammunition.

On the west bank of the Luga, in the region east of Narva, ne anti-Bolshevik troops occupied Alexandroffskaia Gorka, east Pskov, south of Narva, Other anti-Bolshevik detachments made aids against the soviet front and captured 500 prisoners.

FOREST FIRES DESTROY DEERLAKESETTLEMENT IN NORTHERN ONTARIO

Six Separate Fires Raging in Parry Sound District-Some Families Have Not Been Heard of For Days and Fears for Their Saf ety Are Entertained.

TORONTO, Aug. 15 .- Forest fires which are now sweeping the Parry Sound district, completely wiped out Deer Lake settlement, 23 miles from Parry Sound, on Wednesday, according to incomers from the north country. There were eleven buildings destroyed in one settlement, including the general store, doctor's

office. hotel, school and dwelling houses. Travelers who alighted from trains tonight said the settlers were preserving their lives only by moving about from one clearing to another as the fire swept onward.

The C. N. R. bridge between Deer Lake and Bulger has been destroyed, according to the latest information, and C. N. R. trains are utilizing the C. P. R. tracks for through traffic. Local service is at a standstill. This morning, settlers had gathered at Robertson's mills, about three miles east of Deer Lake, in an effort to confine the flames inside a cleared area which ends just at the in an effort to confine the flames inside a cleared area which ends just at the

There are six separate forest fires raging in the Parry Sound district. according to best information available. Although nobody on the trains arriving at Toronto had heard of any definite loss of life, several settlers and their families have not been seen or heard of in some days, and apprehension is felt as to their safety. One family named Elliott is known to have been burned out, but it is not known whether they escaped.

Supreme Council Makes Its Meaning Plain to Rumanian Government.

MUST OBSERVE TERMS

Reparation Must Be Left En tirely in Hands of the Entente Powers.

Paris, Aug. 16.-Rumania will not be permitted to strip Hungary according to the draft of the supreme council's reply to the last note from Budapest which was completed at today's meeting of the council. The Bucharest Government is informed that the fixing of the amount of reparation to be made by Hungary, as well as its distribution is a matter under control of the allied and associated powers, and that until final decision is reached all war, railway and decision is reached all war, railway and agricultural material now in Hungary and subject to distribution will be under the common administration of the allied powers. The text of the reply follows: "The peace conference without reverting to a certain number of points which call for correction, on its part notes with satisfaction the Rumanian declaration that it intends to work in agreement with the policy which the conference adopts in Hungary. It interprets this declaration as an indication that Rumania as a state participating in conference.

Paris, Friday, Aug. 16.—Prince Felix of Bourbon-Parma, brother of former Empress Zita of Austria, is seeking authorization by the Allies to go to Luxemburg to visit his fiance, Grand Duchess Charlotte, according to a Geneva dispatch to the Temps, which says that he affirms his loyalty to the Allies. The Temps adds that, unlike his brothers, Prince Sixte and Prince Xavier, who served in the Belgian army, Prince Felix fought with the Austrian armies, but not on the western front.

Thousands of Dollars Worth of Damage Done to Property As a Result of Rioting and Looting-More Trouble Is Feared in Irish City.

Londonderry, Ireland, Aug. 16.—Rioting and looting occurred in this city during the past night and early this morning. Troops charged on mobs, but did not fire any shots. The soldiers, however, were met with a volley of stones when they attempted to break up a Nationalist demonstration. The monetary loss from looting and from damage to property is estimated at thousands of pounds by police authorities.

The trouble started when Nationalists set fire to a large number of tar barrels which had been collected beneath an arch over which was displayed a picture of Edward De Valera, president of the Irish republic and sang the 'Soldier's Song." Unionists responded by singing the National Anthem.

One force of troops kept the crowds apart, while other detachments attempted to clear the streets, charging upon the throngs repeatedly.

Bricks and stones were hurled at the charging troops, one soldier being seriously hurt. The Nationalists were finally driven back to their own quarters. Windows were smashed and shops were looted by the crowds, and the city was in darkness the entire night. More rioting is feared tonight.



of Foreigners To Be Admitted.

Washington, Aug. 15.—Revolutionary changes in the immigration laws are proposed in a bill introduced in the Senate this afternoon by Senator Dillingham of Vermont.

The measure provides that after July 1990 the number of aliens of any 1, 1920, the number of aliens of any nationality, who may be admitted annually to the United States as immigrants, shall be limited to 5 per cent of the number of persons of such nationality already residing here. The proposed restriction does not apply to immigrants who are natives of counproposed restriction does not apply to immigrants who are natives of countries of the western hemisphere, and certain professional classes are exempted from the provisions of the law. The secretary of labor would also be given power to admit aliens in excess of the maximum number when in his opinion such action was "justifiable as a measure of humanity."

The bill provides for the repeal of all special laws directly or indirectly relating to immigration from China, Japan and other Oriental countries, including the Chinese exclusion law. The proposed measure, Dillingham The proposed measure, Dillingham stated, will not open the door to an increased immigration from Asia, on account of the small number of Asiatics now in the country.

ST. THOMAS CITIZENS **CLAIM PROFITEERS** ON RAMPAGE THERE

Latest Now Is a Demand for Civic Ice Plant by Residents.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 15 .- "We don't need to run all over the country or even look in the bigger centres for profiteers, for we have them right here in St. Thomas," declared one citizen to The Advertiser tonight. He was discussing the ice situation here, and judging by statements heard on all sides there must be either a sudden drop in the price of ice or the taxpayer will demand that a civic ice

plant be started at an early date. The trades and labor council some weeks ago made a thorough investigation of the possibilities of a civic ice plant, and they obtained a lot of valuable information on the subject. As soon as this was made public, it brought a considerable amount of discussion from the local ice vendors as to whether St. Thomas requires such a plant or not. The local organ expressed its views a few days ago by stating that after making a thorough investigation of local conditions they had discovered that owing to the scarcity of ice this

year the present high prices charged are not at all excessive. The people of this city, however, are literally up in arms to think that an article should be sold at such exorbitant prices merely because it has become scarce. There are hundreds of homes without ice because of the high prices charged, while others are unable to get the amount they require owing to a scarcity, yet the merchants handling the product urge the people not to think of a civic ice plant. Artificial ice sold early in the season at \$1.50 per ton. Later it went up to \$4 per ton, but the retail price has remained at from \$15 up to \$18 per ton.

The question of a civic ice plant will however, be brought up at the meeting of the finance committee in a ing of the finance committee in a week or so, and a delegation of trades and labor representatives will be present to see that the people are given an opportunity of voting on the project. Ice could, it is stated, be manufactured in a civic plant at about 90 cents per ton, and the taxpayer has no doubt but that even with a little heavier taxation he would still have a long way to go before ice manufactured at this cost would reach \$18 per ton, the price he now has to pay.





WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 .- Close cooperation between state authorities, who possess detailed information of food and price conditions, and the attorney general and his staff of assistants, empowered to enforce the food control law, is being established as part of the Government's fight to reduce the cost of

Instructions went out today from At torney-General Palmer to the two district attorneys in Ohio to proceed immediately to assist Governor Cox in the seizure of large quantities of meat, butter and eggs, alleged to have been held in storage in that state for more than six to ten months, the legal limits. Criminal prosecutions will be instituted, it was said, if it can be shown that the foods were held from the market for the purpose of boosting prices. Officials here were inclined to think that the long period of storage indicated some other reason than an effort to spread the abundant supplies of a producing season over the lean part of the year.

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


