



JUSTICES OF THE PEACE.

Hon. J. M. Gibson introduced a bil amending the act respecting justices the peace. Under the amendment my justice of the peace who wilfully receives a larger fee than that author ized by law shall be liable to forfeit 340 and costs for each offense the penalty being recoverable on complaint fixed at \$2 for a sitting of two hours or less and 50 cents for each additional hour. The justice of the peace is also allowed 13 cents per mile one way, where it is necessary to hold sittings at a distance from his residence. TO HELP BEET SUGAR.






