LABOR'S RIGHTS

The following extracts from the constitution of the new state of Oklahoma go to show that the rights of labor have not been neglected by it is safe to predict a prosperous career for the state which looks after the class that forms the bulk of its people, in this way:

Education-Sec 1. The legislature shall provide for the compulsory attendance at some public or other school, unless other means of education are provided, of all the children of the state who are sound in mind tary, and J.
