

London, Nov. 24.—Suggestions that it was probable Sinn Fein agents would attack prominent persons and property in London and other large cities of England have been current during the last few days, but nothing substantial has been found to lend color to them. The Graphic claimed today that a "high authority" had said the British secret service had discovered a Sinn Fein plot aimed at the citizens of London. The newspaper adds: "The secret service recently discovered a Sinn Fein plot to destroy property elsewhere, mentioning the Manchester ship canal and the Liverpool docks the chosen scenes of Sinn Fein outrages. Elaborate precautions, it is said, have been taken at both places.'

Montreal, Nov. 24.—A passenger service by air between Montreal, Toronto and New York will be inaugurated early next summer, says J. W. Norcross, president of the Canada Steamship Lines, Limited, who has returned from a trip of several months to England and the continent. While in England Mr Norcross contracted for two Vickers-Vimy seaplanes, which will have a capacity for carrying twelve passengers each in addition to the pilots. The 'planes are to be capable of developing a maximum speed of 127 miles an hour, and are of the type that is operated practically without noise. Delivery of the two machines is expected by next spring.

The New York, Toronto and Montreal service will follow the watercourses between the three centres, thus securing a maximum of safety to the passengers of the aircraft.

"The new service will be largely in the way of an experiment," he said, "but I am convinced that aerial navigation is the one of the future, and is possessed of unbounded possibilities in a commercial way. The Canada Steamship Lines is the largest inland transportation system in the world, and there is no reason why the company should not become the premier aerial one as well."

In regard to the high school situation, he said: "Probably the activities of the board of education and the board of health should come first. I have shown you that more than one-third of your taxes are required for this part of city work. For example, the question whether there should be one central high school or three or more district high schools, is one that you should consider carefully. As a taxpayer, I am inclined to be alarmed at the expense. As mothers, you should seek the expert advice of men who have given a life study to educational questions rather than the opinion of men seeking your support as candidates at the election. To my mind, the question whether four

study to educational questions rather than the opinion of men seeking your district high schools would not more efficiently serve the educational demands of the city is more important than whether four the city is more important than whether it would increase the cost of construction. All matters of education, safety of life, sanitation, and recreation should be your first consideration."





PORTLAND, Oregon, Nov. 23.—John Doughty, former private secretary to Ambrose J. Small, millionaire theatre owner of Toronto, Ont., who disappeared last December, was under arrest here today, and will start tomorrow in custody for the Eastern Canadian city. Officers who arrested Doughty said he confessed to the theft of \$100,000 in Canadian Victory bonds, which were missed after his disappearance. The prisoner, they said, would not discuss the disappearance of Small, beyond saying that he last saw his employer in a Toronto theatre on the night of Small's disappearance. disappearance.

Doughty was arrested yesterday in Oregon City, near here, where he was employed in a paper mill, and where he had risen from a laborer to an assistant foremanship in a department crew. A world-wide search has been made for him.

Kidnapping Doughty.
"I don't want to see any policemen ere." said Mitchell. "I am kidnapping He is willing to return to with me without extradition papers."
Doughty willingly discussed his past life with a reporter for the Portland Telegram, while being conveyed from Oregon City to Portland this afternoon. He maintained silence, however, on the alleged kidnapping of his former employer, Ambrose J. Small, and his whereabouts since his mysterious disappearance from Toronto last December.

Doughty said he had been married twice and that his second wife was living. They were separated some time ago, he said, and his two sons, 10 and 11 years old, are being cared for by his sister in Toronto.

His face lighted with pleasure when he was told that the men in his gang at the paper mill at Oregon City had expressed surprise over his arrest and that they spoke highly of him.

"I was unused to manual labor," he said, "I did my best to get along with the boys. They were fine fellows."

Doughty made no objection to posing for photographers, both at Oregon City and in Portland.



# LEGAL DIFFICULTIES IN WAY OF FREIGHT PAYMENT QUESTION

### Proposal That Canadian Haulage Be Paid For in Canadian Money.

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—(By Canadian Press) .- The hearing was concluded late this afternoon by the railway board of the complicated case arising out of the pre-payment of railway tolls on international traffic under present adverse exchange conditions. The situation from the Canadian standpoint has been accentuated since the commencement of the autumn grain movement. During the course of the hearing today Chief Commissioner Carvell and the other members of the board stated that some action is necessary, but em-phasized the legal difficulties involved necause of the international character of the problem and the consequent lack
