Is Boland, a member of the parliament of the "Provisional Irish Republic," issued a statement here today on the Irish question in reply to views expressed yesterday at New York by Sir Auckland Geddes, the new British ambassador to Geddes, the new British ambassador t the United States.

"Sir Auckland Geddes," Mr. Boland said, "expressed the view that the British Government wants now 'to place fairly and squarely on the shoulders of British Empire the solution of their po-litical differences.

"Ireland refuses to take any position

within the framework of the British Empire. She feels as the American col-onist felt that the right of a people to liberty is a self-evident truth. "Sir Auckland Geddes, in suggesting that all other peoples stand aside that all other peoples stand aside in this controversy, assumes the right to speak for Ireland as well as Great Britain. The Irish people have repudiated Britain. The only people in a position to speak for Ireland in America are those officially designated by the Irish parliament. The British ambassador assumes to present the Irish question to the American people as a domestic matter of Great Britain. The Irish question is an international question; therefore it is an American question.



### **POWER CURTAILED:** ICE IN NIAGARA RIVER TO BLAME

Fifty Per Cent Reduction Made This Morning in Hydro.

Fifty per cent reduction in the con-sumption of electricity was necessary in the city today because of ice interfering with power development at Niagara.
Although the river has been clear for some time ice from the lakes above has now commenced to come down stream, and has blocked the inlets of some of the power stations. the power stations.

The interruptions came without

warning to the general public and citizens were surprised when they found no current available in their homes this morning, although this was a common occurrence throughout the winter. Domestic circuits were the only ones which suffered, as power was supplied to the factories.

General Manager Buchanan said that the situation was not so serious as it would have been earlier in the year. Lights are not required in the morning to the same extent as a few weeks ago nd the general demand seems to be

less.

For some weeks London has been obtaining all the power it needed, 7.800 kilowatts, so that the reduction today to 4,500 was particularly noticeable.





The system of paying for the upkeep of the branches on a 50 per cent basis with the municipality in which they are located will nicipality in which they are located wil

They are instructed to arrange these so that they can be repaid in monthly installments. In special cases, where larger loans are required, they will be advanced by the head office upon the local commission agreeing to be security for them. ing to be security for them.

It has been found that many soldiers

ave been sent to positions at outside centres which they later found were not suitable. The commission will now assist these men to find new positions by paying their railroad fare to another orint. All money thus advanced by branch offices will be repaid by the lead office.

THE SHIRTWAIST PATTERN.

A young girl often begins her own sewing by making for herself a shirtwaist. It looks easy, but it needs study and care, to insure good fit and right lines. A girl who has found a good foundation for more elaborate sewing.

The back width is measured between the bone at the back of the neck and the waist, keeping the tape straight across the back. This measurement is important, as it affects the fit around the shoulders. 



It not only assisted the Belgians, but rendered aid to the French, the Poles, the Serbians and the Rumanians, at the time of their greatest need. It gave millions of dollars in assistance to Red Cross and Y. M. C. A. work in the communities, and fitted out hospitals, having maintained the well-known hospital at Campagne, with Dr. Alexis Carrol and his staff, who carried on such admirable work. admirable work

Other Forms of Work.

"It also accomplished other forms of war work throughout the whole of that trying period. Apart from the war, however, its activities relate very largely to medical education in regard to the public health administration." largely to medical education in regard to the public health administration in different parts of the world. It is carrying on its operations in China, in France, in India, in Egypt, and, indeed, throughout Christendom, and its work is exclusively, as I have indicated, one for the furtherance of the welfare of mankind generally.
